





I'd like to use this opportunity to encourage everyone to look at the reader boards scattered around the complex. They provide a quick way to stay up-to-date on upcoming activities. Also, on the bulletin board in the office lobby is a list of projects that will be starting soon. Some will be affecting access to parts of the complex.

Agenda: President Jim Taylor then asked if there were any additions or corrections to the agenda.

TREASURER'S REPORT-Director Chuck Johnson:

The balances reported today were reconciled with bank statements and balance sheets and ledgers provided by Woodburn Estates bookkeeper as of April 30, 2017.

Our Operating Account balance as of April 30, 2017, was \$1,026,866.54.

Our Reserve Account balance as of April 30, 2017, was \$1,037,494.25.

I meet with our General Manager, Tom Staskiewicz, on the first and third Tuesday of each month to review revenue and expenditures relating to both our Operating Account and our Reserve Account. Each month I receive a report as to our Accounts Receivable from bookkeeper Julia Senter that provides me with a current accounting of money owed to the Association by our members. This is a record of delinquent accounts and does not include the payment of one half of a member's annual assessment, a practice wherein members may pay one half of their annual assessment by January 31st each year and one half of their annual assessment by July 31st each year.

The Accounts Receivable statistics presented today were determined as of May 19, 2017. On this date, the balance of our Accounts Receivable was \$56,611.54. This balance represents a reduction of \$10,225.15 when compared with the balance as reported last month. I will be presenting at least one payment plan submitted by a member to our Board in Executive Session today. The Board has approved payment plans in the past to allow members with financial hardships to become current with their annual assessment within a reasonable time frame and before the next year's annual assessment is due. We currently have 63 delinquent accounts, a reduction of 8 delinquent accounts when compared with last month's report. Our attorneys are currently handling 6 delinquent accounts in an effort to collect the money owed to the Association. These 6 delinquent accounts total \$12,297.48.

This is the first time that I am aware of that we have over a million dollars in both accounts mentioned above in this report.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS: None.

NEW BUSINESS:

Director Chuck Johnson motion #1: I move to approve the May 23rd Treasurer's Report. Seconded and approved.

Director Larry Jones motion #1: I move to approve \$8,000.00 for new carpeting in the Auditorium foyer. The low bid came from J/K Carpet Center in Salem, Oregon in the amount of \$6398.00 for removing old carpet and installing the new carpeting. Seconded and approved.

Director Larry Jones motion #2: I move to approve this amended motion of \$23,000.00 amended to \$33,000.00 to Salem Seal Coating for repairs to our parking lots at the Community Center. We received 4 bids for the completion of this job. Our bids ranged from \$17,445.00 to 27,214.00. Seconded and approved.

Director Larry Jones motion #3: I move to amend motion #2 to approve an additional \$10,000.00 or \$33,000.00 total to Salem Seal Coating for addition work that needs to be done at this time to our parking lots. Seconded and the amended motion was approved.

Director Allan Lindberg motion #1: I move to approve Karen Ewing as handicap replacing Marlene Johnson. Seconded and approved.

President Jim Taylor requested that a motion be made to approve the special minutes for 4-7-17. Seconded and approved.

President Jim Taylor requested that a motion be made to approve the minutes for 4-25-17. Seconded and approved.

President Jim Taylor requested that a motion be made to change all the future Board Meetings to be held at 1:30 p.m. Seconded and approved.

Director Janice Aiken motion #1: I move to approve and pass the following addition to the Rules and Regulations, section 3.4, which has been posted since the April meeting. Seconded and approved.

Members must allow up to 10 (ten) days to return the security cleaning deposit so that verification of the check clearing the banking institution can be done by the association office.

The deposit is subject to loss if an event is canceled less than 72 hours before the

date of the event. Seconded and approved.

Director Janice Aiken motion #2: I move to approve and pass the following additions to Section 12.2 of the Rules and Regulations, which has been posted since the April meeting. Seconded and approved.

12.2-3 Residence Trash Containers

Perishable garbage shall be removed before it becomes offensive and shall not let it accumulate on or about the premises.

12.2-3(a) Garbage containers shall be sturdy, watertight, not easily corrodible, and rodent-and-insect-proof.

12.2-3(b) When not being emptied or filled, the container shall be kept tightly closed and out of the city right-of-way within 24 hours of the garbage collection, and placed to the side or back of the residence.

EXCEPTION – Members who have obtained specially marked disabled containers from the local refuse collector may keep those containers in front of the garage for weekly collection. The containers must have tight fitting lids and have no overflow garbage showing from the street or to the neighbors.

