Why the Total Solar Eclipse Arrives from the West

Every day, the same routine. The sun rises in the east. Breakfast. Off to work. Work. Home from work. Dinner. The sun sets in the west. Repeat. It's a pattern familiar to everyone on Earth. For countless generations, we've relied on the regular cycles of the heavens to help demarcate our days.

But a total solar eclipse, like the big one coming to the continental United States on Aug. 21, will break the routine. In addition to the moon completely covering the face of the sun — which, let's admit, is already pretty spectacular—the event will move in an unfamiliar and possibly disquieting direction: from west to east.

The normal, daily rising and setting of celestial objects isn't due to their own movement, but rather the rotation of Earth. As our planet spins on its axis, the heavens appear to rise up from the east, arch their way across the sky, and settle into the west.

It's hard to blame our ancestors for assuming that Earth — which seemed very large and strong — was incapable of movement, with the ethereal denizens of the heavens gliding along their nested crystal spheres, giving humans our familiar, clockwork celestial movements.

After centuries of serious work, people realized that Earth does indeed spin, and the motion of the sun, moon and stars is only apparent. But when it comes to solar eclipses we're faced with a new incongruity: why does the path of a solar eclipse start in the west and end in the east? The answer is simple, but it's not something we're accustomed to thinking about: the moon itself orbits Earth from west to east. In other words, if you could rocket up high above the North Pole, the moon would trace out a counterclockwise circle. But Earth rotates about 30 times for a single lunar orbit, so it's not something we normally notice. During a solar eclipse, the path of the moon's shadow must follow the motion of the moon itself — to the east.



On July 22, 2017, I received a phone call from "Robert Barker" telling me I had won a grand total of \$950,000, a Sears' washer & dryer, plus a bonus prize of \$5000 weekly for life from Publishers Clearing House Sweepstakes* Contest. I was the second place winner! Was I excited? NO. Was I skeptical? VERY!

After answering a few basic questions (I was not asked, nor would I have answered questions about my social security number, banking numbers, etc.), I was given a confirmation number and a security code number. All I had to do to claim these fabulous prizes was to take a copy of my answered questions, two forms of I.D. plus a registration of receipt (which the Prize Patrol would give me) after meeting the Prize Patrol at the local, Walmart store. I was also supposed to give them \$525.25 for a processing and handling fee – in cash, no checks.

When I questioned the processing/handling fee, Mr. Barker put my phone on hold until his supervisor was free to explain it to me. While on hold (I have two phones), I called Publishers Clearing House's 800 number and was told that my "winning" telephone call was, as I suspected, a scam. PCH never notifies sweepstakes winners by phone (it would spoil the surprise) and never, ever, charges a fee for any reason.

Needless to say, "Mr. Barker's" supervisor never did contact me and I never won the "prizes". Since I never paid the \$525.25 processing/handling fee, I do feel that I am a winner!

So, dear friends and neighbors, if you receive a phone call similar to mine, *do not* give out any confidential, personal information; *do not* meet with the "prize" bearer; and *do not* pay any sort of fee. But *do* keep a tight grip on your purse strings. I sure am glad I did.

Friday night there will be a "Glow Show" in which the trucks will turn on only their running lights. It is a spectacular sight!

Within the museum itself there are always 75 to 85 trucks on display – from a 1914 Sampson to working trucks.

The truck museum itself does not charge an entrance fee, depending instead on donations and grants. However, the museum sits on a Powerland site by lease (there are fourteen museums on those grounds. Some are more developed than others.)

The charge to get on the Powerland grounds is \$10 for adults, and children under 12 are admitted free. The Press can get a Press Card by contacting Frank Merrill and be admitted at no charge.

Those persons who attend on Friday can get a wrist band that will allow them to be admitted again on Saturday at no extra charge.

The Truck Museum is by far the largest and most developed facility on the grounds. It has just completed a 1½ million dollar addition and named it the Learning Center. It is intended to be a resource for those persons who are interested in additional information about the trucking industry.

