

Seasoning Thyme: Fennel

Fennel can clear mucus, help digestion and curb hunger

Fennel is both a culinary and medicinal herb. It is best known as a culinary herb because all parts of the plant are edible. Fennel not only improves digestion, but also can reduce bad breath and body odor that originates in the intestines. The fresh stems of fennel can be eaten much like celery and the seeds add a lovely anise flavor to fish and other dishes. Fennel also acts as an excellent digestive aid to relieve abdominal cramp, gas and bloating. If you expect to eat a vegetable that you have trouble digesting, like cabbage, try adding fennel seeds to your recipe. The Greek name for fennel was "marathon" which was derived from "maraino", which means to grow thin. There is a widely held belief that drinking fennel tea would have a slimming effect. Drinking a cup of fennel seed tea before eating a heavy meal can reduce your appetite as well.

Fennel teas are useful for chronic coughs and act as an expectorant to help clear mucus from the lungs. Syrup prepared from fennel juice was formerly given for chronic coughs. Oil of fennel relieves muscular or rheumatic pains and is warming and soothing in massage oil blends

Fennel tea:

To prepare herbal infusion fennel tea, pour 1 cup boiling water over a teaspoon of bruised seeds, strain into a cup to drink.

Fennel repels fleas and the anise taste may be more acceptable choice for indigestion and gas in finicky dogs and cats. Fennel has virtually no side effects when used as a food or as a seed tea. The essential oil should be avoided in pregnant and nursing mothers.

Fennel, with its pale green color and pleasant, aromatic aroma is said to symbolize flattery and to be an emblem of heroism. Most fennel originated in India, Egypt and china. It is one of the earliest known herbs and was often called the "mettin" seed. It was nibbled in church to curb the appetite or quiet a restless child. Chewing fennel stalks was regarded by the ancient Romans as a means of controlling obesity. It was hung from the rafters to bring good luck and put in keyholes to keep out ghosts and evil spirits.

RED PEPPER AND FENNEL BULB SALAD

Ingredients: 1 medium red bell pepper; 1/3 cup pine nuts, toasted; 3 tablespoons sesame seeds, toasted; 1 head leaf lettuce, rinsed, dried, and torn into bite-size pieces; 1/2 bulb fennel, diced; 2 tablespoons soy sauce; 1/4 cup vegetable oil; black pepper to taste.

Directions: Preheat broiler. Grill red pepper under the broiler until the skin is blackened, and the flesh has softened slightly. Place pepper in a paper bag or resealable plastic bag to cool. Remove the seeds and skin (the skin should come off the pepper easily). Slice into strips, Set oven to bake at 350 degrees. Place pine nuts and sesame seeds on a baking sheet and toast until beginning to brown. Combine lettuce greens fennel bulb, and red pepper in a small bowl, whisk together soy sauce and vegetable oil. Pour over salad and toss to coat. Sprinkle with pine nuts and sesame seeds, and season to taste with ground black pepper.

By the end of July the repairs or - more accurately - the reconstruction of the golf maintenance building on Hayes Street will be complete. For whatever reason this building has suffered years of neglect and was being held together by the

Earlier this year Larry Jones, Dawn R. Cole and Walt VanRheen took on the task of determining the state of the building. What they found was a total lack of attention and neglect. Larry's team received several bids based upon everything they and the construction companies could see from the visual inspection but when the job started, it was obvious more was required.

Remember back to the Fitness Center last year and all of the dry rot, black mold and mildew that was found. This building was in the same sad shape. Under the shingles and in the walls was dry rot, mold and mildew requiring several sheets of new plywood and repairing joists before new shingles could be installed along with new sheathing and insulation before the siding could be replaced. Happily, it is coming together and our members and the golf course crew will have a fully functioning building.

How does this happen? How do we get to a point of such neglect? The problems come because we have boards, committees and managers who do not embrace the responsibilities they have been handed. They do not take their jobs and commitment to the members and community seriously. Ultimately they say, 'Leave it for the next board or manager to solve'.

Whether it is a lack of fortitude or courage, these individuals fail to go before the members and say these repairs must be done. It's not always easy to recommend spending tens of thousands of member dollars to fix this or that, but those are the decisions to be made: popular or not. The cost of repairing this building is \$10,000 - \$15,000 more than would have been necessary had there been proper care instead of abject neglect.

Whether you have a favorable or unfavorable opinion of any of the individuals on the board is not important. The fact is: Right now you have a board and committees working together for the benefit of Woodburn Estates & Golf and you, the members.



First, let me say that I agree that our current rules are inconvenient at best. BUT, the Associate Rules and Regulations specifically prohibit any storage shed in excess of 100 CUBIC feet. For those who are mathematically challenged, that means something 4 feet wide, 7 feet tall, and 3 ½ feet deep. In other words, something the size of a shelving unit. And, non-conforming units cannot be grandfathered. Just because a storage unit in excess of 100 cubic feet was present on the property when you bought the home, it is still a violation of our Rules and Regulations and must be removed.

The document driving this restriction is our Declaration of Restrictions, which, as currently written, prohibits all sheds. The ones we currently permit are only allowed because they *are* the size of shelving units.

I am researching whether an individual clause of this document can be revised by resolution as I believe the original wording includes a typographical error leading to the restriction. But in the meantime, just remember that we will disapprove any shed in excess of 100 cubic feet, and if you erect one without asking permission, you will undoubtedly receive notification that it is in violation of our Rules.

Willis R. Grafe

Born August 13, 1920, in Mill City, Oregon, to Leroy and Gladys Grafe, Willis R. Grafe, 95, beloved husband of 64 years to Ann, father, brother, uncle, brother in Christ, colleague, and friend died July 17, 2016, in Woodburn.

A graduate of Gates High School, Grafe spent three winter terms at Oregon State College,

working springs and summers at a sawmill to pay his way through his first year of college. He received both BA and BS degrees from OSC (OSU) class of 1950! He signed up to go to the Yukon Territory and Alaska, working on the advanced survey crew for the Alcan Highway connecting the continental US with Alaska before serving with the Navy in Pearl Harbor during WWII. For more than 40 years he served as a civil engineer with the Federal Highway Administration, seven of them in the Washington DC office. A second career followed in the Linn County Engineer's office.

Grafe made his last vigorous hike at age 89, having backpacked the Grand Canyon. Led numerous hikes with the Chemeketans, and summited most of the Cascade peaks, including Mt. St. Helens before and after the eruption. He returned three times to the Yukon and was a white-water canoeing champion. Grafe was also the author of Gates and the North Santiam and An Oregon Boy in the Yukon.

In his civic life, Grafe served as president of the Oregon Association of County Engineers and Surveyors. In Mexico and Haiti he served as a missionary on water-development projects. He was active in Rotary - traveling to Haiti, and at age 89, to Thailand. He was a Woodburn Friends of the Woodburn Library volunteer, and he collected and delivered for the local food bank until age 92. For many years Grafe served as an elder at Mid-Valley Community Church in Woodburn.

He is survived by his wife Ann of 64 years; five children, David of Portland; Steven (Christina) of Goldendale; Carolyn of Vancouver, WA; Sandra (Gary) of Mesquite, Texas; Mary (Mark) of Richardson, Texas, and eight grandchildren.

A memorial service was held Friday, July 22, at Mid-Valley Community Church in Woodburn. Interment was at Fairview Cemetery in Gates, Oregon.




