Our History

Did you know that on June 6, Woodburn Estates & Golf, formerly known as Senior Estates Golf and Country Club, will be celebrating our 55th anniversary?

In June 1960, a \$10 million project with 1000 units was scheduled on 220 acres. A community center and a nine-hole grass golf course by the then named Senior Citizens of the West, Inc. were also planned.

The houses were to be sold to couples 62 years of age, with purchasers buying only the improvements (the buildings) The buyers would each get a 55-year lot lease from the corporation. A membership in the golf club was given with each house purchased and ownership of the course remained with the home buyers.

The City of Woodburn authorized an amendment to the zoning ordinance for a classification for the smaller homes and for the leased land in late June 1960.

The final plan showed 218.4 acres in the tract, with 159.5 acres in lots, 48 acres for the 9-hole golf course, 6.5 acres for a possible shopping center and 4.4 acres for the club house.

The first home, a model, was started on July 5th, 1960. The first day the lot was "dozed, foundation forms installed and concrete poured. Schedule called for completion within three or four days of the start. The open house occurred July 24, 1960, with about 700 people attending from 10:00 a.m. to 6:30 p.m.

At this event the term Woodburn Senior Estates was used, maybe for the first time, to describe the only planned retirement community in the state by the Senior Citizens of the West, Inc.

At the same time, it was announced that the lease plan would probably be changed to a purchase plan for the land. The buying public favored purchase of the land over leasing.

Under the lease agreement clarification was requested on the homeowner restrictions so that the association would have the power to enforce gardening, landscaping and building maintenance within the community.

Construction of new homes continued for over 20 years with 8 stages and an additional 9 holes for golf. The corporation known as Senior Estates Golf and Country Club was formed in June 1962.

Woodburn Estates Men's Golf Membership Meeting February 1, 2017

President Paul Eaton called the Meeting to order at 10 a.m. in the Dining Hall, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll Call: Paul Eaton, Will Abshere, Allan Lindberg, Chuck Johnson, Clint Hansen, Ron Hansen, Russ Krussow, Fred Bourne, Len Westphal, and Gene Stiles. A total of 22 members attended the Meeting.

President's Report: President Eaton reported that he had a productive meeting with Paula Kilgore, the Ladies Golf Club President. They mutually agreed that our Club and the Ladies Golf Club need to work together for the betterment of both Clubs. They agreed that an Ad Hoc Committee should be organized to review cart path repairs and paving. President Eaton reported that our Club will not be participating in the Portland Golf Show this year. He then informed the members that the HOA Board had approved an increase in the initiation fee (working capital fee) from \$2,000 to \$3,000 for each home purchased in our community. Paul recommended that as an incentive to have new residents become involved in golf that they be given a year of free golf for their first year of residency. Paul then stated that he was impressed with the current Board of Directors and asked that questions, concerns, and/or complaints from our members should be brought to his attention. carried unanimously. Larry Kemper then thanked the Committee responsible for the amendment of our Constitution/Bylaws. President Eaton stated that the Committee sought to simplify the amended governing document, making it easier for our members to read and understand. Larry Kemper stated that copies of the amended document should be made available to members by request. Secretary Johnson will respond to any requests and ensure that copies are available upon request. Allan Lindberg stated that the amended document could also be posted on the Association's Website. VP Abshere then reported that he would ensure that the date and time of our General Membership Meetings are posted in the News & Views. Will then gave a report on his efforts to organize a Men's Golf Club 9-hole Group to tee off at 11am on each Thursday. He will be placing an article in the News & Views regarding this 9-Hole Group, asking that any additional questions be addressed to him or the Pro Shop. Our Handicap Chairmen reported that the 9-hole participants could use their current 18-hole GHIN number and handicap which would avoid the need to obtain an additional 9-hole GHIN number and requisite fee.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Allan Lindberg stated that the current balance of our Club's funds (as reported by former Treasurer Jim Worley) is \$2,114.74. Allan reported that he had numerous checks that he would soon be depositing into the Club's account and that under "New Business", he would be making several motions regarding his role as Treasurer and Handicap Chairman.

Secretary's Report: Secretary Chuck Johnson had nothing to report.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

OGA: Our OGA representative, Paul Eaton, reported that the OGA is sponsoring a "Super Bowl Scramble" Golf Tournament at their course on Sunday, February 5, 2017, with a shotgun start of 9am. Entry fee is \$40 per person. Paul also reminded the members that Woodburn Estates & Golf is sponsoring a Super Bowl Party this Sunday, including viewing the game on a large screen, with pizza, soda pop, etc.