The museum has been in existence since 1989 and is (jokingly) called one of the best keep secrets in Oregon. However, it is well known within the trucking industry and draws fans from all over the United States, plus Canada, Europe, and as far away as Australia.



Men's Golf General Meeting Minutes

Woodburn Estates Men's Golf General Meeting August 2, 2017

President Paul Eaton called the Meeting to order at 10 a.m. in the Dining Hall, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll Call: Paul Eaton, Will Abshere, Allan Lindberg, Chuck Johnson, Ron Hansen, Stan Hiller, Steve Hobson, Ron Gripenstraw, Fred Bourne, and Len Westphal. General Manager Tom Staskiewicz and Past President Russ Krussow were also in attendance. A total of 28 members attended the Meeting.

New Members Present: Before beginning with the Officer and Committee Reports, President Eaton observed two members present for their first time. Associate members David Lopez and Bob Dugas introduced themselves.

President's Report: President Eaton stated that the OGA is having a golf tournament on August 21st to be called "Eclipse on the Green". The tournament will be a 2 Person Best Ball with a \$100 entry fee. Jim Worley then commented that the Pro Shop has ordered "Eclipse" golf caps that will be available for sale before the eclipse on August 21st.

Vice President's Report: VP Will Abshere reported that recently the Men's Golf Club 9 Hole Group played a round from the new forward tees. Will recommended that the Men's Golf Club 18 Hole Thursday Play also play a round from the new forward tees. Will then reiterated that on certain days (Tuesday and Wednesday for Lady golfers and Thursday for Men golfers) certain groups have the golf course set aside for their play from 7 a.m. till 11:30 a.m.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Allan Lindberg provided the following report: Opening Balance: \$2,452.21; Deposits: \$270; Expenses: \$60.00; Ending Balance: \$2,662.21. Allan went on to state that the Club's funds come from annual dues paid (\$40 if paid by January 31st and \$45 if paid after January 31st). From the annual dues collected, \$35 per member is paid to the OGA for membership in the USGA. The Men's Golf Club Constitution requires that the Treasurer maintain a minimum balance of \$2,500 in our account. Additional expense from our account includes the purchase of a traditional jacket for the Men's Golf Club Champion.

Secretary's Report: Secretary Chuck Johnson stated he had nothing to report. **COMMITTEE REPORTS:**

Greens: Greens Committee representative Fred Bourne was unable to attend the July Greens Committee Meeting. President Eaton attended the July 10th Greens Committee Meeting and provided the following information: Hole Number 9 continues to have safety issues as to the tee box location, requiring additional arborvitae be planted to provide protection. New score cards will not change the handicap status or par as to play from the white and gold tees. Green fees for the Snowbird Tournament have been decreased from \$27 to \$25. Tim O'Larey, our Golf Course Superintendent, has hired a new crew member, but still has an opening for another crew member. As stated earlier by our GM, cart path repair is forthcoming and new tee boxes are to be built for the new forward tees. The OB line on hole number 11 has been repainted.

Handicap: Allan Lindberg reported on the recent audit he and Co-Chair Clint Hansen performed. He stated that all score cards should have a date of play provided and indicate whether the score has been posted. Allan stated that the new software, the Golf Genesis Program, is more complex and covers a multitude of scenarios.

Mixed Tournaments: Chairman Len Westphal reported that all sponsor fees have been paid with one exception. He stated that by raising the entry fees to \$18 all past deficits have been met. Next year the entry fees may be lowered to \$17 per event. For the Mixed Tournament on August 5th, Len reported that he needed additional volunteers to set up the sponsor's tent at 7:30 a.m. He reported that Allan and Diana Lindberg will handle the ticket table at the after tournament dinner. President Eaton remarked that he had heard complaints regarding the 2 Person formats as the complainants desired that all Mixed Tournaments have a 4 Person format. Bob Price then reported that he needs a couple to play with them in the August 5th Mixed Tournament.

Rules: Chairman Ron Hansen reported that the Match Play Tournament went well with the participants aware of the rules relative to Match Play. Ron then discussed the proper way to identify a ball and replace the ball.