The exception may be denied by the association if complaints are made by members if the member stops garbage collection or had continued issues with overflow.

Director Janice Aiken motion #3: I move to approve and pass the following deletion to Section 12.3 of the Rules and Regulations as a duplication of 12.2, which has been posted since the April meeting. Seconded and approved.

12.3-3 Parking

Lawns, sidewalks and unpaved parking surfaces. Parking is prohibited on lawns, sidewalks or unpaved parking surfaces.

Director Janice Aiken motion #4: I move to approve and pass the following addition to Section 13.1 Recreational Vehicle Lot of the Rules and Regulations, which has been posted since the April meeting. Seconded and approved.

Moveable, as defined in this section, means that the owner is able to drive down and drive away, reload or hook up and move their unit, as required by the association. It is advisable that the owner has an emergency contact on file who may move the unit if the owner is unable to move the unit in a situation requiring a move.

Director Janice Aiken motion #5: I move to approve and pass the following addition to Section 13.12 Recreational Vehicle Lot of the Rules and Regulations, which has been posted since the April meeting. Seconded and approved.

13.12 Misc. Personal Item Storage

Personal property (delete: may not be) stored outside or underneath owner's unit(s) are at the risk of the owner. The following are NOT allowed – flammable, corrosive, or explosive materials. (delete: Item(s) may not be visible on open trailers)

Director Janice Aiken motion #6: I move to approve and pass the following motion to the Rules and Regulations, adding section 2.10 which has been posted since the last regular board meeting with one change as noted on outside servers – change #11 to Member Groups and Committee rules above, which has been posted since the April meeting. Seconded and approved.

ALCOHOL RULES:

MEMBER GROUPS and Committees

Woodburn Estates & Golf has a limited-on-premises alcohol license. (ORS 471.178). Woodburn Estates & Golf will uphold the rules from OLCC (Oregon Liquor Control Commission) that applies to our license.

- a. Wine may be brought to club and organized events but must be corked (opened) by Oregon State Certified servers.
- b. Beer must be purchased and opened on site through Country Cottage or the Pro Shop, or as part of an association event.
- c. Clubs, and event organizers, will determine procedures to comply with the corking requirement.
 - d. No hard liquor is allowed on the premises.
 - e. At least 2 (two) substantial food items must be served.

OUTSIDE Servers - Must comply with all rules under #11. Member Groups and Committee rules above.

Events that bring in outside servers MUST provide the following to the office BEFORE THE EVENT.

- 1. Names of Servers and proof of a valid server's permit.
- 2. Temporary Sales License signed by the City of Woodburn.
- 3. A list of at least 2 substantial food items that will be served, as required by ORS rules.

8.1-1 Size and use

Members and Established groups or organizations of the Association may post ads and signs $3\frac{1}{2} \times 5$ ", or $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$ "on bulletin boards. Larger ads and signs, and those from non-members must be approved by the Activities Chair of the Board of Directors before posting.

8.1-2 Material & time limit

Members ads no larger than $8 \frac{1}{2} \times 11$ " must contain the member's number, be signed and dated, and may be posted or displayed no more than thirty (30) days.

Add Heading for – 8.2 COMMON GROUNDS

8.2-1 Sign locations

Except for the "hours of operation sign" and emergency phone numbers, no sign, placard or other written or printed material may be posted on the windows, glass cases at the entrances, or doors. Oregon State law stickers, such as No Smoking may be added by the association, as needed.

8.3-1 Construction signs

A sign may be posted advertising the company working on a member's lot while work is in progress. The sign must be removed when the job is completed. [12/8/2015]

8.6 Other signs No outside signage on common area is allowed unless it is an approved sponsored event. See 8.1 for exception. [12/8/2015] – Moved to section 8 2-2

ACTIVITIES-Malena Turner: The committee met and discussed the 2017

calendar as the main agenda item. The June Health Fair has been moved from June due to the roof repairs planned in

the auditorium. The new date is now planned for September 8th. A blood drive has been added on June 1, 2017 in the dining hall in conjunction with coffee hour. Sharyn added a telephone / smart phone class to help our members learn more about our smart phones. This event will be June 2, 2017 with more information

Sharyn noted that she plans on trying to get a recycling spokesperson to come and talk about what members and the association might do.

National Night Out was discussed with the possibility that Activities will add a potluck at the clubhouse, in addition to those members who offer it at their homes. The date is August 1.