Greens: Committee representative Fred Bourne gave a brief report on the schedule of work to be performed by the golf course maintenance crew, including continued leaf cleanup, planting of the arbor vitae on the left side of hole number 11, and the refurbishing of the benches, signs and ball washers. Eventually, arborvitae are to be planted on the left side of the 8-hole near the green to protect players teeing off on the 9-hole. The former cart path on that side is being removed and for the time being, the area will be designated as "ground under repair" until reseeded. Fred stated that a review of our cart paths are being done with recommendations forthcoming as to work needed to be done. Our Golf Course Superintendent, Tim O'Larey, is aware of the drainage problems on hole numbers 2, 11, 12, and 17. For now, the area on the left side of hole number 2 will remain as "ground under repair". A future water hazard may be considered. During Fred's report, several questions were asked by members as follows: Stu Davis inquired as to the size of the new arborvitae to be planted on hole numbers 8 & 11. Fred responded that the arborvitae would undoubtedly not be over 12 feet in height and may not resolve the problem of balls going into the neighbor's yard on hole number 11. Larry Kemper asked about the condition of our sand traps, asking why white sand could not replace the existing sand and why some traps do not drain well. Fred responded that white sand was cost prohibitive and that some traps drain better than others

due to nearby existing water drains. Larry Jones inquired about the possibility of Club Checking Account audited annually in January when the December monthly adding additional sand traps on our course. Paul Eaton responded that the ladies and men golf clubs did not want additional traps, even forgoing a sand trap on hole number 14 that had been previously approved. Cost of creating additional traps is also an issue. Stu Davis stated that the golf course maintenance crew needs to be instructed on the proper raking of our sand traps as they rake the sand up to the edges and leave the middle of the traps relatively barren of sand. Russ Krussow stated that this is an issue brought up every year, but remains a problem.

Mixed Tournaments: Chairman Len Westphal had nothing to report.

Rules: Chairman Ron Hansen told of a rules violation that occurred when he was playing in a Match Play Tournament in the past. His opponent on the 18-hole, match all even, removed his marker from behind his ball on the green, replaced the ball, and then inadvertently picked up and replaced the ball again, incurring a penalty. Ron also discussed the rule that when a golfer authorizes someone to mark their ball on the green, it is mandatory that the same person authorized by the golfer replace his ball or said golfer receives a one stroke penalty. Failure to authorize another to mark their ball on the green is not a penalty, but rather an ethical gesture to ask the golfer for permission to mark their ball.

Sunshine: Chairman Ron Gripenstraw was absent with notice. Jim Worley gave Ron's report as follows: 3 cards were sent out in January...Get Well cards sent to Bob Musser and Lon Reed for medical procedures and a Sympathy card sent to Shirley Strong regarding the passing of her husband, Don. It was reported that Dick Hammond is having a medical procedure today and that Mark Deller recently had a medical issue. Gene Stiles, in attendance at the meeting, reported that he is feeling much better.

Handicap: Handicap Chairman Allan Lindberg reported that he, Paula Kilgore, Ladies Golf Club President, and our Golf Course Superintendent, Tim O'Larey, had made a tour of the front 9 of our golf course to review what work could be done in 2017 on our cart paths. There is a need to reseal the existing cart paths that are in good condition on the front 9. Allan welcomed input from other members relative to work needed on the front 9. Larry Kemper pointed out that the evergreen trees on the course have roots near the surface and if the roots are cut, the tree often weakens and collapses. Allan then explained that there is new software being developed regarding handicap scoring and responsibilities and the old software is being phased out. water lily pads. Most varieties have deep green leaves, but there are now a number of nasturtiums which are variegated, almost speckled. Nasturtium is the common name for tropaeolum majus, which is the name for any of various annual plants of the genus tropaeolum, which are native to Mexico, Central America and Northern South America.

Their peppery-tasting leaves and flowers are sometimes used in salads, and the young flower buds and fruit are sometimes used as seasonings. The spiciness of this flower is also a winning addition to cheese spreads. Both leaves and blossoms look and taste great in tea sandwiches. Make your own zesty vinegars by using the blossoms. Place same colored blossoms in a decorative bottle (5 blossoms per cup of vinegar) and cover with hot, but not boiling; white wine vinegar. Strain out the spent blossoms after the liquid has cooled and settled for a day. Replace them with fresh blooms to make an attractive gift. Most nasturtiums come in two forms: compact and trailing. The compact variety is low and bushy, useful as border plants. The trailing variety cascades dramatically down walls or tumbles brightly out of hanging baskets.


Being high in vitamin C, nasturtiums act as a natural antibiotic and as such were used topically as a poultice for minor cuts and scratches. Nasturtiums are also used in Ayurvedic medicine. The leaves are rubbed on the gums to stimulate and cleanse them. Because of the origins, early English herbalists referred to nasturtiums as "Indian Cress."