Publicity: Chairman Will Abshere had nothing to report. Allan Lindberg, Marketing Director for the HOA, reported that a full page ad relative to our golf course/community was recently placed in the Keizertimes Health & Wellness Magazine as well as on their website.

Sunshine: Chairman Ron Gripenstraw reported that he sent cards to Mike Burton and Vern Hamilton regarding their medical issues. He also sent a Sympathy card to Sandy Blaylock for the recent passing of her husband, Don.

Membership: Chairman Stan Hiller stated that the incentive program "Refer a Friend" has been successful in bringing in new members. He also stated that our membership this year is equal to that of last year.

Door Prizes: Co-Chair Steve Hobson reported that Gene Stiles has been able to come home after his medical issues required his stay at a rehab facility.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS: Nothing to report.

NEW BUSINESS: Chuck Johnson made a motion that the Constitution be amended relative to a minimum balance required within the Club's account. Rather than a specified minimum amount, Johnson's motion was to amend the Constitution to read that ...the Treasurer will maintain a reasonable threshold amount within the Club's account"..., the motion seconded by Ron Hansen. Following discussion, the motion passed unanimously. Chuck Johnson then made a second motion as follows: "I move that the annual Men's Golf Club Membership Dues be raised beginning January 1, 2018, to \$45 if paid before

January 31st and \$50 if paid after January 31st", the motion seconded by Stan Hiller. Following discussion, the motion passed unanimously.

CLOSING COMMENTS: Fred Bourne reported on the End of Watch Golf Tournament to be held on August 12th. He stated that there may be a need for additional golf carts. If provided by a member, the member would be reimbursed a rental fee. Russ Krussow inquired as to whether the Match Play winning voucher money has been recorded. Jim Worley reported that the voucher money has been recorded. Will Abshere then recognized Russ Krussow as our Match Play Champion and Tom King as the Champion of the Spring Handicap.

CLOSING: Steve Hobson made a motion to adjourn the Meeting, motion seconded, motion approved, and the Meeting was adjourned at 11:10 a.m.



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


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
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Women Go Wild over Dice Game with a Shady Past

SEAL BEACH, Calif. - The women are only a few rounds into their bunco game, and it's already getting a little wild on a school night in a quiet neighborhood in Seal Beach.

Andrea Wilke, an ebullient fourth-grade teacher seated at a card table, has moistened a tally sheet with her all-time, personal-best bunco score on it and stuck it onto her forehead.

The 43-year-old mother of two beams with something akin to pride of accomplishment.

"I'm going to see her driving her van with that thing stuck to her forehead," deadpans Jill Stewart, another mother of two, who creates a small spectacle herself when she wins possession of Bunco Bulldog, a blue beanbag toy awarded for rolling bunco, or three of a kind.

Wilke probably won't be wearing the score sheet, but the two women will undoubtedly see each other around their College Park East neighborhood - and now they know each other, thanks largely to their monthly bunco games.

Part female-bonding agent, part bridge-for-the-brainless, a bunco party among Wilke's friends and neighbors is a couple of hours a month of girl talk, good-natured jibes, hors d'oeuvres, dessert and free-flowing Chardonnay, all while the dice are rolling.

"It's not bunco, it's drunko," said Kelly Kumashira, who has a baby on her shoulder and is drinking Coke.

No wonder the game is enjoying a new surge of popularity, especially among suburban women.

"It's usually played by groups of women and it lets them get away from their families, but they're not spending money. It's back to the basics," said Leslie Crouch of Carlsbad, founder of the World Bunco Association. The association's Web site is: www.worldbunco.com

The game itself goes way back.

It apparently started in Victorian England and came to the United States as a gambling game known first as "banco," and later called "bunko" or "bunco." During the Gold Rush, a crooked gambler in San Francisco is said to have used the progressive dice game to bilk earnings from '49ers. Eventually, "bunco" became the general term for con games and scams.

After the Civil War, the scam went straight and became a popular parlor game, particularly in the Midwest. Crouch said her 93-year-old grandmother remembers playing bunco in Chicago in the 1930s. The game inevitably spread from the cities as suburbs developed.

