President Ken Bourne called the Meeting to order at 10 a.m. in the Dining Hall, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll Call: All Officers & Committee Chairmen/Representatives were present with the exceptions as noted in these Minutes. There were 30 members in attendance at today's Meeting.

New Members Present: None.

President's Report: President Bourne began his report by reiterating that when we are driving our golf carts we are subject to the same rules of the road as if we were driving our car. That means we must obey all traffic laws for our safety and the fact that a law enforcement officer could cite us for any violation of said laws. President Bourne then stated that the golf course maintenance crew will be working on the sand traps, ensuring that there is sufficient sand in each trap. He then reported that the winner of the 2018 Gene Finley Match Play Tournament was LeRoy Yoder. Additional information was then reported by President Bourne regarding the various tournaments to be held in August... Mixed Tournament on August 4th...End of Watch Tournament on August 11th... Snowbird Tournament...August 18th, 19th, and 20th...Harvest Invitational Tournament...August 24th, 25th, and 26th...Men's Golf Championship Tournament on August 30th, 31st, and September 1st.

Vice President's Report: VP Will Abshere was absent.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Allan Lindberg provided the following report: Beginning balance as of June 30th...\$3,609.74...Checks & Payments made...\$36.00 for donuts; \$9.58 for a 3 ring binder with 12 month divider tabs;

Secretary's Report: Secretary Chuck Johnson had nothing to report.

Committee Reports:

Greens: President Bourne announced that our representative, Dean Lambert, has resigned. Russ Krussow and Will Abshere will now act as our Greens Committee representatives. President Bourne then reported that the areas on the golf course where trees were removed and stump grinding occurred will be filled in with grass/sod. Bench Craft working on tee signs and their location. We are awaiting bids for the rebuilding of the Men's Tee Boxes on Holes 9, 11, and 14.

Handicap: Co-Chair Russ Krussow explained the 6-6-6 format for the Men's Golf Club Play to be held on August 2nd. He explained that only gross scores should be reported on each hole for the team as the computer program will determine net scores.

Mixed Tournaments: Representative Fred Bourne reported that everything is going well as to the Mixed Tournaments to be held on August 4th and September 3rd. He reminded the members of the Over 80 Tournament to be held on August 6th. Representative Bob Price reported that all sponsor funds have been collected for the Mixed Tournaments. He stated that we will have 100 golfers participating in the August 4th Tournament. Bob then reported that the Over 80 Tournament, sponsored by McCully Realty, will have 23 participants. WH Realty is the sponsor of our September 3rd Mixed Tournament.

Rules: Chairman Jim Hutchinson discussed rules relative to moveable obstructions on the golf course.

Sunshine: Chairman Ron Gripenstraw reported that cards were sent to the family of Clyde Leavitt and to Bunny Stiles, widow of Gene Stiles. Cards were also sent to Mike Dykes and to Russ Krussow. A card will be sent to Mike Archer who recently had a medical procedure.

OGA: Representative Paul Eaton reported that a USGA agronomist will soon be coming to the OGA course to provide consultation similar to what was done at our golf course. Our Head Pro Jason Hoth will be attendance during this consultation visit. Paul then reiterated the benefits of our membership in the OGA, encouraging members to view the OGA website for information on special offers as to merchandise, golfing sites, etc.

Membership: Chairman Stan Hiller reported that 248 golfers have paid the annual fee. The number of annual fee golfers continues to decline. He encouraged members to pick up their bag tags at the Pro Shop.

Unfinished Business: Nothing to report.

New Business: Fred Bourne reminded the members of the upcoming End of Watch Tournament to be held on August 11th. Fred stated that there are still openings for three more teams. Lady golfers in this tournament will play from the gold tees, men golfers from the white tees. Fred then stated that there are OGA golf members available as partners to play in the upcoming Harvest Invitational Tournament to be held on August 24th, 25th, and 26th.

Closing Comments: Allan Lindberg apologized that donuts were not purchased for the last computer pick Men's Golf Club Thursday Play as he was out of town on that date. Paul Eaton inquired as to what is going to be done with the left side of the fairway on hole number 11 where the cart path was removed. The issue will be presented to the Greens Committee. Len Westphal inquired as to why trees were removed near the tee box on hole number 11. Apparently, the removal was to provide a better view of the entire hole from tee box to the green. An issue was raised as to the safety of workers on the golf course as the workers seem to be oblivious to golfers playing a hole where they are working. President Bourne will report this issue to our golf course Superintendent Tim O'Larey. Steve Hobson inquired as to why our Men's Golf Club has little if no input on issues discussed in the Greens Committee. Russ and Will to follow up on this inquiry.

Door Prizes: The 50/50 Raffle was then held. The total money collected for today's raffle was \$68.00. LeRoy Yoder held the winning ticket and split the pot, winning \$34.00.

