

Did you know? Trees in Woodburn Estates on public right of ways (that few feet between the curb and your property line in front and on the sides of corner homes) belong to the city, but homeowners are responsible for their care. Further, no tree in public right of ways may be removed without an approved city permit; but the city of Woodburn does not permit the removal of "street" trees without a compelling reason. If the tree is diseased, represents a safety hazard or is causing damage to curbs, streets or driveways, permission may be given by the city Engineer. However, if approval is given to remove a "street" tree, the city normally requires a new tree to be planted in its place. The city has an extensive list of trees that are or are not approved for public right of ways.

Some trees on private property also fall under strict rules regarding removal. Trees whose diameter exceeds 24 inches at a height of 5 feet are considered "significant". Significant trees on private property cannot be removed without an approved city permit, and that approval again requires some compelling reason for removal. Trees smaller than 24 inches on private property may be removed without an approved city permit, but still need an approved Architectural Request. Any tree that is removed must be cut down to ground level.

Any questions regarding planting or removal of trees should be referred to the Woodburn Public Works department or to the Architectural Committee who will work with you to ensure compliance with applicable Woodburn Development Ordinances.

Woodburn Estates Men's Golf General Meeting Minutes

Woodburn Estates Men's Golf General Meeting June 1, 2016

The Meeting was called to order by President Russ Krussow at 10 a.m. in the Dining Hall, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll Call: A quorum of officers was established. Officers and Committee Chairmen/Members present were: Russ Krussow, Jim Worley, Chuck Johnson, Fred Bourne, Stan Hiller, Clint Hansen, Bob Price, Gene Stiles, Allan Lindberg, and Steve Hobson. General Manager Tom Staskiewicz was also in attendance. A total of 25 members attended the Meeting.

President's Report: President Krussow requested members to volunteer to unload golf bags from vehicles of the non-member female participants at the Rose-A-Rama Golf Tournament the morning of Saturday, June 4th. Those volunteers should be in the parking lot as early as 7 a.m. Members volunteering to do this service were: Fred Bourne, Stan Hiller, Will Abshere, and Dennis Wichert. President Krussow reported that he had received some complaints from participants in the Memorial Day Mixed Tournament relative to the flags used on the greens. Rather than the normal red, white, and blue flags, patriotic white flags were used. The complaints were that it was impossible to know the location of the pin as all flags were the same color. It was recommended that pin placement sheets could be printed in advance and given to each foursome when the patriotic white flags are used in Mixed Tournaments. Members stated that they would still like to have the cart paths marked with paint with red, white, and blue paint to designate the 100 yard, 150 yard, and 200 yard distances to the middle of the greens. The Greens Committee representative, Fred Bourne, stated that this issue would be discussed at their next Meeting.

Vice President's Report: VP Paul Eaton was absent with notice.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Jim Worley reported that the balance of the Club funds beginning the month of May were \$2,322.77. During the month, \$677.92 was spent on Club expenses, a deposit was made in the amount of \$845.00, leaving a current balance of \$2,489.85. Jim also reported that we currently have 123 Men's Golf Club members compared to 117 members at this time last year.

Secretary's Report: Secretary Chuck Johnson had nothing to report.

Special Report on the Harvest Invitational Golf Tournament: Before the various Committees provided their reports, Dick Hammond, Co-Chair of this year's Harvest Invitational Golf Tournament, provided a detailed report on this tournament to be held on the 26th, 27th, and 28th of August. Dick first commended Fred Bourne on his excellent work in chairing several of the past Harvest Invitational Golf Tournaments. He also gave kudos to Stan Hiller, President Krussow and Fred Bourne for their help in preparing for this year's tournament.

