

Men's Golf General Meeting Minutes

Woodburn Estates Men's Golf General Meeting April 4, 2018

President Ken Bourne called the Meeting to order at 10 AM in the Dining Hall, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll Call: All Officers & Committee Chairmen/Representatives were present with the exception of those absent with notice as reported in these Minutes. There were 27 members in attendance at today's Meeting.

President's Report: President Bourne welcomed the members to the Meeting and stated that he was glad to be back after spending time down south. He stated that the golf courses where they stayed were packed with golfers. President Bourne then reminded the members of the quality of our golf course, how easily tee times can be made and its annual cost which cannot be beaten.

Head Pro Report: Jason Hoth discussed the upcoming Wooden Shoe Tulip Tournament scheduled at our course on Friday, April 27, 2018. This will be a 4 person Scramble with a shotgun start at 10 a.m. Entry fee is \$70 per golfer or \$300 for a 4 person team. This is a fundraiser for Woodburn High School and the proceeds will go toward awarding a boy and girl scholarship. Thus far, there are sponsors for 10 holes and 5 teams have signed up to play. Jason then answered questions and discussed issues as to the cart paths, drainage and the removal of the 100 yard markers from our golf course. Several members informed Jason that the Greens Committee and the Men's Golf Club and Ladies Golf Club were not consulted before the removal of the subject yard markers.

Vice President's Report: President Bourne stated that he had received a call from VP Mike Dykes and that Mike had resigned as VP due to health issues. Therefore, we will need a member to fill the position of VP for the remainder of the year. Also, the VP was in charge of the 9-Hole Men's Group on Tuesday mornings and a replacement is now needed. Member Will Abshere volunteered to take over this group for the remainder of the year. President Bourne then stated that Chuck Siver, golf pro in the Pro Shop had asked if the Men's 9-hole group could play on Monday or Friday rather than Tuesday. It was pointed out that this issue had been previously discussed in the Greens Committee and the decision was to have the 9-Hole Group play on Tuesday in concert with the Ladies Golf Club 9-Hole Group. Jason Hoth will follow up to ensure the Men's Golf Club 9-Hole Group continues to play on Tuesdays, either the front or back nine with the Ladies 9-Hole Group having priority as to which 9 they are playing on a given day. The Men's 9-Hole Group will play the same format as that played by the Men's 18-Hole Group that plays on Thursday. Men's Golf Club members have the option to play in either the 9-Hole Group or the 18-Hole Group or both.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Allan Lindberg was absent with notice. President Bourne read Allan's report as follows: Account balance as of March 1, 2018...\$6,182.56. Total Deposits...\$700.00. Interest Earned...\$00.27. Payments to the OGA...\$3,640.00. Expense for donuts...\$30.00. Balance as of March 31, 2018...\$3,212.83. IRS filing for the Men's Golf Club is complete for 2018. As of March 31, 2018, there are 105 members of the Men's Golf Club. A discussion then ensued regarding the need for the Pro Shop to keep a current record of voucher money earned by members in addition to the monthly posting by our Treasurer.

Secretary's Report: Secretary Chuck Johnson had nothing to report.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Greens: Dean Lambert was absent with notice.

Handicap: Co-Chair Russ Krussow discussed the new Golf Genius Program, stating that we no longer use the OGA system. The new software program is a work in progress. Russ then reminded that he and President Bourne are the sole authority in determining the format for Men's Golf Club Thursday Play.

Mixed Tournaments: Co-Chair Fred Bourne had nothing to report.

Sunshine: Chairman Ron Gripenstraw reported that he sent out two cards during the month to Paul Eaton and Jim Worley. It was requested that Ron send out cards to Mike Dykes and Sid Longest.

OGA: Chairman Paul Eaton reminded members of the benefits offered by the OGA and the Pacific Northwest Golf Association, benefits such as reduced green fees, discounts on merchandise at various golf shops, etc. Paul also stated that often the PNWGA need volunteers for professional tournaments.

Rules: Chairman Jim Hutchinson had nothing to report.

Membership: Chairman Stan Hiller was absent with notice.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS: Nothing to report.

