The following are a few reminders about our community:

1. Our community is governed by our documents that state that member complaints will be investigated after written complaints are filled out. (Rules and Regulations, Chapter 19).

The form to fill out for this is called the RULES REVIEW - COMPLAINT FORM. These Complaint forms can be found at several places. They can be found in a permanent box located outside of the association office, at the office or on our website at http://woodburnestatesgolf.com/ under FORMS.

After filling out the form, take it to the office, where it will be given to the chair for the Rules Committee. The Rules Committee will then investigate the complaint.

- 2. If you see something that is not right in our neighborhoods, you are the best eyes and ears, as we cannot act if we are not aware of a situation. However, please note that if this is a police matter, the best option is to call the police. If this is a non-emergency the number for code enforcement is 503-982-2345. If this is an emergency, call 911.
- 3. Under the FORMS tab on our website you may also find the governing documents. You should have received a copy of the governing documents when you moved here. They are entitled Articles of Incorporation, Declaration of Restrictions, Bylaws and the Rules and Regulations.

Men's Golf General Meeting Minutes

Woodburn Estates Men's Golf Membership Meeting March 1, 2017

President Paul Eaton called the Meeting to order at 10 a.m. in the Dining Hall, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll Call: Paul Eaton, Will Abshere, Allan Lindberg, Chuck Johnson, Clint Hansen, Fred Bourne, Len Westphal, Gene Stiles, and Ron Gripenstraw. Past President Russ Krussow was also in attendance. A total of 29 members attended the Meeting

Before beginning with Officer and Committee Reports, President Eaton turned the time over to Dick Hammond. Dick will be heading up the Harvest Invitational Golf Tournament scheduled for July 28, 29, and 30 of this year. Mr. Hammond began his report by thanking and acknowledging Stan Hiller and Fred Bourne for assisting him in the organization and running of this important tournament. Dick also thanked Janice Aiken, last year's Ladies Golf Club President, for her assistance and other Ladies Golf Club members who assisted in last year's successful Harvest Invitational Tournament. Dick then explained that last year they were able to raise around \$1,500 in sponsor fees and that around \$1,000 in sponsor fees has already been raised for this year's tournament. Food vendors will remain the same as last year, but instead of coffee and donuts on Saturday morning, Dick is hoping to have breakfast burritos from Daniel's Mexican Catering of Eugene, OR. The Friday Horse Race will be held again on Friday following the practice round and a putting contest will be held again after Saturday's play, followed by the Calcutta betting. Last year's Calcutta betting set an all time record. Dick then encouraged that, if possible, members provide items for raffle prizes. Fred Bourne pointed out that any donated items



should be in "like new" condition. The format for the tournament will again be a Modified Stableford format. There will again be two divisions and prize money awarded in both gross and net categories. In that the Harvest Invitational Tournament dates were changed from August 25, 26, and 27, Dick stated that the Men's Golf Club is

This will be a two man alternate shot tournament, shotgun start, with an entry fee of \$30 per team. Dick concluded his report by stating that he would continue to inform the members as to additional information regarding this important annual tournament.

President's Report: President Eaton reminded that as of today we are posting all postable scores. He also thanked the many volunteers that assist in the work of the Men's Golf Club. Paul then reiterated that any concerns or complaints from our membership should be addressed to him and he will ensure that the concerns/complaints are properly answered and resolved if possible.

Vice President's Report: VP Will Abshere had nothing to report.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Allan Lindberg reported that at the beginning of February, 2017, the balance of the Club's funds was \$2,114.74. Deposits during the month totaled \$3,775 and expenses totaled \$68.50 (cost of updating the plaques in the Golf Lounge), leaving a current balance of \$5,801.24.

Secretary's Report: Secretary Chuck Johnson had nothing to report.

Before beginning with Committee Reports, President Eaton asked if there were any new members of the Men's Golf Club in attendance. A gentleman by the name of Stan Arms then introduced himself as a new member, stating that he moved into our community about a year ago. Stan further stated that in the past he had been an Associate Member. The Club then welcomed Stan to our Meeting and our Club.

Committee Reports:

OGA: President Eaton, also our OGA representative, reported that the annual Tournament of Champions held at the OGA Golf Course, is scheduled for April 1-2, 2017. There is a March 22nd deadline for entering this tournament and our Club has always paid the entry fee for our Club champion to compete. Dick Hammond is our current Club champion and recently had a hip replacement. President Eaton then made a motion that the Club pay the \$145 entry fee for Dick Hammond to play in this tournament (health permitting), the motion seconded by Len Westphal, the motion carried unanimously. President Eaton stated that the Pacific Northwest Golf Association is seeking volunteers for their sponsored tournaments. Anyone interested as a volunteer can receive the volunteer forms from President Eaton. President Eaton reminded members that OGA has special golf and stay offers from various golf courses on their Web site. Currently, Ocean Dunes is offering a stay and play package of \$87.50.

Rules: Ron Hansen was absent with notice. VP Abshere gave a Rules Report by discussing the embedded ball rule and the overall winter rules as played by our Men's Golf Club in compliance with USGA rules. Larry Jones added that there are many new USGA rules that become effective in 2019. President Eaton discussed a recent rule change regarding accidental movement of a ball or marker on the green, stating that there is no penalty now for accidental movement of the ball or ball marker. He did note that pursuant to this rule, if the ball is moved by wind, gravity, or some other force of nature, there is no penalty, but the ball must be played from its new location.