Dick reported that prize money and other awards will continue to be similar to that of the past. There will be 2 Flights and payouts for the 3 low net scores and 3 low gross scores in each flight. There will also be an overall Gross Champion and overall Net Champion. These champions will be paid \$300 each. The three low gross and three net scores will be paid as follows: \$180 for 1st place; \$140 for 2nd place; and \$100 for 3rd place. This will not be a cash payout, but rather in the form of credit in the Pro Shop for select merchandise. In addition, there will be

special prizes awarded via raffle at each event attended relative to the tournament. Scoring in the tournament will be by the Modified Stableford Format. Scores of both partners will be added together as follows: 1 point for a bogey; 2 points for a par; 3 points for a birdie; 4 points for an eagle; 6 points for a double eagle; and 8 points for a hole-in-one. The handicaps allowed will be capped at 29 so that there will not be any double pops on the par three holes. On Sunday, August 28th, there will be a \$5,000 hole-in-one prize on hole number 9 and other prizes awarded for K.P.'s on the other par three holes. There will be other sponsors involved with the potential for other prizes to be awarded. The entry fee for the tournament this year will be \$90 with \$40 of that amount being refunded in the form of a gift certificate to the Pro Shop.

Dick then read the winners in each Flight in last year's tournament. The Flights this year will be called the "Spieth Division" (lower handicap players) and the "Bubba Division" (higher handicap players). Dick then provided details of the tournament as follows: Friday, August 26th...Practice round, plus an optional Horse Race with a \$20 entry fee...Saturday, August 27th...First day of the tournament, shotgun start of 9 a.m., followed by lunch provided by Gary's Barbecue on Wheels; at 1 p.m. there will be a putting contest, followed by the Calcutta betting beginning at 3 p.m. (based on Sunday score only, payouts in cash)...Sunday, final round beginning at 9 a.m., followed by lunch provided by Daniel's Mexican Catering of Eugene, OR; an awards ceremony to be held in the Auditorium will follow the dinner. Dick then concluded his report by stating that he had a list of some 12-15 non-members (mainly OGA golf course members) who would like to pair up with a member to play in this tournament.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

OGA: Chairman Paul Eaton was absent with notice.

Rules: Chairman Ron Hansen had nothing to report.

Sunshine: Chairman Bob Price reported that he had sent out cards to Mike Dykes, medical issue, and Dick Miller, surgery.

Tournaments: President Krussow reported that Salemtowne Golf Course has cancelled the planned Home and Home Play as there were no open dates at their golf course. He then stated that some members had requested an increase in the entry fees to play on Men's Golf Club Thursday Play, perhaps as much as \$5.00 rather than the \$2.00 now commonly paid. The members present agreed that on occasion an increase in the entry fee could be made, but that the \$2.00 entry fee should remain the rule rather than the exception. Members present also requested that on some of the Men's Golf Club Thursday Play that a skins game be played, an optional \$1.00 fee (handicap max of 27) and/or "K.P.'s" be used, again an optional \$1.00 fee to enter. President Krussow then announced that the Club's Handicap Championship Tournament will be held on June 23, 24, and 25.

Mixed Tournaments: Chairman Bob Price reported that the next Mixed Tournament will be held on Saturday, June 11th. Sign-up sheets are available in the Pro Shop and entry fee payment must be made at the time of the sign up. Bob also reported that water will be provided in future Mixed Tournaments in addition to the soft drinks.

Handicap: Chairman Clint Hansen stated that it would be wise to use the computer to score the Modified Stableford scoring format at the Harvest Invitational Golf Tournament instead of relying on individuals to determine the scoring. Clint stated he was pleased with the results of the Mixed Tournament held on Memorial Day as there was balance between flights. He also encouraged members to sign up for the upcoming Club Handicap Championship Tournament as this is the only tournament wherein anyone participating could win. We need to support and advertise this annual tournament. At this time, the top 16 golfers of the Handicap Tournament will move on to the annual Match Play Tournament. Clint would like to see perhaps as many as 32 golfers move on to the Match Play Tournament dependent on the participation in the Handicap Tournament. Clint then encouraged all golfers who participate in the "money games" held each week to ensure that all eligible scores be posted. When playing any round of golf, "gimme putts" should not be allowed to ensure that accurate scores be posted to reflect true handicaps. Overall, Clint is pleased with the handicap system as only one golfer remains on the "R" list (restricted list). Most golfers placed on the "R" list soon post sufficient scores to equal their restricted handicap number; thus, removal from the "R" list. Clint commended Co-Chair Allan Lindberg for doing a good job in assisting him. Co-Chair Allan Lindberg then informed members that if they ever have any questions regarding their handicap or the handicap system to feel free to ask him or Clint for an answer.

