I am not on Nextdoor, but was told that recently there have been many comments regarding Woodburn Estates & Golf's Health Center, i.e. the swimming pool and exercise room. I was asked to include the swimming pool rules with this photo of Lorrie Cox and her granddaughter, so here goes...

Before entering the building, there is a sign that shows the pool hours and pool regulations. They are:

POOL HOURS: Adults, 5 a.m. to 9 p.m. Children under 18, 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. POOL REGULATIONS, MEMBERS AND GUESTS ONLY.

- All persons will take a cleansing shower before entering the pool.
- Persons with communicable diseases or bandages are not allowed in the pool or spa.
  - No person is allowed in pool alone.
- All non-swimmers and children younger than 18 shall be accompanied by a responsible member.
  - No street shoes allowed on the pool deck.

Once inside, there is a very large sign on the west wall between the entrances to the women's and men's dressing/shower rooms. These rules read as follows:

- Members must accompany guests.
- Pets are not permitted in this building.
- Guests: Please donate 50 cents each time the facility is used.
- Guests younger than 18 are not permitted in spa or exercise room.
- Guests younger than 4 are not permitted in swimming pool.
- Guests under 18 may use swimming pool from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. only.
- Lifesaving equipment is for emergency use only.
- Persons with communicable diseases, open sores or wounds, or bandages of any kind are not permitted in swimming pool or spa.
  - Diapers are not permitted in swimming pool or spa.
  - All persons will take soapy showers before entering swimming pool or spa.
  - Food and beverages are not permitted within this building or on the sundeck.
  - Bathing suits are not permitted in exercise room.
- Diving, running, or horseplay are not permitted in this building or on the sundeck.
  - Toys, innertubes, surfboards, etc. are not permitted in this building.
  - Lap swimmers have priority over casual swimmers.

Please, for everyone to be able to enjoy the pool, spa, and exercise room, FOLLOW THE RULES!

ALL OF THEM, even the ones you do not like. The rules are for everyone's safety. Thank you.

# Pool Rules Advice from a Centenarian

My dad, George Wood, was born in 1905 in Nova Scotia, Canada, where his family fled from the Colonies after the Revolutionary War along with 1700 other Loyalists. George lived to be over 100 and being the second youngest, outlived his parents, his seven siblings, his wife, his fishing buddies and in fact, most of the people he had known in his lifetime. At his 100th birthday party, he was surprised to see a few nephews he'd almost forgotten about.

As people disappeared from his life, he would tell his children, "Keep making new friends". When he met someone new he would often offer to take them clam digging or show them where old garbage dumps were where they might dig up an old bottle. His "Keep making new friends" became a mantra. Keeping friends around you is so important for your mental and emotional health. You don't need to grieve alone.

Another way that he survived so much sadness was to never lose his sense of humor. I didn't know his father but his mother had a sharp wit, as did his siblings. Whenever any of them got together, the laughter was non-stop. They could see the ridiculous side of anything. The mantra was "Laugh it off".

Dad's sister, Nellie, had many terrible things happen in her life. Her oldest daughter's husband disappeared to dodge the draft, leaving his wife with a daughter to raise.

Nellie's youngest son disappeared at the Bremerton boat docks while in the navy. She and her husband were accused of killing him for the insurance and were even forced to dig up the new concrete my dad had helped them pour on the floor of their egg candling room to prove they hadn't buried the body there.

In the late stages of alcoholism, her husband built a fire in the oven of their new electric stove, thinking it was their old wooden stove, and on and on. Through it all, she could be her silly self when we would go there to buy her eggs and she and dad would argue over the change.

So – keep making new friends and don't take life so seriously. You may not live to be 100, but you will be happier.

#### **Men's Golf General Meeting Minutes**

#### Woodburn Estates Men's Golf General Meeting September 5, 2018

President Ken Bourne called the Meeting to order at 10 a.m. in the Dining Hall, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

**Roll Call:** All Officers & Committee Chairmen/Representatives were present. There were 33 members in attendance at today's Meeting.

