Cart Path Project

Looking out the Pro Shop window you will notice lots of heavy equipment and trucks. This is the beginning of replacing the aging cart path. You will also notice we have expanded the parking area of the Pro Shop to alleviate the dangerous curve leading to the back of the restaurant area. This is phase one of the cart path project that will be done over the next 3 years.

You as a homeowner have a vested interest in all of the assets here in Woodburn Estates & Golf. The upkeep and repair of all assets is part of your board's fiduciary responsibility and as your Greens Director I am doing just that. Over the last few seasons our cart paths have become in need of not just repair but replacement. The projects ahead of us will remove the old asphalt and rebuild the base to provide a longer wearing path.

Are you wondering where the money comes to do this? All golf cart owners who drive their carts around Woodburn Estates to use the restaurant, the fitness center, the office, the craft room, the billiard room, the auditorium, the golf course, the tunnel under Hwy 214 – must buy a cart sticker for the current year. The cost for golfers is \$50 per cart, per year. All non-golfers pay \$10, due in January. You can pay in the Pro Shop. The fees are placed in the cart path fund under a separate line item. This fund is added to the reserve fund when a cart path project is funded. Keep in mind, the reserve fund is to repair or replace existing assets of which the golf course is our biggest asset.

We are looking forward to the completion of the cart path and the new trees this coming year. Please feel free to contact me with your comments or concerns at: greens@woodburnestatesgolf.com.



The Activities Committee is proud to be part of Woodburn Estates, and spends time each year to honor and uphold the basic tenants of our association. As stated in the Articles of Incorporation, it is the primary committee responsible for implementing those activities outside of the golf chair. This includes promoting activities designed to meet our physical and social needs. Many of these events help provide materials and activities for our members that do not come out of their annual dues.

2017 was a busy year with a varied activity schedule. Some events were for our members only and some were open to the public. We started the year with a February Chili Feed followed the next day with a potluck and big screen debut in the auditorium with a Super Bowl Party. Our Woodburn Police and Fire Departments were invited to attend and participate in the Chili Feed which fed about 155 people.

2017 Events included a Potato Bash with comedy film on the big screen; a spring and fall Pancake Breakfast; a Community Garage Sale and a Health Faire.

Although our committee does not actively plan some of the events, many of our members volunteer in associated events like the Car Show, Family Golf Days, and the Craft and Book Sale.

Information and handouts for the wider Woodburn community, including signups for CERT training and calendars and coupons for the local businesses, are presented at least twice a month, along with 51 weeks of entertainment or public speakers for Coffee Hour.

A Blood Drive and Flu Shot Clinic was provided on-site with both events well attended. National Night out in September was moved from outside to inside the Auditorium due to the extreme heat. This will also be a planned event for 2018, for those members who want to participate but may not be able to host their own event.

This year your activity committee has donated or assisted in several items for our community and public. Below is a partial list. Thank you to our committee and our community who have helped through participation in our events.

- 1. Payment in conjunction with the Marketing Committee for purchase of digital screens located in 4 areas of the association.
- 2. Provided payment for instruction of pool once a week along with care of the tables.
- 3. Provided sponsorship, along with the Marketing Committee for Music in the Park at the Woodburn Library.
- 4. Donated \$750.00 to the Woodburn Fire Department to buy helmets for bicycle riding.
 - 5. Provided Check-in forms for Bingo.
 - 6. Provided a net and stand for the volleyball group in the pool.
- 7. Reimbursed purchases for submitted receipts for equipment replaced for the exercise groups.
- 8. Donated 100s of pounds of food to the local food bank, as well as check donations for the Food Bank's direct purchase.
 - 9. Donated money to the High School Music program.

And more.

At the end of the year motions were made by the activity committee to set aside money for the Gazebo project and the exercise room expansion, which the committee has been working on for several years.



Men's Golf General Meeting Minutes

Woodburn Estates Men's Golf General Meeting January 3, 2018

President Ken Bourne called the Meeting to order at 10 a.m. in the Dining Hall, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll Call: All Officers & Committee Chairmen/Representatives were present with one exception as noted later in these Minutes. 34 members attended the Meeting.

President's Report: President Bourne welcomed all in attendance and stated that the format for Thursday Play for January has been posted. He then welcomed our Head Golf Pro, Jason Hoth, to our Meeting.