The Activities committee wondered if an alternate day of the week might help increase the pool players in the pool room. Malena will talk to Christy about a different day of the week.

There is a need for new bulletin boards in the swimming pool area, a place to hold the swimming noodles and to allow them to dry between use and perhaps a small rack or container. A motion was made to spend up to \$150 with Sharyn Cornett checking out the items to accomplish these needs.

The Activities committee has been busy this year with much more planned.

Upcoming events are: June 1 Blood Drive; July 9 the Show and Shine Car and Motorcycle Show, and July 22 Picnic at the Gazebo.

ARCHITECTURAL-Director Dawn Cole: Since the March Board of Directors meeting there have been 37 Architectural Requests and 15 Compliance Requests.

GAZEBO – The House Committee is taking the time provided by the roofing project and others, to re-evaluate our needs and look at alternate designs of Gazebos/ Pavilions that are a bit less elaborate than our current. From suggestions given to us by a few of our members, we recently looked at a design in Molalla and I have worked with the city engineer to get a copy of their drawings and costs for the project.

Currently we have identified two additional designs we will look at in Keizer and Sah-Hah-Lee on golf courses there where they have similar structures for their members. We will report back as we gain more information.

FACEBOOK-Director Allan Lindberg: We are updating daily with something new and the activity remains about the same with a few new viewers and followers each month.

GOLF-Director Paula Kilgore: Rounds Played for April 2017: Total 18-holes rounds played 801; 9-holes rounds played 309; Yellow Tee rounds played 20; Guest 9-holes rounds played 17; Guest 18-holes rounds played 23. Total rounds played 1,170, and total rounds played YTD 2,705. Oregon Trail golf program had 3 rounds

GREENS-Director Paula Kilgore: We met on May 8. Present was Paula Kilgore, Fred Bourne, Chuck Siver, Allan Lindberg, Will Abshere, Tim O'Larey, Tom Staskiewicz and Sally Carter

Report by Tim O'Larey: (1) Working with a new nursery for Arborvitae replacements for hole #11. Estimate need of 55 Arborvitae for fence line at \$124 each attempting to get 20% discount bring the price down to \$99. (2) Still waiting for the supplier to get back with the cost of netting for #9. (3) Stump grinder scheduled for this week. After cleanup of debris and fill in of dirt, we will fill with crushed gravel. Storm cleanup is progressing, pin oak on #16 is left. Mowing continues as rough areas dry out. (4) Aerification on the course is delayed, target date has been moved to June.

Review of USGA Report: (1) Forward tees are in, the rating will be Wednesday, May 10. (2) Bids received from Arborists in the area. Discussion followed. (3) Some of the items will need to be completed this year, and others added to the Master Plan years 1 thru 5, others to the 30 Year Master Plan. (4) Flat Paths will be here within the month to start smoothing out tree roots in cart paths. (5) The two pine trees on #7 that are under the maple trees will be removed to protect the health of the Maple trees. The Spruce tree at the 150-yard marker on hole # 6 will be removed to protect the health of neighboring Fir tree and to save the cart path from further root growth damage. The Cottonwood trees by the green on hole #12 are causing pink mold on green and need to be removed. (6) Discussion of the need for a sit-down bench by the tee box of hole #6. Discussion of the need for better drainage between hole #12 and #17. More discussion about the need for a signature hole on our golf course. The committee thought hole nine would be a good candidate because it can be seen from the restaurant. We need to have designated entry and exit points from cart path to the fairways in several areas to control golf car traffic. Also discussed was bunker rakes, and solutions for the wet area and blockage of freeway wall on #2 followed. (7) Tom Staskiewicz will have a report and guidelines for the Oregon Trails program at next Greens Committee meeting.

HOUSE-Director Larry Jones: The House Committee met on April 4, 2017 and April 18, 2017 for planning on the projects we are currently working on. Walt

VanRheen, Dawn R Cole & Becky Butts were present along with Tom Staskiewicz and Frank Jameson.

Trying to keep everyone informed on the status of the new auditorium roof. The work is scheduled to start around the first of June. We need a break in the weather that would allow a few rain free days for the removal of the existing roof. Once we can get the roof off Snyder Roofing can find out if we have any further problems that the leaking has caused. If there are no hidden problems the roof should not take any longer that 2 weeks.

With everything that has been breaking we have not had the time to explore how we can improve our lighting in the parking lot. Once the dust settles, we will have time to begin our work to improve the lighting.

