#### Info on Local Option Levy (24-433)

n the November ballot, voters within the Woodburn Fire District will be considering whether or not to approve a five-year local option levy. The Fire District would like to provide some information about the District and the levy to help voters make an informed decision.

The Woodburn Fire District provides fire suppression, emergency medical care, and rescue services to more than 37,000 residents in the communities of Woodburn, Gervais and the surrounding areas within the 75 square miles served by the District.

In addition to emergency response, the Woodburn Fire District provides public education in fire prevention, fire and life safety code enforcement inspections in schools, retirement homes and businesses, review of development plans to ensure adequate water supply and emergency access and a wide variety of community involvement activities and public assistance.

The Woodburn Fire District uses a combination of career and volunteer firefighters to meet its mission to the community. The District currently staffs one full-time emergency response engine with career firefighters. When multiple 9-1-1 calls are received or an incident requires multiple fire response units, the District relies on volunteers and offduty firefighters responding from home and assistance from neighboring fire districts to respond to the emergency.

If approved by voters, funds from the levy would have the following impacts on the District's emergency response capabilities:

- Ensure that four firefighter/medics are on duty each day in the Fire District. Four firefighters at the scene of an emergency are able to take more immediate action to fight fire and save lives without needing to wait up to 15 minutes for responders from home or neighboring fire districts. For example, when four firefighters arrive at the scene of a fire, one firefighter is needed to establish a water supply from a hydrant, a second firefighter operates the pump that receives the hydrant water and charges the fire attack hose lines and the remaining two firefighters enter the burning structure to extinguish the fire and search for trapped occupants. Similar efficiencies are gained with four firefighters at critical medical emergencies and serious motor vehicle accidents. Current budget limitations result in the engine being staffed with only three firefighters on many days.
- Provide Advanced Life Support Training to a select group of current firefighters. Firefighters with Advanced Life Support training are able to bring near emergency room level of assistance to patients having a medical emergency. The Woodburn Fire District and the Woodburn Ambulance Service work in close partnership to treat over 1,000 patients annually. Firefighters typically arrive at the address first and begin patient care. Firefighters with Advanced Life Support skills would be able to provide an elevated level of life-saving treatments while waiting for the ambulance. When the ambulance arrives, firefighters transfer care to the ambulance crew and assist with loading the patient for transport to the hospital. Funds from the levy would ensure that one of the four firefighters on-duty each day would have Advanced Life Support skills.
- Help the District's ability to cover multiple emergency calls that occur on a near daily basis in the District. The Fire District responds to more than 2,700 emergency calls each year. Studies have shown that when annual emergency responses exceed 2,500, the likelihood of the engine being engaged at a previous emergency when a second or third call is received increases significantly. Annually, the Woodburn Fire District is experiencing over 300 overlapping emergency calls. When four firefighters are on-duty, the District has the ability, with the assistance from volunteers, to staff a second emergency response vehicle at the station which helps to more effectively handle the multiple calls. With the expected growth in the area over the next five years, the overall demand for emergency service and the occurrence of overlapping calls are both expected to increase.
- **Prevent Staff Reductions.** The men and women of the Woodburn Fire District work hard to be good stewards of the financial resources that are provided. Despite efforts to control expenses, increasing operational costs have required the District to draw from reserve funds this fiscal year to maintain all existing firefighting personnel. Additional funds from the levy would provide adequate funding for all of the current staff and prevent firefighter lay-offs in July of 2019. If additional funding is not approved, Fire District members will continue to strive to provide the best possible level of service with a reduced staff.

Emergency Services from the Woodburn Fire District are funded by property taxes. The proposed five-year levy would add an additional tax of thirty-five cents per thousand of assessed property value. It is important to note that the assessed value of real estate is often less than the market value. For a home assessed at \$160,000, about average for the District, the cost of the proposed levy would be about \$56 for the first year or about \$5 dollars per month.

The members of the Woodburn Fire District appreciate the opportunity to serve the community. Please remember to vote by November 6, 2018.

# **Dear Neighbors and Fellow Community** Residents

Having lived here for 10 months, I have grown to appreciate the community, the friendly nature of the residents and the activities afforded us. I like living here. Yet, as much as I appreciate the benefits, I am frustrated by the behavior of some residents. At least a couple in my immediate vicinity. Specifically, it is their lack of consideration for neighbors who are subjected to incessant dog barking. I am a dog lover and a dog owner. Yep, dogs bark. Comes with the rest of the package. But a dog's behavior is a reflection of its owner. Owners should be involved. It is a responsibility of pet ownership to encourage proper behavior. We also have a responsibility to our immediate neighbors and the community at large to keep disturbing barking minimized.