Recipe: Nasturtium Mayonnaise: 1 Cup mayonnaise; 1/4 tsp. finely minced garlic; 1 tsp. coarsely chopped capers; 1/3 tsp. grated lemon peel; 2 tsp. chopped nasturtium leaves. Combine all ingredients. Keep chilled until ready to use. This

recipe is the perfect complement to chilled summer salmon, or any fish fresh off the grill. It also makes great spread for tea sandwiches, or any sandwich needing some zip.



Sleep Aids

Do you ever have trouble falling asleep? I do, usually because I drank coffee too late in the day. Sometimes it is because I already slept in my lounge chair for a couple of hours. Or maybe my brain is working on something and just won't shut down.

Swedish author and behavioral scientist Carl-Johan Forssén Ehrlin has written a book called "The Rabbit Who Wants to Fall Asleep". Its purpose is to subconsciously encourage children to want to fall asleep. It even has directions telling the reader when to read slowly and when to yawn. Many parents have reported that it works. It is now a best seller on Amazon.

This book reminds me of the problems my parents (usually my dad) had in getting my two sisters and me to take naps. Dad worked swing shift at the pulp mill so was often home during the day and probably needed a nap himself. He would lie down on the bed with us three girls and had several methods of getting us to quit giggling and go to sleep. Sometimes he would tell us a story. At other times he would get us to think of something big, like an elephant. Then think of the elephant's ear. Then concentrate on a flea on his ear, and then a bacteria or a hair on the flea. Another method was to get us to take deep breaths and with each exhale, count backwards from 100. The secret is to get the mind focused. Once my youngest sister Florence wouldn't settle down, so dad took out his handkerchief and told her it was magic and would help her sleep. He put it over her face and told her to lie still, and of course she fell asleep.

In his later years, Dad often read to his grandchildren, often putting himself to sleep. When we heard the book hit the floor, we had to rescue the child and allow Dad to finish napping. Some people might count sheep, but the deep breathing and counting backward with each breath usually works best for me.

Good Things to Know

From Mayo Clinic

How many folks do you know who say they don't want to drink anything before going to bed because they'll have to get up during the night?

Heart Attack or Water: Drinking one glass of water before going to bed helps avoid stroke or heart attack.

I asked my Doctor why people need to urinate so much at night time. Gravity holds water in the lower part of your body when you are upright (legs swell). When you lie down and the lower body (legs and etc.) seeks level with the kidneys, it is then that the kidneys remove the water because it is easier. I knew you need your minimum water to help flush the toxins out of your body, but this was news to me. Correct time to drink water... Very Important.

From A Cardiac Specialist: Drinking water at a certain time maximizes its effectiveness on the body. 2 glasses of water after waking up helps activate internal organs. 1 glass of water 30 minutes before a meal helps digestion. 1 glass of water before taking a bath helps lower blood pressure. 1 glass of water before going to bed avoids stroke or heart attack. My Physician told me that water at bed time will also help prevent night time leg cramps. Your leg muscles are seeking hydration when they cramp and wake you up with a Charlie Horse.

Mayo Clinic on Aspirin: Dr. Virend Somers is a Cardiologist from the Mayo Clinic who is the lead author of the report in the July 29, 2008 issue of the Journal of the American College of Cardiology. Most heart attacks occur in the day, generally between 6 a.m. and noon. Having one during the night, when the heart should be most at rest, means that something unusual happened. Dr. Somers and his colleagues have been working for a decade to show that sleep apnea is to blame. If you take an aspirin or a baby aspirin once a day, take it at night. The reason: Aspirin has a 24-hour "half-life"; therefore, if most heart attacks happen in the wee hours of the morning, the Aspirin would be strongest in your system. Aspirin lasts a really long time in your medicine chest; for years. (When it gets old, it smells like vinegar).

Something that we can do to help ourselves: Bayer is making crystal aspirin to dissolve instantly on the tongue. They work much faster than the tablets. Why keep Aspirin by your bedside? It's about Heart Attacks. There are other symptoms of a heart attack, besides the pain on the left arm. One must also be aware of an intense pain on the chin, as well as nausea and lots of sweating; however, these symptoms may also occur less frequently. There may be NO pain in the chest during a heart attack.

The majority of people (about 60%) who had a heart attack during their sleep were not awakened. However, if it occurs, the chest pain may wake you up from your deep sleep. If that happens, immediately dissolve two aspirins in your mouth and swallow them with a bit of water. Afterwards: Call 9-1-1. Unlock your front door. Phone a neighbor or a family member who lives very close by. Say "heart attack!" Say that you have taken 2 aspirins. Take a seat on a chair or sofa near the front door, and wait for the EMTs arrival and please... Do **NOT** lie down!