Now for the status on the Pavilion (Gazebo). This has been an extremely tough year for the House Committee. It was my hope to present a motion to approve the funding for a project that has been in the works for two years. However Mother Nature has been a formidable foe. With the failure of the Auditorium roof, the damage from the wind storm on the golf course, and replacement of the siding and sheathing on the swimming pool, these items are stretching our resources. The House Committee has decided not to present a motion until we take care of our most critical repairs at this time. I want to remind everyone that the Board's responsibility is to look after the assets of the HOA, protect the assets and our members, and enhance the value of the HOA for our members. We will, however, continue to work to have a Pavilion built, but not at this time.

The House Committee has been working with the Activities Committee to update the Card Room off the Dining Hall. Before we start the painting, there are plans to improve storage in the room and replace the carpeting along with the carpeting in dining hall and auditorium lobbies.

The House committee has finally received all bids for the Auditorium Restroom Remodel. The contractor with the low bid has been selected and I will be presenting a motion to approve the funding for the construction. The remodel will be scheduled to begin at the same time as the roofing job.

We are working with our pest control contractor to continue our treatments until we have the problem under control. We are being watchful to see if there are other areas that they might invade.

The painting has been completed in the Women's Golf Lounge and once some of our other work has been completed, the Maintenance Dept. will begin preparing the Golf Lounge by the Pro Shop for painting.

With the Car Show coming in July, the House is presenting a motion to resurface and repair and repaint the curbing in our parking lot to present Woodburn Estates & Golf in a positive light.

We were just asked if we had Carbon Monoxide monitors in the clubhouse. Frank Jameson has been checking this out and will be installing in any area that needs one.

Carpet: This has been needed for some time. With the restroom remodel and the new roof being installed now is the time to complete this project.

The House Committee, led by Becky Butts, has spent a lot of hours working on this. We checked out various types of carpeting and we are in agreement that this is the best option and I will have a motion under new business.

Parking Lot: Salem Seal Coating will be seal coating our parking lot. They will also pressure wash and repaint our curbs, re-stripe lines and make repairs as needed. We will also refigure handicapped parking in front of the auditorium to conform to current codes.

The job will be scheduled to be completed by July 1, 2017 for the Show & Shine Car Show that will be held on July 9th.

While I was on vacation, Director Dawn R Cole and GM Tom Staskiewicz met with Salem Seal Coating and received addition bids for addition work that needs to be done at this time. This work will add an additional \$10,000.00 to our motion under new business.

MARKETING-Director Allan Lindberg: Activity flyers are being distributed to the senior centers in Wilsonville, Salem 50+ Center, and Molalla. Our best performing marketing tool the last two years was the referral program. As a result, marketing will reward the referrer, a resident or associate, \$100. for any new golf or social member when a new referral signs up for an annual membership. Excluded will be those returning as members that have been members within the last two years. This program will run from January 1, 2017 to December 31, 2017.

MEMBERSHIP-Director Nancy Dale: The next new member meeting is Saturday, August 26th at 1:00 p.m. in the Dining Hall. The date has been moved ahead by one month due to my personal scheduling conflict.

NEWS & VIEWS-Director Allan Lindberg: Many of you that read the *News & Views* may have noticed a different look with additional pages printed in color. We have increased the number of color pages from 4 to 8 and reduced the number of black and white from 8 to 4.

We are receiving more requests for color ads and could not fulfill one customer request to print their ad in color. Now, with eight pages printing in color, ads will be dispersed throughout the *News & Views* and pictures of people will be printed in color. The cost of increasing to eight pages in color is about \$200.00 per issue. *News & Views* continues to be a profit center for Woodburn Estates & Golf after expenses. The April P&L Budget vs Actual shows *News & Views* income for the first four months as \$2,932 more than budgeted and expenses are \$3,626 less that budgeted.

Recently I had discussions with our Treasurer Chuck Johnson and GM Tom about the charges passed on to *News & Views* for things like rent, postage, and bookkeeping services. The amounts charged to *News & Views* are the same today as they have been for many years and need to be adjusted.

WEB-Director Allan Lindberg: Since the last board meeting, we have had 4,805 total visits to the front page, 2,274 hits to the calendar page and 265 hits to the Country Cottage Resturant.

General Manager Tom Staskiewicz:

Reserve Analyst Training: Monday and Tuesday, the 1st and 2nd of May, I attended a training class on the Reserve Analyst software used to create the 30-year study. My goal was to learn more about the functions of the software and how it can benefit Woodburn Estates & Golf.