Minutes (cont.)

Membership: Chairman Stan Hiller reported that he recently played with a new move-in who is also a golfer. At this time, Stan has prepared 212 bag tags, 12 are pending, but we are still some 50 members short of last year. Stan then reported that on June 9th he will be "dressing in drag" to collect donations for the upcoming Relay for Life "Mr. Relay" contest.

Greens: Representative Fred Bourne began his report by stating he was disappointed that some members of our Club had chosen to play golf at another golf course rather than attend our Meeting. He then stated that golfers on the course in a drunken state should not be allowed as he recently had a negative experience with some inebriated golfers. Fred then discussed a common area asset, the gazebo. The repair of the gazebo has been in the Association's budget for the past two years. He mentioned that when he was a member of the past budget committee, \$16,000 was determined to be the cost to repair this valuable asset. He cited a recent report from the House Committee that made it sound like the gazebo is not repairable and could actually be a hazard. If so, Fred stated, the Association should not allow the gazebo to be used as any harm done to a member in using the gazebo could result in a lawsuit being filed against the Association. Fred went on to state that he believes the Board is being conned by contractors who would rather build a new gazebo for \$50,000-\$60,000 rather than settle for \$16,000 to repair this facility. A discussion on this subject ensued with various member comments favoring repair of the gazebo. Ron Aiken, who was a contractor and repaired and built many homes and structures, was adamant that the gazebo could be raised and the poles holding up the gazebo could readily be replaced. So why do we need a new gazebo other than to satisfy contractors who are seeking a bigger payday? Larry Kemper, a member of the House Committee, stated that he would apprise the House Committee of the opinions expressed by Fred, Ron Aiken, and others during our Meeting.

General Manager's Report: GM Tom Staskiewicz responded to the issues raised regarding the gazebo. He stated that the gazebo is not ready to collapse, but contractors who have inspected the gazebo have stated that they do not want the liability of repairing and replacing what they consider to be an unsafe structure. Tom stated that this issue is yet to be decided as repair may still be feasible, but replacing the gazebo in its entirety is still a possibility. Tom then discussed various businesses in our community who would readily sponsor events at our facility as our senior community is a "focused target market". Tom expressed his view that we could readily generate more revenue by merely marketing our community; thus, reducing member fees and assessments. He then discussed various events that could be sponsored by local businesses.

OLD BUSINESS: Secretary Chuck Johnson inquired as to why the signs indicating the location of rest rooms on our golf course had not yet been installed. Greens Committee Representative Fred Bourne responded that indeed the signs have been made and apparently it is not a priority for the maintenance crew to install the signs. Fred will follow up on this issue.

NEW BUSINESS: No new business.

CLOSING COMMENTS: Clint Hansen inquired as to why the 90 degree rule has not been enforced for the use of golf carts on the course. Clint was informed that our Golf Course Superintendent Tim O'Larey apparently has no problem with golf carts not following the 90 degree rule. Steve Hobson commented negatively on a Mixed Tournament last year that required 9 drives each in a two person modified alternate shot format. The Mixed Tournament Chairman Bob Price reported that this format will no longer be used in the Mixed Tournaments. Allan Lindberg requested that the golf course maintenance crew install new cups on the two greens at our Practice Range so the flags on these greens could remain upright. Larry Kemper inquired as to how we could get more members to attend our Men's Golf Club Membership Meetings. He proposed that perhaps the annual Men's Golf Club fees be increased to \$60 with \$20 being refunded if a member attends a minimum of 6 meetings in a calendar year. A discussion resulted wherein it was pointed out that some of our members are still employed and unable to attend and other members are only here for perhaps 8 months each year (Snowbirds) and, thus, it would not be fair to these members to expect them to attend 6 meetings within a calendar year. Clint Hansen did state that members who fail to attend our Membership Meetings certainly have no right to lodge complaints regarding motions passed by members attending said meetings.

CLOSING: President Krussow made a motion to adjourn our Meeting, the motion seconded, approved, and the Meeting was adjourned at 11:10 a.m.