**New Members Present:** None

President's Report: President Bourne began his report by informing the members that prior member, Mike Delnick, had passed away. A Sympathy Card to be sent to his widow, JoAnne, was then passed around for members to sign. President Bourne then reported that the Club Champion for this year is Len Westphal. A discussion then ensued as to the low participation of golfers in the Club Championship this year. To increase the prize money to winners, President Bourne made a motion to use \$50 of the Club's funds toward payouts, motion seconded, and unanimously approved. Our next General Membership Meeting will be held at 10 a.m. on October 3rd. Following the Meeting, a luncheon will be catered by the Country Cottage, free to men members and lady golfers, paid for by the 50/50 raffle money. President Bourne then made a motion that in the event the funds from the 50/50 raffle are insufficient to cover the cost of the luncheon that the balance be paid by Club funds, motion seconded, and unanimously passed. President Bourne then made another motion that, following the luncheon, a Mixed 9 Hole Scramble be played, motion seconded, and unanimously passed. A sign-up sheet for the luncheon and golf will be posted in the Pro Shop. President Bourne then passed around a card to be given to our former head Pro, Chuck Siver, who is retiring on September 9th. Donations were asked for to buy Chuck a gift card from Starbucks. A surprise party will honor Chuck on September 9th from 11 a.m. - 3 p.m. President Bourne concluded his report by stating that the plaques in the Golf Lounge will soon be updated, reflecting winners in 2017 & 2018.

Vice President's Report: VP Will Abshere reminded members that our Annual Meeting will be held on October 3rd at 10 a.m. Election for Officers will take place at this Meeting. Will then reported that on Tuesday, September 11th, the 9 Hole Men's Group will play a Mixed Scramble with the 9 Hole Ladies Group. A drawing will be held at 8:30 a.m. to determine teams and a shotgun start will happen at 9 a.m.

**Treasurer's Report:** Treasurer Allan Lindberg provided the following report: Beginning Balance as of August 1st...\$3,610.90...Deposits...\$100 (new members); \$34 (50/50 raffle); \$00.15 interest...Checks & payments made...\$175 (OGA for 5 members); \$40.23 (Kustom Kreations jacket for LeRoy Yoder); \$36 for donuts; \$00.04 (interest adjustment). Ending Balance...\$3,493.78. As of August 30th, we have 132 members in the Men's Golf Club. The 50/50 Raffle balance as of August 30th is \$526.00

**Secretary's Report:** Secretary Chuck Johnson had nothing to report. **Committee Reports:** 

Greens: VP Will Abshere reported in detail the activities of our golf course maintenance crew that included: Monday maintenance going well, bunkers being edged, greens verticut, top dressed, excess dirt being placed near the 12th green, drainage on 17th hole has been completed, trees removed & area repaired, weeding and reseeding left side of the 11th hole, 6 new trees to be planted to replace those removed, bids are out for renovation of tee boxes on holes 9, 11, & 14, cart path traffic redirected following the 18th hole, cover over the practice area and a unisex bathroom in the old storage area to be handled by the House Director, drainage problem around the Pro Shop to be addressed, a USGA tracking device being used by golfers to show course usage, 11th hole had tree removal to improve the view of the hole, etc. Other issues brought up by members in attendance included: workers continue to be oblivious as to their safety on the course when golfers are on the course; why do the Men's Golf Club have limited input relative to the Greens Committee; why is some of our course not irrigated properly (redo of the irrigation system in progress); need more sand in the practice bunker; need signage to direct golfers not familiar with our course (e.g., direction to the back 9, directions to bathrooms, etc.); rings in the cups need to be installed deeper; and need the new forward tees rated for men golfers.

*Handicap:* Co-Chair Russ Krussow reported that there will be a Glo-Ball Tournament held on the evening of October 5th.

