Having a Sign is Fine; but Your Sign Can Cause a Fine

A couple of weeks ago we had a late afternoon visitor, a member of the Woodburn Police Department. In his possession were two of the signs created for the Wolfer's Customer Appreciation Day. We had attached these signs to a stop sign in Woodburn Estates & Golf. The officer returned them and informed us the signs violated the Woodburn Sign Ordinance because they were attached to a stop sign. He went on to tell us each sign subjected us to a \$500 fine. There it was: a \$1,000 fine staring us in the face.

The crazy part was that not two weeks earlier, I had contacted the Woodburn Public Works asking questions about signs. I was told there was an ordinance but not enough staff to do enforcement. We were also told by the Woodburn Police Chief that sign enforcement was not a high priority and would go unnoticed. Both of these statements apparently were not told to the officer and my explanation didn't get the signs back up. Fortunately, we were not fined; but we were told we could not attach signs to City of Woodburn signposts or to utility or light poles.

The purpose of this article is to let our members know they cannot place signs for garage, yard, estate sales or any other type of sale on city signposts or utility poles. You can put out sandwich signs or signs mounted on stakes or other poles with the permission of the property owner.

Another sign issue is with homes for sale. As a property owner you can have only one for sale sign on your property. If you live on the golf course, the sign can be either in the front yard or back yard, but not both. If you want to post the for sale sign in your backyard, you can do that; but only one sign at a time. You can even move it from the front yard to the back yard and vice versa. But again, you may only have one sign at a time.

In fact, both the auditor and accountant said other HOAs should be looking for these opportunities to help offset costs and save members money.

It is not difficult to stay within the IRS guidelines for sponsorships and seminars. All they must be is a direct benefit to our members. If our members are beneficiaries, sponsorships do not jeopardize our non-profit status and, in fact, the income generated is not even taxable!

Seminars are another method to generate additional income and not jeopardize our non-profit status. If we have educational seminars on Social Security, Medicare or Medicaid, financial planning, trusts and estates, long-term care, AARP driving class, insurance, etc. these meet the requirement of benefitting the members of Woodburn Estates & Golf.

We are already seeing our members benefit from the Coffee Hour sponsors. No longer do our members pay \$1 for Coffee Hour. \$1 may seem a small price but when you step back and realize that's \$50 per year and our average attendance is about 100; that is a member savings of over \$5000 per year. It adds up!



Understanding Fines

Assessing and collecting fines is not a fun part of administering an HOA but it is an integral part of the process. The HOA Rules and Regulations are critical when it comes to ensuring the stability and continuity of our community and protecting your investment. Contrary to an opinion which some members have, your board can assess fines. The first reason is when you signed the membership application you agreed to abide by the HOA documents, including the assessment of fines and penalties; second the Oregon Legislature passed State Statutes, which gives all HOAs the authority to assess and collect fines. The statute is reprinted below:

100.405 (4)(k) Impose charges for late payments of assessments or, attorney fees for collection of assessments and, after giving written notice and an opportunity to be heard, levy reasonable fines for violations of the declaration, bylaws and rules and regulations of the association, provided that the charge imposed or fine levied by the association is based:

(A) On a schedule contained in the declaration or bylaws, or an amendment to either that is delivered to each unit, mailed to the mailing address of each unit or mailed to the mailing addresses designated in writing by the owners: or


(B) On a resolution adopted by the board of directors or the association that is delivered to each unit, mailed to the mailing address of each unit or mailed to the mailing addresses designated by the owners in writing.

Like most HOAs Woodburn Estates & Golf has a few members who, for one reason or another, fail to comply with the Rules and Regulations. Sadly, this takes time away from efforts to build and strengthen Woodburn Estates & Golf so instead your board and office staff end up chasing delinquent accounts and members who do not abide by the rules. Please know we are making a more concerted effort to address and resolve problems earlier in the process as a means to reduce the problems and prevent situations from getting out of hand.

Some of the common fines we are assessing include:

- Improper Parking or vehicle storage on personal property \$100/month
- Driving Golf Carts on Common Grounds without current Golf Tags \$100/ occurrence
 - Erecting or using a temporary structure on any Lot. \$50/day
 - Illegal Parking on Common Area and in RV lot. \$150/month
- Failure to comply with setback, maximum height, minimum yard, or minimum house size requirement. **\$150/month**
 - Renting a Home in Violation of the CC&Rs. \$500/month

In addition, if a member is assessed a fine and they do not pay, they are in violation of the rules and are no longer a member in "good standing" and are subject to revocation of their access to all facilities. Again, this is not what your board or office staff want, but the necessary actions will be taken to protect your association and investment.





House Committee Progress

Our projects are moving along at lightning speed. The storage building in the RV Storage area is in the last phase and was, most likely, completed earlier this week. The one remaining task was PGE connecting the electricity. The installation of the new windows in the Fitness Center around the swimming pool are in the final phase and by the time you read this the pool should be open and activities resumed. We will be replacing the doors along the south side but, at this point, that does not look like it will cause a pool closure. The new air conditioning units for the auditorium are scheduled to be installed by Wolfers. The office remodel is nearing completion and by all appearances, we will be under budget by over \$60,000; instead of the budgeted \$85,000 we will be closer to \$25,000. Frank Jamison and Frank Bathke have created a wonderful space and their efforts have saved us an incredible amount of money. The repairs to the golf building on Hayes are scheduled for late July/early August. The project will replace the siding, roof and windows. This building is in poor shape and the ability to survive another winter is questionable.

Three bids have been received for the conversion of the restroom in the main auditorium to an ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) compliant restroom. This is an important change for our members and for members of the public who

come to our auditorium. The entrance to the auditorium is being assessed to determine what changes are necessary so we can install automated doors to make things easier for our members. The required changes go beyond the doors and the entryway. As we consider making these changes, Federal, State and local laws require we address all the access issues. For instance, the curbs in the handicap area need to have openings for wheelchairs and walkers to pass without difficulty. Further assessment of the curbs show the curbs themselves must be moved back because the walkway is not wide enough for a wheelchair or walker. Many of the changes and improvements have issues, which are not easily recognized but create planning problems.

Currently we are looking for an architect to assist with the plans for the expansion of the fitness center. The goal is to almost double the size of the center to provide more equipment for the needs of our members. We have the opportunity to create a one-of-a-kind fitness center for our members and the 50+ community from Wilsonville to Salem. We are the only fitness center catering specifically to the 50+ market. Our members do not have to worry about competing with children, teenagers or even the 30 and 40 year olds. Our goal is to create a one-stop fitness center meeting the needs of pre and post op members all the way to the heavy lifters looking for a good physical work out, swimming pool, spa and private locker rooms. One of the items we have promised for the fitness center is a new NuStep machine. NuStep has been upgrading their offerings and we have been looking at a number of options to make the purchase. We appear to have the details worked out so we can move forward with the purchase. We appreciate your patience and look forward to making this portion of our membership much happier.

This has been a busy year for the House Committee and we still have six months to go! I will keep you posted as we move on to making Woodburn Estates & Golf even better.





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
