

Roundup is Being Sprayed on Woodburn Estates' Curbs

Recently I discovered a fellow in a modified golf cart spraying the curb in front of our house. Concerned, I asked him what was going on. He explained that he worked for the City of Woodburn and his job was to spray for weeds on the curbs. He couldn't (or wouldn't) tell me what he was using. I told him we had a dog, as did many others in Woodburn Estates, and they were often walked throughout the neighborhood. I requested he please not spray again in front of our house because I didn't want anyone's dogs, including ours, poisoned.

Later I spoke with Chuck Fobert, the supervisor of the weed-spraying project for the City of Woodburn Public Works Department. He informed me the herbicide they are using is Roundup. "It's not as toxic as you might think," he stated. "It's an over-the-counter herbicide." He added, "A person wouldn't want to drink it, but we're not using that much at a time during the spraying." He went on to tell me, "For the past 30 years we've been spraying for weeds on the curbs of the entire city. If we didn't, we'd have three-foot-tall weeds all over the place."

There is considerable debate about how toxic Monsanto's Roundup is to humans and the environment. There are many articles and studies online about that. Setting those issues aside for a moment, as well as any concerns about how over-spray may affect garden plants near the curbs, my main worry is how toxic it may be to the dogs being walked along Woodburn Estates' curbs. Their inquisitive noses and exposed feet are right at curb level.

Mr. Fobert stated that as soon as it is dry, Roundup is harmless to humans and dogs. He added that in summer temperatures Roundup typically dries in three minutes. He asserted that "Dogs could lick a sprayed plant with dried Roundup on it and it wouldn't hurt them."

If you have doubts about the safety of Roundup and wish the curb in front of your house to be put on Woodburn Public Works' "No-Spray" list, call them at 503-982-5236.





Men's Golf General Meeting Minutes

Woodburn Estates Men's Golf General Meeting July 5, 2017

President Paul Eaton called the Meeting to order at 10:05 a.m. in the Dining Hall, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll Call: Paul Eaton, Will Abshere, Allan Lindberg, Chuck Johnson, Ron Hansen, Clint Hansen, Len Westphal, Ron Gripenstraw, Stan Hiller, and Steve Hobson. Past President Russ Krussow was also in attendance. A total of 36 members attended the Meeting.

New Members: Before beginning with the Officer and Committee Reports, President Eaton asked if there were any new members in attendance. Dean Lambert introduced himself as a new member of our Club.

President's Report: President Eaton announced that the OGA Golf Course is looking for course starters and hosts. Contact Mark Keating if interested in these positions. President Eaton then stated that Diana Lindberg is in need of volunteers to help with the Car Show to be held on Sunday, July 9th. She needs volunteers to help set up yard signs, tables, and pop-up tents early in the morning of the Show and then be available to take down said items at the end of the day. She is also in need of two more pop-up tents. President Eaton stated that Dick Hammond has players available from the OGA Golf Course who would like to participate in the upcoming Harvest Invitational Golf Tournament. Contact Dick if any members need a partner for this tournament. President Eaton then reiterated that on Ladies Golf Play Days, Tuesdays and Wednesdays, do not park your golf carts near the Pro Shop or in front of the Pro Shop. He then reviewed the times of play on these days when the lady golfers have preference.

Vice President's Report: VP Will Abshere reported that the Men's Golf Club 9-Hole Group is going well with currently 4-5 foursomes going out each Tuesday morning. They play the opposite 9 holes that are being played that day by the Ladies Golf Club 9-Hole Group. He stated that they could always use more participants.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Allan Lindberg provided the following report: Opening Balance: \$3,332.16...Deposits: \$0.00...Expenses: \$894 (includes \$194.00 to fund the Hole-in-One Insurance for the upcoming Harvest Invitational Tournament & \$700.00 paid to the OGA for 20 members)...Ending Balance...\$2,438.16. Allan went on to state that the ending balance is less than the \$2,500 balance the Treasurer is required to maintain according to the Men's Golf Club Constitution and By-Laws. The Club Constitution can be modified by a motion to do so with a majority vote of the members present. In past years, all money in excess of \$2,500 would be added to the end of the year's Turkey Shoot Tournament. At present, the Club does not have sufficient funds to add to the Turkey Shoot. As stated earlier, Men's Golf Club Treasury funds come from annual dues paid which are \$40.00 if paid by January 31st and \$45.00 if paid after January 31st. From the annual dues collected, \$35.00 per member is paid to the OGA for membership in the USGA.

Secretary's Report: Secretary Chuck Johnson stated he had nothing to report. **COMMITTEE REPORTS:**

Handicap: Co-Chair Allan Lindberg answered a question from member Mike Dykes as to how long a restricted status remains on a golfer's record (either one year or if the golfer improves their play to represent the restriction given). Co-Chair Clint Hansen then reviewed the rules regarding the upcoming Match Play Tournament, including proper scoring, honors, etc.