Mixed Tournaments: Representative Fred Bourne stated that at the October 3rd Annual Meeting there will be 3x5 cards passed out for members to vote as to after tournament dinner times...remain at 2:30 pm or change to 5 pm. Fred stated that the dinners will continue to be basic, but will attempt to vary the menu. The Alternate Shot Tournament planned for this weekend will provide beer and pop. Fred along with Bob and Vickie Hibberd will handle the Mixed Tournaments in 2019.

*Rules:* Chairman Jim Hutchinson will be reviewing rule changes for 2019 at our Meetings. He will also post a summary of the rule changes in the Pro Shop.

*Sunshine:* Chairman Ron Gripenstraw sent out two cards to Mike Archer and Bob Smith regarding recent medical procedures. He will be sending out appropriate cards to Larry Stewart and Don Peters.

*OGA*: Representative Paul Eaton reported that the OGA Course has twilight rates beginning at 1 p.m. and a super twilight rate beginning at 4 p.m.

*Membership:* Chairman Stan Hiller requested that all members pick up their bag tags at the Pro Shop. He is now a Woodburn Chamber ambassador and stated he will attempt to have the Chamber's Annual Golf Tournament played at our golf course next year, depending on the bid submitted.

**Unfinished Business:** Nothing to report

**New Business:** There will be an Alternate Shot Tournament this weekend, September 8th & 9th. Entry fee is \$15.00 per player. There will be a drawing to partner with our head Pro Jason Hoth. Men and Women are welcome to play in this tournament. Ladies will play from the forward tees. Deadline for sign up is this Friday, September 7th.

Closing Comments: Allan Lindberg stated that he would like another member to take over the Treasurer's position. President Bourne will record/verify the voucher entries in concert with the Treasurer beginning immediately. Fred Bourne stated that our head Pro Jason Hoth now has a swing speed monitor. President Bourne then stated that this swing speed monitor will be used in an upcoming Swing Speed Tournament. Allan Lindberg then clarified an issue regarding the Snowbird Tournament. He observed that registered openers were not present during Happy Hour and reported the matter to the Rules Director, but never intended the report to be considered a complaint. Fred Bourne reported that there would be a "Texas Hold 'em" event to be held on Friday, September 21st, at 5:30 p.m. Dennis Wichert reported that a GPS device had been found and turned into the Pro Shop. Jerry Marvin thanked the membership for the card he recently received from the Men's Golf Club.

**Door Prizes:** The 50/50 Raffle was then held. The total money collected for today's raffle was \$62.00. Jerry Biddle held the winning ticket and split the pot, winning \$31.00.

**Closing:** President Bourne asked for a motion to adjourn our Meeting, the motion made, seconded, approved, and the Meeting was adjourned at 11 a.m.

A small article in the Woodburn Independent on September 19, 2018, gave notice of the passing of John "Pink" T. Miller. The following was related by John Miller and his daughter, Dodi in 2011.

"Pink" and "Duff" Miller moved to Senior Estates in 1988. After Duff's death in 2010, Pink continued to live in the house they built and remodeled on the sixth green of the golf course. He loved watching the action on the golf course from his recliner on the back deck, bird families joining him throughout the spring and summer months.

Over the years both Pink and Duff were involved in the planning and politics of the Senior Estates Golf & Country Club. They enjoyed many functions, use of the swimming pool and played hundreds of rounds of golf. They especially enjoyed the barbecues at the gazebo and the many friends they made at these

John T. "Pink" Miller drilled the original water wells for Senior Estates Golf & Country Club, before it was the current corporation. It was then called the Senior Citizens of the West, Inc.

"This land was some of the worst land in the area! It was a swamp. When those people first came to me and asked me to drill a water well, they said it needed to serve ten houses, because they were not sure if the idea was even going to take off.

Now, there are 1,600\* homes here and it's the best place on earth!"

The first well was started on November 3, 1960, and completed on December 15, 1960. It was a 12-inch well drilled to a completed depth of 157 feet. The well tested at 500 gallons per minute and cost the Senior Citizens of the West, Inc. a total of \$2,654.00.

