Spring is Clematis Time

Spring is a good time to plant a clematis. There are many from which to choose. They vary in size, color, type of flower and their preference for shade or sun. For example, their size can range from a foot tall perennial, to shrubs, to a 30 foot vine, and everything in-between. And remember, the size listed on the tag usually refers to how tall they grow in the Eastern U.S. and they will usually grow larger in the Willamette Valley as our conditions are ideal for most clematis.

There are many colors available, from reds to pinks, to blues and lavenders, to dark purples and reddish purples, to whites and yellows. Some are a combination of colors. There are large-flowered, small-flowered, double-flowered and a number of bells.

Most of the larger vine types prefer to be planted as deep as 18 inches to get the root ball below frost level. Most like regular watering and feeding with rose fertilizer every month during the growing season and can be pruned after they flower to keep them in bounds. Deadheading the flowers will promote more blooms. If you plan, with a variety of clematis, you can have something blooming every month of the year. Many will adapt to pot culture.

To see clematis growing and flowering in the landscape, visit the Rogerson Clematis Garden at Luscher Farm on Rosemont off of Stafford Road in Lake Oswego. They have the largest collection in the U.S. They also sell plants. Another place with a display garden and a variety of plants for sale is Joy Creek Nursery in St. Helens. They also offer new ones hybridized in Japan. Locally, my garden is open for visitors. I have over 60 varieties and a number of unusual ones you won't see at the local nurseries.

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Men's Golf General Meeting Minutes

Woodburn Estates Men's Golf Membership Meeting June 7, 2017

President Paul Eaton called the Meeting to order at 10 a.m. in the Dining Hall, followed by the *Pledge of Allegiance*.

Roll Call: Paul Eaton, Will Abshere, Allan Lindberg, Chuck Johnson, Ron Hansen, Len Westphal, Ron Gripenstraw, Clint Hansen, Stan Hiller, and Fred Bourne. Past President Russ Krussow was also in attendance. A total of 33 members attended the Meeting.

New Members: Before beginning with the Officer and Committee Reports, President Eaton asked if there were any new members in attendance. Three new members introduced themselves as follows: Dick Miller, Bob Trojak, and Mike Archer. These new members were welcomed by members present and President Eaton. President Eaton then informed them of daily games that are played on our golf course around 10 a.m. and at noon on several days of the week. He invited and welcomed the new members to participate in these games.

President's Report: President Eaton stated that he needed volunteers to set up tables right after our Meeting as the Ladies Golf Club is having a luncheon after their play today. President Eaton then discussed several issues that had been brought to his attention as follows: The General Manager has prepared eligibility requirements to participate in the Oregon Trail Program, a matter that will be discussed in more detail by our Vice President, Will Abshere, in his report today. Another matter brought to President Eaton's attention was a request by a member that a cover be placed over our Practice Range to allow practice during inclement weather. President Eaton stated he had discussed this matter with member Randy Soelberg and Randy informed him that an engineer would likely be needed to design the cover if over a specified size for safety reasons, a requirement of the City of Woodburn. Discussion ensued with mixed opinions as to the need for such a cover. Russ Krussow pointed out that the balls hit on the range would still need to be picked up, regardless of the weather. Russ would not be in favor of such a cover if cost prohibitive. Allan Lindberg stated he would like to see a cover installed to allow for practice during inclement weather. President Eaton will involve the Association's House Director if the membership agrees that this matter should be pursued.

Vice President's Report: VP Will Abshere stated that he had just spoken to GM Tom Staskiewicz just prior to our Meeting regarding the proposed eligibility requirements to participate in the Oregon Trail Program. VP Abshere recommended that the Greens Committee be involved in the approval or amending of the proposed eligibility requirements as written. A discussion ensued with Allan Lindberg pointing out that when the Oregon Trail Program was first initiated it was meant to be used only by those residents of our community who had paid the annual dues for golf. Fred Bourne stated that many of the golf courses in the Oregon Trail Program would welcome participation by any resident of our community, not just those who had paid annual golf dues. Jim Worley verified that currently only golfers who have paid the annual golf dues are eligible to participate in the program. The eligibility requirements will be a topic of discussion in the next Greens Committee Meeting. VP Abshere then questioned who determines the placement of the "drop areas" on the 9th hole? Apparently, the drop areas are marked by the golf maintenance crew as directed by the Golf Course Superintendent and our Golf Pro. VP Abshere then asked which drop area should be utilized when a ball is located within the blue lines near the cart barns. Len Westphal responded that the drop area to be used is based on the closest drop area to where the ball lies within the blue lined area.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Allan Lindberg provided the following report: Opening Balance: \$4,102.24; Deposits of \$405.00; Expenses of \$1,175.00 (golf balls with our Logo totaled \$300; OGA fees paid for 29 members @ \$35.00 each totaled \$875.00); Ending Balance: \$3,332.24.

Secretary's Report: Secretary Chuck Johnson stated he had nothing to report. **COMMITTEE REPORTS:**

OGA: President Eaton, also our OGA Representative, stated that the OGA has partnered with the Affinity Travel Agency to provide golf travel packages. The OGA has established a "Refer a Friend Program" wherein if a member refers a friend to the OGA who then becomes an OGA member, the member providing the referral is provided a free round of golf at the OGA along with the friend who has joined the OGA. Other rewards offered in the program would be \$25 off certain events held at the OGA or \$25 off the cost of the Passport Program. President Eaton then reported that there is a new teaching and assistant pro at the OGA by the name of Tyler Morris. OGA is also currently hiring starters and hosts at their golf course.

