Care of Our Refinished Auditorium Floor

The following items are what is needed to help take care of our newly refinished Auditorium floor. These requirements will help keep our warranty from being voided.

- All dance groups: Please do not use the same area in the auditorium for each event or dance. This wears the floor.
- Do NOT drag tables and chairs. Set aside any tables or chairs with missing glides, so they can be repaired.
- In the event of a spill, it needs to be wiped up immediately. Do NOT use any chemicals. Please use cloth or paper towels ONLY. If more attention is needed to clean the spill, then call Frank Jameson at 971-338-6183.
- Anyone using the auditorium for walking, please clean off the soles of your shoes on the newly added floor mat so that rocks or foreign materials are not brought in that may scratch the floor.
 - No taps on shoes, or spike high heels, as they scratch the floor.

This is the last time our auditorium floor can be refinished. The next time will require a full replacement of the floor; the projected cost will be a minimum of \$60,000.

Associate Memberships

Recently I have been receiving many questions regarding Associate Memberships in general, not just about the new Associate Memberships recently introduced.

For instance one member called and said she was upset because we were introducing and encouraging Associate Memberships. She and her husband had joined because they liked the exclusivity of the community for homeowners only. I explained that Associate Memberships had been a part of Woodburn Estates & Golf® from the early days and that Associate Memberships is nothing new.

Another member questioned encouraging frequent guests to become Associate Members. He wanted to know why we would do this. I responded asking why these individuals should receive for free what our members pay dues to support. Why shouldn't those using our facilities pay for the privilege just like our members?

I have other members questioning the amount of the fees believing they are too low. I agree totally, but at this point I am interested in more associate members. As we build our associate membership we will be reevaluating the fees.

Members also worry about too many users of our amenities and overcrowding. At some point this may become an issue, but currently our amenities are underused. We will be watching closely to ensure we do not reach a point of overcrowding. There will never be limits on homeowner members but associate memberships will be limited. Once we reach the maximum number of a class of associates we will create waiting lists for future members.

All of our members should be familiar with costs going up. We have three options to offset the increases: 1) reduce services and therefore expenses, 2) increase homeowner dues and fees or 3) increase the number of associates paying membership fees. Personally I like the idea of increasing revenues and having those increases come from sources other than our members and I prefer collecting from individuals using but not paying for the services.

Members will always have the option of inviting guests to our functions; however, the guest status should not be abused. Charging guests for the use of our amenities is not new to Woodburn Estates & Golf® we do it on the golf course where guests are required to pay guest green's fees to use the golf course.

The encounter with the barrel slowed me enough to lessen my injuries when I fell on the pile of brick and fortunately only three vertebrae were cracked.



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Retiring to Florida

Fifteen years ago my wife and I moved into a retirement development on Florida's Southeast coast. We are living in the Delray/Boca/Boynton Golf, Spa, Bath and Tennis Club on Lake Fake-a-hachee. There are 3000 lakes in Florida, only three are real.

Our biggest retirement concern was time management. What were we going to do all day? Let me assure you, passing the time is not a problem. Your days will be eaten up by simple, daily activities... Just getting out of your car takes 15 minutes. Trying to find where you parked takes 20 minutes. It takes 1/2 hour on the check-out line in Wal-Mart and 1 hour to return the item the next day.

Let me take you through a typical day. We get up at 5 a.m, have a quick breakfast and join the early morning Walk and Talk Club. There are about 30 of us and rain or shine we walk around the streets, all talking at once. Every development has some late risers who stay in bed until 6 a.m. After a nimble walk avoiding irate drivers out to make us road kill, we go back home, shower and change for the next activity.

My wife goes directly to the pool for her under water Pilates' class, followed by gasping for breath and CPR. I put on my 'Ask me about my Grandchildren' T-shirt, my plaid mid-calf shorts, my black socks and sandals and go to the clubhouse lobby for a nice nap. Before you know it, it's time for lunch. We go to Costco to partake of the many tasty samples dispensed by ladies in white hair

After a filling lunch, if we don't have any doctor appointments, we might go to the flea market to see if any new white belts have come in or to buy a Rolex watch for \$2. We're usually back home by 2 p.m. to get ready for dinner. People start lining up for the early bird about 3 p.m., but we get there by 3:45 because we're late eaters. The dinners are very popular because of the large portions they serve. You can take home enough food for the next day's lunch and dinner, including extra bread, crackers, packets of mustard, relish, ketchup and Sweetand-Low along with mints. Then we get up and make 5 or 6 trips to the bathroom during the night and it's time to get up and start a new day all over again.

Doctor related activities eat up most of your retirement time. I enjoy reading old magazines in sub-zero temperatures in the waiting room, so I don't mind. Calling for test results also help the days fly by. It takes at least half an hour just getting through the doctor's phone menu. Then there's the hold time until you're connected to the right party. Sometimes they forget you're holding, and the whole office goes off to lunch.

Should you find you still have time on your hands, volunteering provides a rewarding opportunity to help the less fortunate. Florida has the largest concentration of seniors under five feet and they need our help. I myself am a volunteer for 'The Vertically Challenged Over 80'. After shopping, most seniors can't remember where they parked their cars and wander the parking lot for hours while their food defrosts.




The Gold Prospector

Gold! The cry was first heard at Sutter Creek in 1848... and for the next 40 years it echoed and re-echoed throughout the Far West. Each new discovery launched a series of gold rushes – into the Mother Lode country of the Sierra Nevada and the Cascade Ranges; into Washington and Montana; deep into the Great Basin of Nevada and Utah; to the Pikes Peak country and along the rugged ranges of the Rocky Mountains; and then on into the Black Hills of Dakota. The names of mines and mining towns have become classic American legends: the Comstock Lode of Virginia City, Confederate Gulch, Powder River, Eureka, the Emma Mine of Little Cottonwood Canyon, Red Dog, Rough and Ready, Deadwood.

Throughout the Western States, the Gold Prospector became a familiar sight. A pan and a pickaxe were his tools, a burro his closest companion. A few – a very few – made fortunes that staggered the imagination. But tens of thousands who searched in vain for a bonanza settled down to become farmers, shopkeepers, ranchers, tradesmen. It was they who became the first settlers of the western frontier and who formed the basis for its future growth.
