



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Estates Men's Golf General Meeting Minutes

Estates Men's Golf General Meeting May 4, 2016

The Meeting was called to order by President Russ Krussow at 10 a.m. in the Dining Hall, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll Call: A quorum of officers was established. Officers and Committee Chairmen/Members present were: Russ Krussow, Paul Eaton, Chuck Johnson, Gene Stiles, Stan Hiller, Bob Price, Steve Hobson, Fred Bourne, and Allan Lindberg. A total of 30 members attended the Meeting.

President's Report: President Krussow had nothing to report.

Vice President's Report: Vice President Paul Eaton expressed his thanks to our General Manager, Tom Staskiewicz, for his support of golf, including the reward program he instituted to motivate residents to encourage their non-resident friends to become Associate Members. Paul, who is also our OGA representative, stated that the OGA has a similar program to solicit membership. Paul then inquired as to the interest of the Men's Golf Club in having a Rules Seminar. A discussion ensued and it was noted that the last Rules Seminar was not well attended even though refreshments were included in the seminar. A vote was taken and the majority of the members present chose to not have a Rules Seminar this year. Paul pointed out that the Ladies Golf Club may arrange a Rules Seminar and, if so, said seminar would be open for anyone to attend. Paul then discussed the pictures of the Past Presidents of the Men's Golf Club that are on display. He stated that the Executive Committee of the Club recommended displaying only the past five years of Past Presidents pictures and that the remaining pictures be placed in a nice picture album. He stated that the Ladies Golf Club has chosen to display pictures of the past ten years of Past Presidents. Following discussion, Steve Hobson made a motion that our Club approve the display of pictures of Past Presidents for the past ten years and approve a maximum of \$100 of Club funds to purchase sufficient picture albums wherein other Past Presidents pictures could be placed. The motion was seconded by Allan Lindberg, the motion was approved unanimously.

Rules: Chairman Ron Hansen had nothing to report.

OGA: OGA representative Paul Eaton had nothing to report.

Sunshine: Chairman Bob Price reported that he sent out the following appropriate cards during the month of April: A card to Chuck Beal for the passing of his wife; cards to the following individuals for medical issues: Ken Leonard, Jim Worley, Janice Aiken, and Mike Dykes.

Mixed Tournaments: Co-Chair Bob Price reported that sponsors have paid their fees for the first four mixed tournaments and that dinners have been planned and approved for all seven of our mixed tournaments. A sign-up sheet has been posted in the Pro Shop for the first mixed tournament to be held on Memorial Day, May 30th.

Membership: Chairman Stan Hiller reported that he has completed a total of 177 bag tags to date. Stan also stated that the HOA Website has information as to upcoming tournaments as does the Phone Directory.

Tournaments: President and Chairman of the Tournament Committee, Russ Krussow, reported that the final round of the President's Cup will be held tomorrow, May 5th, and that tee times have been posted in the Pro Shop. Russ also reported that the Men's Horse Race will be held on Saturday, May 28th and the Spring Handicap Tournament will be held on June 23, 24, and 25.

Handicap: Chairman Clint Hansen was absent with notice. Co-Chair Allan Lindberg reported that the "clean ball rule" (lift, clean, and place) will be in effect during the second and final round of the President's Cup. Allan also reported that internet posting for rounds played at our course have changed now that rounds played "solo" are not allowed to be posted. This is a USGA rule and cannot be altered. Allan then led a discussion regarding our Club as a "handicap club" with

the emphasis on payouts during Club play based on net scores. Allan and Clint attempt to keep various flights as equal as possible as to participants in a given flight; thereby keeping payouts similar to the fees paid within that flight.

Greens: Club representative Fred Bourne reported that the first Greens Committee Meeting with the new Chairman, Don Conway, will be happening soon. Fred reported on the fundraiser tournament for the Woodburn High School Golf Team. He stated that the tournament was a major success with 20 teams of four golfers participating in the tournament. As a result, \$5,000 was raised for the high school golf team to assist their expenses as to travel, lodging, and food. The money raised was the most ever achieved by this fundraising tournament. 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Seasoning Thyme

Carrots are among the healthiest foods on Earth. Bugs bunny knows a good thing when he plucks a stolen carrot from Elmer Fudd's garden, takes a bite, and declares, "Eh, what's up doc?" Bugs eats the green carrot tops, recognizing that carrots, tops and all, are among the most nutritious foods on the planet.

Despite their goodness, carrots had to be taught to be sweet by enthusiastic green thumb gardeners who took an interest in improving their flavor. Probably no one would be eating carrots that were once small, very thin, red, purple and even black taproots with a distasteful bitterness if no one had taken an interest in improving their flavor. Luckily, some motivated folks took carrots under their horticultural wings and taught them how to be sweet.