Closing: President Bourne asked for a motion to adjourn our Meeting, the motion made, seconded, approved, and the Meeting was adjourned at 10:35 a.m.

Golf Course Ad Hoc Committee Article with Survey

There has been recently considerable discussion among our members at Board Meetings under "open mic" regarding, but not limited to, what the name of our Association should be, should the golf course have a separate name, and what should the logo for our Association be. Our Board President Jim Taylor named Paula Kilgore, Secretary and Golf Chairperson, as Chairperson of the Golf Course Ad Hoc Committee. The purpose of the Golf Ad Hoc Committee is to gather input regarding these topics, along with associated topics, from you, the membership of our Association, and advise the Board, accordingly.

Members of the Golf Ad Hoc Committee solicited personal input from a number of the members of our Association, who had a variety of backgrounds. While considering whether our golf course should have a separate name from the Association, our Committee reviewed the evolution of the Association from Senior Estates Golf & Country Club to Senior Estates Golf & Country Club dba ("Doing Business As") Woodburn Estates & Golf. This brought the definitions of "Country Club" and "Estates" to our attention. We reviewed them in depth, so we would all be [on the] same page (i.e., Country Club is defined as "A private club where people go for social events and for social activities; such as swimming, golf and social clubs." Estates is defined as "an extensive area of land owned by one organization."). After discussing this evolution of the Association, the Committee agreed that both our identity and logo need to be more encompassing, looking forward, rather than just including golf. This could be accomplished by simply adding Country Club to the current identity of our Association, which is Woodburn Estates & Golf; however, more work would be involved if the logo were changed to depict more of what our Association has to offer. The latter is of concern at this time because it appears that most of our signs, especially the one in front of the Office Complex need to be refurbished. "What do you think about all of this?" Our Committee is seeking input from you, the membership of the Association, so we can advise the Board accordingly. What Is a Service Dog?

and How Do You Interact?

I was once a resident at Country Meadows Village and I am a person with legal blindness with the honor and privilege to be guided by my trained service dogs in safety throughout the US. I have had 4 dogs and have used public transit, including airplanes, buses and trains. I have had my dog at work, church, meetings and many different public and private events. I am aware of my responsibilities and rights.

Shayne, my current dog, is a black standard poodle, very well behaved - which means he is not aggressive, does not bark while in harness and working. Essentially, he does what he is told to do, unless he senses that I am in danger when he will refuse to enter the roadway or there is a drop off that is unsafe. He guides me by use of the handle on his leather harness. He does not need to wear a coat or bandana as his harness gives clear identification of his job.

The ADA and Oregon's laws require a service dog to do a job and be under my control, being well behaved in order to be allowed anywhere the public is welcomed, including all forms of transit, restaurants, meeting places, stores and workplaces, regardless of a no pet policy. Including motels. The discussions of allergies has been thoroughly debated and deemed by the Department of Justice (DOJ) as NOT a valid reason to bar a service dog from public spaces. They make the point that other humans who own pets at home carry dander on their clothes, in larger quantities than a single, well-groomed service dog does. That regular, effective cleaning is sufficient to remove any allergens the dog (or pet owners) leaves behind. As a note: Shayne, being a poodle, does not shed. And has far less dander than most. In any case, he is regularly groomed and bathed.

This does not mean he is perfect. And at times, he may bark once if suddenly surprised or wag his tail enthusiastically, hoping you will pet him. Please do not pet or touch him at all. Instead help him be a good dog by ignoring him. Do not make eye contact. Do not give him directions - instead talk to me. Yes, he is my eyes to find my way, yet, I decide where to go. He listens for my commands and can be distracted, thus place me in danger, by folks calling out to him. And for sure - please - no treats or food. He is on a veterinarian prescribed feeding regimen for both when and what. He gets sick and is trained to only eat out of his bowl or from me for his safety and well-being.


By the way, he is not required to have a coat. And it's illegal for you to demand that I prove to you that he is a service animal. The law allows you to ask: Is this dog a service animal and does he perform a job related to your disability? No more. You do have the right to ask any dog, even a service dog, to leave YOUR premises - if the dog is loose wandering on its own, barking and/or growling aggressively at other people or pets after being told to stop by its owner or is showing lack of good house manners - such as jumping or going potty indoors. If you are in a store or other public space, you need to talk to the manager or representative if you feel threatened by the dog. The dog handler is not required to answer everybody that asks about the dog.

I believe the respect you show the well-behaved service dog by ignoring it, and instead treating the person as you would any other, is an extension of your respect for the person with a disability. Asking unnecessary questions about the dogs right to be in the place are, at the least, annoying and a waste of time, at the worse detrimental to that person's ability to function in the world.

I hope you will introduce yourself to me as we meet in our community. I appreciate your willingness to abide by the laws and allow the very visible white cane and dog harness to tell you the answers to your question of whether the dog is a service animal and allowed wherever I go. The answer is yes!