Seasoning Thyme - Rhubarb: Good for What Ails You

Rhubarb is a perennial vegetable, though it is generally used as a fruit in desserts and jams. You only eat the stalks, which have a rich tart flavor. Leaves of this plant are poisonous, so be sure that they are not ingested. Rhubarb is easy to grow, but needs cool weather to thrive. Rhubarb - also called sweet-leaved dock or pie plant - is usually thought of as a fruit, but it actually is one of the few perennial vegetables in existence.

General Use: Rhubarb root has properties that make it a highly effective laxative. Its astringent qualities help to improve bowel tone after it has purged the intestines, making it an excellent agent for improving the tone and health of the digestive tract. Its laxative effects make it a valuable aid in the treatment of chronic constipation, hemorrhoids and gastroenteritis. Skin eruptions caused by problems in elimination are also treated with rhubarb root. The western rhubarb root, being milder, is used in treating infant digestive problems, constipation or diarrhea.

Interactions: Due to the possible loss of potassium, rhubarb root should not be taken in combination with cardiac medications, diuretics, other laxatives or cathartics or steroids. Loss of potassium from the system can be decreased by combining the rhubarb root with licorice root. For many new immigrants from England, just hearing the word rhubarb conjures up recollections of seaside boarding houses with land ladies serving up bowls of rhubarb and custard for "afters" and school dinners, which inevitably ended with a tart or crumble tasting of boiled rhubarb. (ugh!).

Although today we think of rhubarb chiefly as a food source, most of the plant's long history has been connected to its medicinal value. It is known for its properties toward good health.

RHUBARB LEMONADE

- 4-5 cups diced rhubarb, fresh or frozen
- 1- (6 oz.) can froze lemonade concentrate

3 cups water

¹/₄ to ¹/₂ cup sugar (depending on taste)


1 to 2 cups ice

1 (16 oz.) bottle chilled lemon-lime soda

Directions: Put rhubarb, lemonade concentrate, water and sugar into a large, nonreactive saucepan. Heat to simmer over medium-high heat, reduce heat to low, cover and cook until rhubarb is very soft, about 20 minutes. Press mixture through a fine-mesh sieve into a pitcher and discard pulp. Refrigerate until chilled, at least 2 hours. Pour rhubarb mixture over ice in a small punch bowl. Slowly pour in lemon lime soda and serve immediately. Serves 12. Delicious!



Swimming Pool Rules Are for a Reason

As the summer comes upon us increased visits from grandchildren and greatgrandchildren will become common place. We ask that you help enforce our pool and spa rules so everyone is safe and can enjoy our amenities. To review:

- 1. EVERYONE MUST TAKE A SHOWER BEFORE ENTERING THE POOL OR SPA;
 - 2. Children under 4 are not allowed in the pool at any time;
- 3. Those between ages 4 and 18 are allowed in the pool only between the hours of 11 am and 2 pm;
 - 4. Those under 18 are not allowed in the spa at any time;
 - 5. No jumping or diving is allowed in the pool at any time;
 - 6. No diapers in the pool or spa;
 - 7. Persons having open cuts or sores are prohibited from using the pool or spa;
- 8. Persons having diarrhea within the past 14 days are prohibited from using the pool or spa;
- 9. EVERYONE MUST TAKE A SHOWER BEFORE ENTERING THE POOL OR SPA; and
- 10. Scheduled activities have priority in the pool but cannot take over the entire pool.

Let's talk about these rules to help with the understanding.

We restrict use of the spa for two reasons. The first is the health of all involved and there are several pieces to the puzzle. We keep our spa temperature between 101 and 103 degrees. For children, spa water should be no hotter than 95 degrees.



The cooling mechanisms in a child's body are not well developed and they overheat much more quickly. The spatemperature desired by our members is simply too hot for a child. As a general rule if your child does go in a hot tub (not ours) you should have cold water available for them to drink to protect them from overheating. It's also a good idea to jump into the cooler pool water to help cool the body.

As to the times of day restrictions, our pool is primarily for the enjoyment of our members and we reserve the pool for their use.