HISTORY

Today, the wild carrot grows throughout Europe and in Western Asia, from Afghanistan and westward into Turkey. Both continents are home to archaeological sites where ancient seeds were found in prehistoric lake dwellings in Switzerland as well as the eighth century B.C. Royal Gardens of Babylon, an area that is now a part of Iraq. Evidence shows the Babylonians appreciated the pleasing fragrance from the leaves and seeds of carrot plants and grew them as aromatic herbs rather than eating them for their roots. Throughout Europe the Dutch became known for producing the richest, yellowest butter, owning this success to their cow's regular carrot feed.

During the 17th and 18th centuries, foods from many parts of the globe arrived in the New World at a steady pace. Vegetables like carrots, cabbages, and turnips, though not yet commonplace, began their transition from the home garden to the beginnings of the commercial farm. Carrots also made a favorable impression on American Indians who eagerly adopted them because of their bright orange color and novel flavor.

Following World War I, carrots came into popularity in the U.S. because several American travelers visited Europe, tasted the uncommon roots and thought them novel enough to stir interest. Shortly after, farmers began growing carrots in Michigan and California. The delicate-looking flower that we know as Queen Anne's Lace is nothing more romantic than a wild carrot. It is in fact, the species from which our garden carrots was derived and to which they apparently revert when forced to fend for themselves. And, as any farmer can tell you, that fragile appearance lies. Lacy or not, Anne is very good at fending! Not only is the biennial flower an invasive weed, but livestock that grazes on it may produce milk flavored like bitter carrots. So Anne has sometimes been known as Devil's plague, as well as wild carrot, bird's nest, crow's nest and bee's nest. The latter names refer to the bloom's habit of curling into a cup shape to protect its seeds.

CARROT MARMALADE RECIPE

Ingredients List:


- 1 1/2 lbs. of brown sugar
- 3 cups of chopped carrots
- 4 medium oranges
- 1 large lemon
- water

Directions: Chop the carrots, oranges and lemon. Mix with sugar. Allow to stand overnight. In the morning, cook until the mixture gels.

Seal while hot.

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
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Service Advocate for Edward Jones Named

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

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
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

Protecting Yourself from Fraud

Scams are becoming more sophisticated. There are ways to be on the lookout for scams and protect yourself. This information is from the Oregon Department of Justice.

1. Scammers Contact You "Out Of The Blue"

It could be a knock on the door, a phone call, or a piece of mail you aren't expecting. For example, you didn't think you owed the IRS or a debt collection agency money, but they called claiming you could be in trouble if you don't pay.

2. Scammers Claim There Is An "Emergency"

A scam might warn that if you don't respond immediately your prize winnings will be lost, or that a relative or friend is in trouble in a foreign country. If something prompts immediate action, be cautious.

3. Scammers Ask For Your Personal Information

Scammers often pose as banks, health care providers and government officials asking for identifying personal or financial information. Anytime someone asks you for this information, be suspicious!

4. Scammers Want You To Wire Money

You may be asked to wire money or purchase prepaid debit cards. This is the easiest way for scam artists to get their hands on your money, and it's almost impossible to get it back once it has been sent. Don't do it!

5. Scammers Tell You To Keep It "Secret"

By asking you to keep a transaction secret, scammers know you won't have to respond to questions from family or friends who might see through the scam. Check with someone you trust before acting.

6. Scammers Make It Sound Too Good To Be True

If it seems too good to be true, it probably is! Above all, use this simple mantra

to help you detect and avoid scams. It's always better to be cautious than to be a victim.

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Rules and Regulations Is Complaint Driven

The members of the Rules and Regulations Committee, the Board of Directors and the office staff are frequently asked, "What are you doing about?" The answer is usually, "Did you fill out a complaint form?"

Enforcement at Woodburn Estates & Golf is generally "complaint driven", much like the City of Woodburn Code Enforcement Program. Unless someone actually fills out a written complaint, the Rules and Regulations committee is not called into action. The Rules Committee, The Board of Directors and the office staff are not police and do not go out on patrol looking for violations.

As a member, you were provided copies of our organizational documents and any member "in good standing" can file a complaint and, if desired, can remain anonymous in the process. A Rules Review Request – Complaint Form is available from our website and can be found under "Our Community." Complaint Forms are also available just outside the office door on the bulletin board.