The current resurgence got a boost in 1996 when Crouch and a partner got together to market "It's Bunco Time!!!," the first boxed set of bunco tools - dice, bell, score sheets, tally pads, pencils and fuzzy dice, plus a traveling box with a handle for \$19.95.

Crouch and her partner, Camilla Ethell, sold about 50,000 game sets in the first year before selling out to a game company.

But bunco is so simple, groups don't have to buy a game to play. Usually, there are three tables of four players - a winning table, and middle and losing tables, with the winning table controlling the play. Each table has two randomly

Players take turns rolling three dice, first for ones, then twos and so on. Each time they roll that round's number, their team earns a point.

When a player gets three of the number - a bunco - her team earns 21 points. When the winning table reaches 21 points or rolls a bunco, a bell is rung to signal the end of that round, and all players total their scores.

Prizes usually are awarded for the highest and lowest scores and most buncos. In some groups, the hostess buys small gifts to give out as prizes, but most groups ask members to contribute \$5 to a kitty, which is divvied at the end.

I Rest My Case

I recently wrote an article entitled "Making Golf Fun Again" that was published in the June 9 edition of the *News & Views*. My purpose in writing the article was to illustrate the benefits to our lady golfers who take advantage of the new Forward Tees and appeal to various entities (Friday Funnies, the Sundowners, Mixed Tournaments, Ladies Golf Clubs, etc.) to immediately allow our lady golfers to play from the new forward tees as soon as the rating was returned from the OGA.

On Friday, July 21, the annual event known as the "Mixed Horse Race" was held. My wife and I have participated in this fun event in the past and looked forward to playing this year. We were informed that the lady golfers would not be allowed to play from the new Forward Tees but rather from the old gold Forward Tees. So we chose not to participate in part as a protest against the decision to not allow the lady golfers to play from the new Forward Tees.

Our decision was not to disparage the skill of the lady golfers, many of whom could probably beat me if playing from the White Tees. Neither was the decision made to in any way detract from this year's Mixed Horse Race, an event that turned out to be one of the most exciting events of this golfing year. We merely felt that if the event had allowed play from the new Forward tees there would have been more teams participating, the event would have moved along much faster, and scoring would have been much better.

So on the day of this year's Mixed Horse Race, my wife and I were spectators rather than participants. I was curious as to how the lady golfers would perform from the old gold Forward Tees especially on the par threes as the lady golfers in the event teed off from the odd holes (1, 5, and 9, all par three holes). There were 17 teams that participated in this year's Mixed Horse Race so 17 lady golfers hit their tee shots on the First hole, a par three measuring 141 yards. So how many of the lady golfers hit their tee shots on the green on this hole? Zero! One shot hit the front of the green and rolled off. The new forward tees on hole number 1 measures 115 yards. I would wager that more than half of the tee shots from the new forward tees would have been on the green, leading to birdie putts.

Hole number 5 is a par 3, playing 142 yards from the old gold forward tees. I believe there were now 8 teams remaining in the competition so 8 lady golfers teed off on this hole. So how many of these 8 lady golfers hit their tee shots on this hole on the green? One! The new forward tees on hole number 5 measures 115 yards. I would again wager that more than half of the tee shots from the new forward tees would have been on the green, again leading to birdie putts.

Hole 9 is the last par 3 on the front 9, playing 149 yards from the old gold forward tees. With only the last 2 teams remaining in the competition, only 2 lady golfers teed off, neither of them hitting their tee shots on the green. The new forward tees on hole number 9 measures 126 yards and I believe one or both of the lady golfers would have placed their tee shots on the green.

The purpose of this article is not to detract from the skill of our lady golfers. Neither is it meant to detract from what turned out to be an exciting event. The purpose I intend is to reiterate that the Gold Tees were established many years ago when our golf course was built and lady golfers were few and far between. These Gold Tees were actually meant to be a forward tee for men golfers and requiring our lady golfers to play from these tees is a disservice to their game. By playing the new forward tees, our lady golfers will score better, have opportunities for birdies, the pace of play will improve greatly, and overall, golf will be fun again. I rest my case.


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View From Space