Handicap: Chairman Allan Lindberg has requested that all members place their score cards in the white box during an audit period of June 1 thru June 15. On occasion, the Handicap Chair and Co-Chair will be making this request for audit purposes. Many of the members present were not aware of this request, but will now comply until the end of the audit date of June 15.

Greens: Committee Representative Fred Bourne stated that the arborvitae trees have been installed on the left side of the 11th hole. At a later date, planting will be completed. The installation of protective netting on hole number 9 is still under discussion. The stump grinding has been scheduled and the front 9 is closed

this week for punching/sanding and the back 9 will be closed next week. The roots on the cart path have been ground down, making the cart path surface much smoother. Drainage issues on holes 12 and 17 are yet to be addressed.

Mixed Tournaments: Chairman Len Westphal requested volunteers to set up tables in the breeze way at 7 a.m. for this Saturday's Mixed Tournament. Will Abshere and Mike Archer volunteered for this task. Servers have been trained/ certified pursuant to OLCC requirements. Lorrie Cox of Woodburn Homes Realty has agreed to sponsor the July 4th Mixed Tournament. We thank her for now sponsoring two of our Mixed Tournaments. Chairman Westphal stated that entry fees for all Mixed Tournaments after the July 4th Tournament will be raised from \$16 to \$18 per participant. Also in future Mixed Tournaments, there will be no beverage tickets issued. It was pointed out that during the last Mixed Tournament dinner the announcement of winners in the various flights were given while people were in line for dinner, making it difficult to hear the announcement. It was recommended that the announcement of winners be given either before dinner begins or after everyone has gone thru the dinner line and returned to their table. Chairman Westphal stated that he had difficulty with our sound system and it was recommended that he consult with Walt VanRheen regarding problems with the system.

Rules: Chairman Ron Hansen discussed several rules regarding proper identification of a golf ball, including how the ball is lifted and replaced to identify said ball. During Match Play playing the wrong ball results in loss of that hole. In Stroke Play, playing the wrong ball results in a 2 stroke penalty.

Sunshine: Chairman Ron Gripenstraw reported that he sent a card to Virgil Burk regarding a medical issue. He will be sending out two cards this month as follows: Vern Hamilton, medical issue, and Jim Taylor, medical issue.

Membership: Chairman Stan Hiller stated that golfers paying the annual golf dues is about ten less than one year ago.

Publicity: Chairman Will Abshere had nothing to report.

Door Prizes: Chairman Gene Stiles was absent.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS: Stan Hiller inquired as to voucher money not claimed by men golfers at the end of a calendar year. He was informed that in a past Meeting the Men's Golf Club voted to have the unclaimed voucher money returned to the Men's Golf Club Treasurer for deposit in our account.

NEW BUSINESS: President Eaton verified that the proper planting of the arborvitae will be completed in the near future. The upcoming Spring Handicap will qualify the top 32 players to play in the annual Match Play Tournament. Handicap Co-Chair Clint Hansen stated that during the Match Play Tournament, handicaps will be capped at 36 and that participants must properly fill out their score cards to prevent disqualification. Fred Bourne, a member of the End of Watch and Harvest Invitational Tournament Committees, made the following motions: Motion 1: I move that the Men's Golf Club provide the funds to purchase the insurance for a \$5,000 hole-in-one for the End of Watch Tournament, a cost of \$194, motion seconded by Will Abshere. Following discussion, the motion was approved with only one nay vote. Motion 2: I move that the Men's Golf Club purchase a new golf bag at the cost of \$135 to be given as a prize at the Harvest Invitational Tournament. Motion seconded by Stan Hiller. Following discussion, Jim Worley stated that he would personally provide the new golf bag; thus, this motion was tabled. Motion 3: I move that the Men's Golf Club provide the funds to purchase the insurance for a \$5,000 hole-in-one for the Harvest Invitational Tournament, a cost of \$194. Motion seconded by Ken Bourne. Following discussion, the motion was passed by majority vote of the members present.

CLOSING COMMENTS: Fred Bourne reminded that our Club provided two teams to participate in this year's fundraiser golf tournament held at the OGA to benefit the Woodburn High School Boys and Girls Golf Teams. Fred stated that the High School golf teams were grateful for our participation and that the Girls Golf Team qualified for the State Tournament, the first time in the history of Girls Golf at Woodburn High School that they were able to qualify and play in said Tournament. Clint Hansen stated that the Santiam Golf Course in Stayton has a quality USGA sign at the first hole and he would like our course to install a similar sign. Fred Bourne reported that the End of Watch Golf Tournament to be held on Saturday, August 12th, is a Correctional Peace Officer Fundraiser, with the \$40 per person entry fee (\$50 per person for guests) going directly to raise funds for disabled officers and/or families of officers who lost their life in the line of duty. Chuck Johnson stated that he had written an article to be published in the next News & Views wherein he appealed to the Ladies Golf Club, the Mixed Tournament Committee, the Friday Funnies, and the Sundowners Group to allow all ladies to play from the new forward tees as soon as the rating of these new tees is received from the OGA.

Closing: President Eaton moved to adjourn the Meeting, seconded by Bob Price, the motion approved, and the Meeting was adjourned at 11:20 a.m.