The class was attended by several Reserve Analysts, one other HOA manager, three from management companies and an HOA Maintenance Manager. The training exposed me to several features I had not used nor seen used in our 30-year studies by the analysts we had contracted in years past. I won't bore you with features, but I will

share a couple of enlightening moments. During the lunch on the first day I asked the analysts what they used as an inflation rate. The common response was the Consumer Price Index because it is put out by the Government and therefore



easily accepted. I asked if they discussed the inflation rate used with their clients and they said no, because it would generate too many questions. I followed their response asking if their client boards were not involved in what they should do when your studies are incorrect. I didn't receive an answer.

The next day as the training was ending, I asked about their liability in the event their studies were flawed and the common response was they limit their liability to the fee charged. I asked if they had E&O insurance and they said they did not because of the expense. These were the answers I expected but was very disappointed to hear. Essentially the Reserve Analyst Professionals have no "skin" in the game and no reason to produce a quality report.

<u>CAI Conference:</u> Wednesday, May 3rd, through Saturday, May 6th, I attended the CAI National Conference. The conference included three educational sessions Thursday and Friday and keynote sessions Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

Some of the sessions were excellent and others, as would be expected, were not as beneficial. Some of the discussions that stood out included a legal presentation on the Fair Housing Act, a presentation on drones and one on the direction and future of

One of the key points in the Fair Housing Act presentation was the need for closure on all complaints. Whether the person filed the complaint or was subject of a complaint, there must be closure whether they fulfilled their responsibilities or not. For instance, if we send a letter requesting information and there is not response, we must close the issue stating that the lack of a response is the reason for closing the complaint. The file letter would be proof in court that we did our due diligence and followed through. We cannot simply be complacent because we did not receive the requested response.

Another point of this session is the FHA (Fair Housing Act) is constantly being redefined as court cases are decided. Things that we have taken for granted to be within the rights of the HOA are frequently no longer the case. As a nearby example we have the situation with the McNary HOA. They had a rule prohibiting motor homes in their driveways and a family with a medical issue was able to prove the restriction was not fair under the FHA. McNary settled for \$300,000. We must step cautiously when we encounter Fair Housing Act issues. Because we are a HUD approved 55+ community our rules pertaining to age of owners and the restrictions on those under 18 are not in question, but we must be careful.

During the drones session there was considerable discussion about the laws. This is a totally new area and the laws are being developed as situations occur. Initially drone owners were required to register with the FAA; this was recently challenged in court and struck down. One thing I learned is we can control the takeoff and landing of drones on the common area. We can also limit drones in our "air space" to a certain height. The exact height however is still in discussion and will take time to determine.

A disturbing fact I learned is drones have a button on the controller for return to base. This has proven dangerous to the drones and to the operators. If the drone is returning and there is an obstacle in the path, the drone will run into it and there are many cases of this happening. A second and deadly issue is a case where the return to base was pressed and the drone returned and decapitated the teenage owner.

Earlier this year we drew up some rules pertaining to drones. They must be updated and they will be in constant need of updating as new laws are developed and we learn more of the potential problems.

Last year we had an issue with a drone at the car show. The potential damage to the cars cannot be allowed and we do not want to bear the cost of repairs for damage done.

The last session was about the future of HOAs. I provided each of you with a booklet about HOAs in 2020. There is a lot of information in that booklet and I hope you take time to read it. This session went over several of those statements about the future of HOAs. We are a 55+ community, but HOAs are being required by many cities today as a means of managing neighborhoods. With the oversight of the HOA, some of the burden on local governments is alleviated.

The last piece of the conference I found beneficial was the opportunity to speak to other large scale HOAs. We did a lot of talking about the issues we face in our communities. It was enlightening to learn about issues they have with their 30-year studies. In Nevada, for instance, the state has issued many rules on 30-year studies, qualifications for the Reserve Analysts and trying to implement controls over the profession. Sadly, the efforts by the state have not improved or overcome some of the issues I highlighted earlier.

I had one HOA manager identify a \$2,000,000 shortfall for the replacement of the roads. Another mentioned a \$6 million and \$8 million shortfall for sewer lines that were never identified because they never fail. One other HOA manager of 70 some units with a garage full of Bentleys and similar cars. One member who owned three entire floors: one for himself, one for visiting family and one for his butler and maid. As part of his compensation, the manager had a unit of his own.

I very much appreciate the support of the board in allowing me to attend these conferences. I feel I came away much the better for myself and WEG as a result. Thank you.