NEW BUSINESS: Fred Bourne announced the 5th Annual Woodburn High School Fundraiser Golf Tournament to be held at the OGA Course on April 21, 2018. Fred stated that in the past our Club has had two teams of four players participate in this fundraiser for the Woodburn High School golf program. The cost is \$70 per player, one team has already been entered and Fred must have entry fees for a potential second foursome by April 6th. This fundraiser tournament helps the high school golf teams to pay expenses, such as travel during their golf year. Fred then made a motion for the Men's Golf Club to donate \$200 to the Woodburn High School Golf Program, the motion seconded, motion passed.

Door Prizes: President Bourne then conducted the 50-50 raffle drawing. The total money collected for today's raffle was \$48.00. President Bourne had the winning ticket and split the pot, winning \$24.00

Closing: President Bourne asked for a motion to adjourn the Meeting, motion made, seconded, approved, and the Meeting was adjourned at 11:05 a.m.

In Remembrance of My Son

On February 8th, 1993, I preached my son's funeral service. I have been asked, "How were you able to do that?" The answer simply put is that the Lord sustained me through that most difficult time. Yes, it was emotional - very emotional - but not only did God sustain through that very difficult service, He also has given promises in His Word that greatly helped me. Those promises are the subject of this article.

Our Dan left his earthly body at 9:00 p.m. on February 5th. When we finally went to bed, sleep was next to impossible. Thoughts rushed through my mind. The one thing that gave me most comfort then was the realization that God had promised Dan's place in heaven was secure. It was based on his simple faith in Jesus Christ as the Son of God. Secondly, was the assurance that someday, when the time came to depart my earthly body, I would again see and fellowship with my son. And not only with him, but also with his sister, Marian, whom Dan had never met for she departed her tiny earthly body about a year and a half before Dan's birth.

Standing before the open casket, I lifted Dan's arm slightly. It was lifeless, but not hopeless. In I Thess. 4:13-18 believers are promised that their bodies will be resurrected. 



Lunch & Learn Report

On Friday April 13, the Rules & Regs and House Committees hosted a "Lunch & Learn" from 12-2 p.m. in the dining hall with all members invited. Our guest speakers were City of Woodburn Code Compliance Officer Nick Weathermon and recently retired City of Woodburn Building Official Steve Krieg. Lunch was provided and the turnout was great, with about 40 residents attending.

Officer Weathermon explained that he primarily enforces city ordinance violations. Code Enforcement can be called on items such as: weeds or grass 10" or taller between May 1 and September 30, trimming a "significant" tree without permitting through Public Works, and vehicles parked on the street for longer than 48 hrs. The City allows RVs to be parked on a street for loading and unloading purposes or while visiting the property as long as it's not being used for human occupancy. The time limit listed by the ordinance to be so parked is 48 hrs. The RV cannot be parked in a manner that creates a hazard or obstructs the view of other drivers. The time of the vehicle parked does not begin until Code Compliance is called and the vehicle is reported and marked. The number to report violations: 503-982-2345 and can be reported anonymously. Fines for violations or not correcting the above can be \$750/day.

Other topics discussed included nuisances such as "commercial grade lights" used as a porch light that glare into adjacent houses. The answer is that "only if the light isn't attached to the house" can Code Enforcement do anything. More serious questions were about houses with underage residents committing illegal transactions, noise, and general disturbance to the neighborhood. Weathermon said that the residents need to continue complaining to the WPD.

Solicitors are allowed to go door to door now selling anything from cookies to new siding, unless you have clearly posted a "NO SOLICITORS" sign by your front door. The audience was warned about recent calls to the WEG office where a group of people selling siding and roofing were saying they were endorsed by a Board member and using their name. No Board member ever endorses a contractor or service in WEG. It is up to you to do due diligence to check their CCB license or ask for referrals of their past jobs and to get more than one quote.

Ret. City Bldg. Official Krieg explained that as a Building Official, his job was to enforce State law and building code violations. Krieg spoke on some relevant topics we've seen in WEG such as; enclosed patios and what the State regulations say about them, adding a room, deck, or porch to your home and the requirements to stay in compliance. Krieg also covered what fines can be incurred if found, either the result of an Official happening to see the violation, or a neighbor reporting it to the City, and it is inspected and found to be in violation. In such cases the fine can vary, from \$750/per day to \$1,000/day depending on the severity.