The second well was started on November 15, 1961, and completed on November 27, 1961. It was a 16-inch well drilled to a completed depth of 152 feet. The well tested at 600 gallons per minute. The cost to Senior Estates (previously Senior Citizens of the West, Inc.) was \$2,507.00.

The third well was drilled in July or August of 1965. It was also a 16-inch well drilled to a completed depth of 155 feet. The Water Well report for this well was not available, but the invoice shows the cost to be \$2,580.00.

I sent copies of the well paperwork to Tim O'Larey in 2011 after it was received. Tim stated, "When we were digging around for information on the water rights issue a few years back, Pink Miller came up to me on the golf course and said he was the one who drilled the wells, but to see it on paper and what he actually did is great."

# **How Can the**

There have been questions by some members about the use of the Reserve Fund. The questions center on the expansion of the fitness center and paying for the construction from the Reserve.

The issue arises when members read the Oregon States Statutes about HOA Reserve Funds being only for repair and replacement. This is true for HOAs formed after October, 1996 when the Reserve requirement came to be. HOAs that were organized prior to October, 1996 were exempt from the requirement. I don't know the details of the decision but my guess is that it had to do with existing CC&Rs and the difficulty in getting members to vote and especially vote for increases in their costs. Making the Reserve a requirement at formation made adoption easy.

Even though the Reserve wasn't a requirement a past board made the decision to adopt having a Reserve fund. Because it was a choice that WEG board and future WEG boards had the flexibility to decide whether to restrict using the funds for repairs and replacement only or using it for new construction as well. The option was left open and so each board can make the decision on new construction.

# Rumor Control at Woodburn Estates & Golf

Dear Members.

As a Woodburn City Councilor, Ward IV, which encompasses a large portion of Woodburn Estates & Golf, I take issue with part of the General Manager, Tom Staskiewicz's "GM Report" to the Board of Directors on July 24, 2018, and published in the *News & Views* on September 14, 2018.

In Mr. Staskiewicz's report he stated he learned that the City has a plan that if the golf course was ever eliminated it would be replaced by high density housing. And also stated he was in conversation with Woodburn Estates & Golf attorney to determine what can be done to protect the integrity of Woodburn Estates & Golf.

Following his report a few members approached me asking if this is true. I contacted Woodburn City Administrator, Scott Derickson and learned another concerned constituent living in Woodburn Estates & Golf was upset and alarmed by these assertions and felt the City might be trying to take the golf courses in order to build apartments.

Mr. Derickson addressed these assertions directly to me as City Councilor via an email on July 31, 2018. See below.

"First, any statement to the effect that the City of Woodburn plans to develop The Estates' golf courses into residential units is simply false. There are no plans, proposals, discussions, efforts or interest in seeing the golf courses converted to housing or any other use either now or in the future. In fact, this is the first time I have ever heard of such a notion. I also checked with Woodburn's Planning & Community Development Department and they have never heard of this either.'

'The Estates holds the golf courses in private ownership, not the City. I cannot envision any scenario that would result in the courses reverting to City ownership even if The Estates decided to "eliminate" golf. Additionally, per the City's development and zoning ordinances, the courses are zoned P/SP (Public/Semi-Public) and as such, are treated as parks. Even if the golf courses were no longer used for playing golf, the zoning restrictions would remain in effect. On a related note, the City is not aware of any effort to "eliminate" golf at The Estates, sell the golf courses to a third party developer or change the existing P/SP zoning. Such actions would likely violate the conditions of approval granted to The Estates as part of their original planning."

"Nor has The Estates' legal counsel contacted the City on this matter. Nonetheless, I would encourage The Estates's legal counsel, or any other representative, to contact me anytime rumors such as these pop-up. It is always best to address rumors directly so that accurate information can be relayed to the public."

"Please note that I have copied the entire City Council on this email. I assume the "GM's Report" may be making its way through the community and I want to keep Councilors apprised should anyone get a call from a concerned constituent."