Greens: Committee representative Fred Bourne reported that Golf Course Superintendent, Tim O'Larey, was on vacation when the Greens Committee had their last Meeting. Fred reported that the maintenance crew is focusing on cleaning up and keeping the cart paths open. He then reported that the Greens Committee is recommending that a USGA representative come to our golf course to design and make recommendations regarding our cart paths. The cost of having this done should be well worth the expense to ensure that the job is done correctly.

Mixed Tournament: Chairman Len Westphal reported that the Mixed Tournament Committee is comprised of himself, Allan and Diana Lindberg, Will Abshere, and Stan Hiller. Diana Lindberg has sent out letters to all past tournament sponsors and that McCully Realty and Woodburn Homes Realty

have already committed as sponsors for 2017. Len met with the new manager of Denny's and the new manager will contact upper management for approval to sponsor a mixed tournament in 2017. Len also stated that he is lining up a photographer to be available for the mixed tournaments. Len thanked Stan Hiller for creating posters for the mixed tournaments and thanked Steve Hobson for accepting the job of being in charge of table and chair setup for the post tournament dinners.

Handicap: Allan Lindberg reported that he had attended a Handicap Seminar wherein the new tournament handicap software was introduced. There were attendees from some 25 different golf courses. This new tournament handicap software will allow for many options regarding scoring, payouts, and live feeds during a tournament to reflect scores during the course of the tournament. Scores can be posted to a smart phone after each hole and then generated to a Webpage to show a current Leader Board. Co-Chair Clint Hansen will be installing the new software and run it in concert with our current software until familiar with the new software. Allan then reminded that today is the first day to post scores. He reiterated that scores are not to be posted if playing solo. If a golfer is aware that a duplicate score has been posted, they should contact Allan or Clint to have this error corrected.

Publicity: VP Will Abshere reported that the 9 Hole Men's Golf Club Group recently organized has had 17 golfers sign up already with more to sign up when the "snowbirds" return. This 9 Hole Group will be playing each Tuesday, first tee time of 9:30 a.m., playing either the back or front 9 depending on the 9 holes the Ladies 9 Hole Group are playing that day. Men's Golf Club members can play both on Tuesday in the 9 Hole Group and also on Thursday during the 18 hole play. The handicap for 9 holes will be half of the 18 hole handicap as established on the day of play.



growing, usually perennial herbs; a few are biennials. Most species grow 25 to 50 centimeters (10 -20 inches) tall, but some are as short as 5 centimeters and others as tall as 120. Many species are cultivated for their attractive five-petal flowers, which may be red, pink, purple, blue, white or yellow. Pimpernels are also in the primrose family. The evening primroses are a group of yellow-flowered plants that range from short "sundrops" to the tall similar ones. Unlike the roadside weed, oenothera biennis, O. Lamarckiana, makes a good meadow plant. Flowers open in the afternoon and are closed by next morning.

The primrose is a very interesting plant that is edible and actually tastes like lettuce. You will find that there are a lot of other uses for the primrose that involve food and drink or bouquets and arrangements. The primrose is also known as the English primrose and is a beautiful flower. You will find that this flower really is a special one and it looks great. The floral meaning of this flower is special and basically tells people that you can't live without them, so this is a great flower to give as a gift to the one that you really love.

One thing about the primrose that makes it different from a lot of other flowers is that the primrose is edible and tastes good. There are a lot of people that will use it to cook with or to eat raw and brew tea.

Here is an optional extra (but well worth the small additional effort) and is brilliant for using up any primrose flowers you have left over, any that were crushed in the journey from hedge to home and any that were damaged in any other way. The only skill you need to make this delicious flower syrup is patience...

PRIMROSE HONEY

Ingredients: Whatever primroses you have left over - aim for half a cup. 200g caster sugar. I pint water. Directions: Warm the sugar and water and stir to help the sugar dissolve. Add your primrose flowers and bring gently to a boil, reduce the heat to a slow simmer and leave to reduce for three hours. The syrup will become a sticky caramel color like a darkened honey. The flower petals will form semi-solid marmalade-style pulpy 'clumps' which means, once you have

drained the syrup to use as you would normally use honey, you can keep this solid matter back and use as a sweet spread for toast, cake fillings or to top ice cream.



From the Rules Committee

We live in a beautiful community, but sometimes we need a couple of reminders.

There have been at least two mass mailed postcards sent out recently to some members of Woodburn Estates & Golf asking members to contact a company and a website and asking for information.

One of the letters has been taken to the Woodburn City Post office and copies made for their investigation and the other has been notified by phone.

Remember these few tips:

- **DO NOT ANSWER** requests by mail, phone or emails from companies or people who you do not know, and if you did not request the information.
- **DO NOT ANSWER** if you do not know the phone number. The caller will leave a message if it is important and you can call back only if you believe it is legitimate.
 - DO NOT LET strangers into your home.
- **DO NOT CALL** back a number if a caller or message says that you need to call about you credit card or bank account. Instead, call the number on your credit card or bank card directly and ask them if they have a message for you.
- **DO NOT RESPOND** to someone calling or emailing, and saying that they are your grandchild or child and they need money. (Grandparent Scam) Call your family member direct to see if any problems are true, if a troubling message is left about a loved one.
- **DO NOT CLICK** on emails that look odd, is the not the normal way your friend writes, or you feel concern about. It is better to DELETE and call your friend.
- **DO NOT CONTINUE** the conversation with a stranger on the phone if you do pick up.

- · Asks you to wire money or buy a prepaid card.

- Asks for your usernames, passwords, account numbers or your home address.
- Says the offer is only good for today.
- Asks you to keep the call a secret.