Greens: Greens Committee representative Fred Bourne was absent. Greens Committee member Allan Lindberg reported on the arborist's report including the ribbons placed on certain trees. Allan stated that cart path repairs this year will be limited to the most critical locations. Tee boxes will be constructed for the new forward tees as time permits. Golf Course Superintendent Tim O'Larey currently has openings for 2 more golf course maintenance employees.

Mixed Tournaments: Chairman Len Westphal reported that all sponsors have committed for the remaining tournaments with sponsor funds yet to be collected from two sponsors.

Rules: Chairman Ron Hansen explained the many differences between stroke play and match play, including practice on the day of play (allowed), farthest away player must play first, even if on the green, tee area violations, etc. Ron then answered a question from member Mike Dykes regarding the proper way to ID and replace a ball in its original lie.

Sunshine: Chairman Ron Gripenstraw reported that a card had been sent to Pam Matthews for the passing of her husband, Glen. Ron will also be sending appropriate cards to Clyde Leavitt and Gene Stiles regarding medical issues.

Membership: Chairman Stan Hiller reported that he had made 4 more bag tags, but the annual number is still less than last year at this time. He reiterated the need to have members pick up their bag tags from the Pro Shop.

Fun Things to Do

Among the many "Fun things to do" at Woodburn Estates & Golf are some golf programs that some of you may not have heard about and open to all players. These groups are good ways to practice golf and to meet people. These events are in addition to day's play by the Men's and Women's golf clubs and the tournaments.

Lady Putters: Are you a beginner in golf, an everyday player or doing just a little bit of golf? Then check out Lady Putters and learn to putt. 

Woodburn Estates & Golf is a desirable place to live and we are being recognized as such by the new owners and the short period of time homes are on the market before offers are made. Your board is fulfilling their three responsibilities: Maintain - Protect - Enhance.

What Does Your General Manager Do?

My role is to interact with our members during events and activities and participate and speak, when asked, to attend pot lucks or other events. I give tours to prospective members, which I enjoy because it's another opportunity to rave about Woodburn Estates.

One thing I have been focusing on for 2017 is long-term planning. One of the problems most associations face is the annual turnover of board members and the resulting lack of continuity from year-to-year for projects. Long-term plans can help new directors hit the ground running when they take over the committees. I participate with several committees as an advisor. I meet regularly with our directors and attend board and special meetings. State Senate Votes to Expand Definition of 'Distracted Driving'

HB 2597 expands handheld device uses that can qualify for citation

SALEM – The Oregon Senate voted to send a bill to the governor for her signature that will improve traffic safety by expanding the definition of distracted driving.

House Bill 2597 – which passed the Senate June 29, 2017 by a 21-8 vote – expands on existing law, in which talking or texting on a cell phone while driving already is illegal, to include other activities such as holding a cell phone to play music while driving.

"We are broadening the scope of what qualifies under the definition of using a mobile communication device while driving," said Sen. Floyd Prozanski (D-Eugene), who carried the bill in the Senate. "This will help discourage drivers from being distracted by their cell phones or handheld devices and improve traffic safety by reducing a lot of preventable accidents."

The bill renames the offense of operating a motor vehicle while using a mobile communication device and expands the law. It also increases the penalty for a first offense, as well as penalties for subsequent offenses, and toughens restrictions when the first offense contributes to an accident. According to an Oregon Department of Transportation study, 4,000 car crashes in 2014 were caused by distracted driving. The real number is likely to be higher, since distracted driving is underreported due to self-reporting and limited detection capabilities.


"Distracted driving is today's drunk driving," Senate President Peter Courtney (D-Salem) said. "Related injuries and deaths are becoming an epidemic. Until Oregon takes distracted driving as seriously as drunk driving we aren't going to be able to change behavior."

In 2007, the Legislature passed a bill making it a Class D violation for a minor to operate a motor vehicle while using a mobile communication device. The law was expanded in 2009 to prohibit any person from operating a motor vehicle while using a mobile communication device. In 2013, the Legislature elevated that offense to a Class C traffic violation. A 2013 Oregon Court of Appeals ruling determined that the law "prohibits talking and texting on a mobile communication device, but not all activities that can be performed using such a device." This limited the definition to uses such as texting or talking on the phone, but not other distracting activities that can be conducted using a cell phone.

In February of this year, the Distracted Driving Task Force issued a report, including a recommendation that the distracted driving statute be amended to broaden that definition regarding use of a cell phone or handheld device. This bill expands the definition to include all uses of cell phones while driving.

The bill includes several exceptions for forestry or agricultural operations, as well as using devices in the scope of a person's employment or in emergency situations. It also raises the first offense from a Class C violation to a Class B traffic violation and subsequent penalties rise to Class A traffic violations if they occur within 10 years of the first, or if the first offense contributes to causing an accident.

House Bill 2597 now goes back to the House of Representatives for concurrence.