Your Contract with Woodburn Estates & Golf

When our members complete and sign their homeowner's application they are entering into a contract with Woodburn Estates & Golf to abide by the rules and regulations governing our community. Whether the rule pertains to your home or property, what you do on or with your property, etc.; you must be in compliance or you will be subject to fines or legal action as appropriate.

Our CC&Rs allow the community association to enforce the covenants and promises found in the governing documents. The association does this through its elected board of directors and managers. Some may ask if the association has an obligation to enforce the CC&Rs? In most cases, the answer is yes.

The question of whether or not an association may use legal proceedings to enforce its CC&Rs depends on "standing." Standing, in a legal sense, means that the party to the litigation has a stake or interest in the dispute, as well as the capacity to sue. In Oregon and Washington, state law grants community associations standing and authority to enforce covenants through legal action.

Oregon law specifically authorizes community associations to initiate or intervene in matters relating to the enforcement of governing documents:

- [A] Homeowners Association may...initiate or intervene in litigation or administrative proceedings in its own name and without joining the individual owners in the following:
- (A) Matters relating to the collection of assessments and the enforcement of governing documents (fines). (ORS 94.630(e)(A)

The board also has the authorization to place a lien on properties where assessments and fines have not been paid; again to protect the interests of the other owners.

Enforcement of the covenants, rules and regulations is not a board option; rather it is a board requirement. The board is responsible for protecting the interests of all members.

With that said, the goal of the office staff and your board is not to be difficult, but we do need to be diligent and we need to follow the law and our documents. If you haven't taken time lately please read through our documents so you are familiar with the rules and regulations you have agreed to follow.

What is a 501(c)(7) Organization?

Not all tax-exempt organizations are private foundations or public charities. Under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(7), social clubs like fraternities and country clubs can be recognized as tax-exempt organizations.

What is a social club? Generally, social clubs are membership organizations primarily supported by funds paid by their members. In order to qualify as a tax-exempt organization, a social club must meet the following requirements:

- Membership is limited.
- Organized for pleasure, recreation, and other non-profitable purposes.
- Substantially all of its activities must further those purposes.
- Must provide an opportunity for personal contact amongst members; there must be a "commingling" of the members for social, recreational, or similar purposes.
 - Supported by membership fees, dues, and assessments.
- Net earnings may not inure to the benefit of any person having a personal and private interest in its activities.
 - May not hold itself out as providing goods and services to the general public.
 - Cannot provide pleasure or recreation on a commercial basis.

What are examples of social clubs?

- · College fraternities and sororities.
- · Amateur hunting, fishing, tennis, swimming and other sport clubs.
- Hobby clubs.
- · Yacht clubs.

Why are social clubs allowed to apply for tax-exemption? Congress reasoned that social clubs should be allowed to apply for tax-exempt status since individual members of the club would be in substantially the same position if the individual had spent his/her after-tax income on pleasure or recreation without the social club. The reasoning for the exemption is valid only if the club's income stems from members.

How are social clubs funded? Member income funds social clubs. This can be in the form of membership fees, dues, or assessments. However, a 501(c) (7) organization may receive up to 35 percent of its gross receipts, including investment income, from sources outside of its membership without losing its tax-exempt status. No more than 15 percent of the amount may be derived from use of the club's facilities or services by the general public or from other activities not furthering social or recreational purposes for members. If an organization has nonmember income exceeding these limits, all the facts and circumstances will be considered in determining whether the club continues to qualify for exemption.

Can a social club limit its membership to a specific religion? Yes, a club may, in good faith, limit its membership to members of a particular religion in order to further the teachings or principles of that religion. It may not exclude individuals of a particular race or color.

Why choose to apply for exemption under 501(c)(7) instead of 501(c)(3)? Applying for exemption under 501(c)(7) as a social club allows a group to pool their money in pursuit of an exempt purpose without being subject to an additional tax. This can be helpful when a group of individuals wants to build a recreational facility like a swimming pool or tennis court. Individuals who become members can contribute to purchase of the facility and utilize it according to the club's rules. 501(c)(3) organizations must spend their income on activities that further their exempt purpose, which is a charitable cause. 501(c)(7) social clubs' exempt purpose does not have to be charitable, but it must be social or recreational and non-profitable. Designation as a 501(c)(7) also allows the group to limit membership. Instead of operating like a business for the public, social clubs only serve members. If a group forms a social club and allows nonmembers to utilize its facilities, services, and/or programs, then the club must keep careful records of nonmembers' use. Social clubs must also ensure that nonmember income does not exceed the limits established by the IRS.

Do social clubs have to file annual returns? Yes, social clubs are similar to other tax-exempt entities in that they must file annual returns each year. The type of Form 990 is contingent on gross receipts and other factors.

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


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