Head Golf Pro: Jason Hoth reported that cart path repair on holes 3, 6, and 12 as well as replacement of the cart path on hole 1 is in the process of being completed. He discussed the need to replace the mats at the Driving Range. He will work with the Golf Director to work out the purchase.

Vice President's Report: VP Mike Dykes stated that he appreciated members' participation in the 50-50 raffle. In addition to drawing for a cash payout today, there will also be a drawing for a free round of golf with cart at Heron Lakes. Mike then stated that the Men's 9-Hole Group playing on Tuesday will play the same weekly format as the 18-Hole Group that plays each Thursday.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Allan Lindberg provided the following report: Opening Balance...\$5,730.58...Total Expenses...\$4,155.27...Ending Balance...\$1,575.31. Allan verified that the Men's Golf Club Annual Dues for 2018 is \$45.00.

Secretary's Report: Secretary Chuck Johnson had nothing to report.

Committee Reports:

Greens: Representative Dean Lambert stated the Committee met in December and the focus was on making our golf course more playable year round. Drainage, proper cart paths, firming up areas near the green where carts can move from the fairway back to the cart path, aeration, were issues discussed that will achieve this goal.

In a few short minutes the bucket is empty. But Ed doesn't leave. He stands there lost in thought, as though transported to another time and place. When he finally turns around and begins to walk back toward the beach, a few of the birds hop along the pier with him until he gets to the stairs, and then they, too, fly away. And old Ed quietly makes his way down to the end of the beach and on home.

If you were sitting there on the pier with your fishing line in the water, Ed might seem like 'a funny old duck,' as my dad used to say. Or, to onlookers, he's just another old codger, lost in his own weird world, feeding the seagulls with a bucket full of shrimp.

To the onlooker, rituals can look either very strange or very empty. They can seem altogether unimportantmaybe even a lot of nonsense. Old folks often do strange things, at least in the eyes of Boomers and Busters. Most of them would probably write Old Ed off, down there in Florida. That's too bad. They'd do well to know him better.

His full name: Eddie Rickenbacker. He was a famous hero in World War I, and then he was in WWII. On one of his flying missions across the Pacific, he and his seven-member crew went down. Miraculously, all of the men survived, crawled out of their plane, and climbed into a life raft.

Captain Rickenbacker and his crew floated for days on the rough waters of the Pacific. They fought the sun. They fought sharks. Most of all, they fought hunger and thirst. By the eighth day their rations ran out. No food. No water. They were hundreds of miles from land and no one knew where they were or even if they were alive.

Every day across America, millions wondered and prayed that Eddie Rickenbacker might somehow be found alive. The men adrift needed a miracle. That afternoon they had a simple devotional service and prayed for a miracle. They tried to nap. Eddie leaned back and pulled his military cap over his nose. Time dragged on. All he could hear was the slap of the waves against the raft. Suddenly Eddie felt something land on the top of his cap. It was a seagul!!

Old Ed would later describe how he sat perfectly still, planning his next move. With a flash of his hand and a squawk from the gull, he managed to grab it and wring its neck. He tore the feathers off, and he and his starving crew made a meal of it - a very slight meal for eight men. Then they used the intestines for bait. With it, they caught fish, which gave them food and more bait and the cycle continued. With that simple survival technique, they were able to endure the rigors of the sea until they were found and rescued after 24 days at sea.

Eddie Rickenbacker lived many years beyond that ordeal, but he never forgot the sacrifice of that first life-saving seagull... And he never stopped saying, "Thank you." That's why almost every Friday night he would walk to the end of the pier with a bucket full of shrimp and a heart full of gratitude.



Crochet is another craft that has a shorter history - only since the early 1800's. Most historians credit France for promoting this hand craft.



We visited a Catholic church. When we asked for the restrooms there, we were shown a building behind the church for men and women, but each had only one toilet available. We used a bucket to scoop up a pail of water from a big barrel so we could flush. On our last days in Panama, we traveled north by tour bus to Portobelo on the Caribbean coast. This city is about 2 hours from Panama City, which is on the coastline of the Pacific Ocean. We saw many small towns along the highway. Being away from the metropolitan areas, we could see the poverty in the outlying areas. Scattered along the highway we would see small dumpsters that had been full of trash, but had been sorted through and strewn around, leaving a mess that the garbage men would have to scoop up with their pitchforks. We were warned not to walk in many urban areas.

Over all, this trip left us with many memories. We are looking forward to our next trip to New Zealand and Australia in 2018.