Training and correcting undesirable behavior is critical in this regard. I am not suggesting the "dog whisperer" be hired. But there are a few simple things any owner can do to minimize their dog's barking when outside. First, never, ever, leave a dog outside unsupervised. Particularly if the dog is prone to barking. This is just plain inconsiderate and rude. It is also helpful to correct the dog as soon as it barks. It may be a simple verbal command or perhaps a "time out" indoors. Works for my dog. There are also training devices available such as bark collars and bark silencers. Bark collars work with a mild electric shock. Silencers rely on an ultrasonic beep that only dogs can hear. These are not torture devices. Dogs are smart. They quickly associate the shock or beep with their barking which is thus curtailed. Then they can be weaned off of the device as the behavior improves. Otherwise, incessant barking becomes a frustration point between neighbors and it shouldn't be that way. Please be aware of how your dog(s) behave and correct and train accordingly. Your neighbors are counting on you.

# Scammers in WEG

Neighbors, we need your help in referrals of businesses hired to update your property. If they are not in the phone directory, please ask them to advertise with us either in the *News & Views* newspaper or our annual directory.

If you use someone in the directory and the business does a poor job, please report it to the office so we can remove that business from our directory.

If the business advertises and does a good job, be sure to thank them for advertising in our directory.

The business record shown above scammed several Woodburn Estates & Golf neighbors. Always ask for referrals from where they have done work. Always check their Construction Contractors Board (CCB) number to see if it is current. Only pay the small down payment required if you know they are okay on CCB. Never pay the full price of the job until you are satisfied with the work done.

When we investigated King Kong Construction, we found their CCB had been revoked and their Portland location had never been licensed. Be aware!

#### **Contractor License Search**

The most accurate way to look up a business license is with a CCB license number. Contractors must put this number on their advertising, including brochures, websites, and business cards. Ask the contractor for the CCB number, if necessary. There are many ways to search a business.

# "eRATicating" the Problem. Part 2

Here at Woodburn Estates & Golf we own our property. As homeowners we have certain rights and responsibilities. One item is to protect our property from critters like rats. This will be addressed in this article.

**Rats multiply:** Everyone knows that but do you know at what rate? The rats around here are Norway Rats. One mating pair can produce 100s of new baby rats a year. The gestation period is about 21 to 24 days and they can have 6 to 10 pups at a time and can repeat this about every 30 days! Generally, litters will be made up of half males, half females. One female can produce as many as 120 babies in one year, and each of her female offspring can be capable of producing their own young at the age of 6 weeks. That is a lot of rats!

Rats can jump up to 3 feet, and jump down 25 feet to 30 feet without hurting themselves. Trapping rats is good but when you look at the whole picture, trapping one rat at a time is like a drop in the bucket compared to how fast they multiply. Tech-savvy people have used motion detector cameras to detect movement when the rats are moving around.

Where RATS like to live: Rats like to be in and around arborvitae hedges. The arborvitae hedges hide them from view at the ground level and even when they are in or at the top of these hedges. These hedges are great looking but also make a great place for the rats to get around undetected.

Be aware: At night when you are in your home and you hear a little sound and can't quite recognize it but your dog goes over to the heater vent and scratches, it may be that the rats have gone into the walls of your house. The sound and smell of the rats can be detected by the dog. The dog scratches the heater vents to let you know that something is wrong.

What adds to the problem: The biggest problem is BIRD FEEDERS so let's clean up around the bird feeders. Birds only eat what they want and the rest they let drop to the ground and the rats just love to eat it and raise havoc. Eliminate the food that falls on the ground and don't let the rats get it. Please monitor the bird feeders. Clean up the ground as the birds will not eat what is on the ground. Do NOT fill the feeders to the FULL level as most of it will wind up on the ground. Do not have the bird feeders too close to the house. When a bird feeder is close to the house the excess drops to the ground and attracts rats to eat that food and also to try to get into the underneath of your the house. They love a nice warm shelter.

Other food sources: This information is good for skunks and opossum also. Rotten fruit and vegetables on the ground and ripened fruit in the trees should be cleaned up often. Composting piles (unless the composter is self-contained) is another attractant. Also, dispose of your garbage properly. When it rains, rats and ants need to have a dry warm place to go. Guess where that is? Yep, under the house. This is where rats can chew wires and possibly start a house fire. Ants are just troublesome and unsanitary. Use a professional exterminator or get poison from the store to kill the rats and ants. This will take several sessions to get rid of

**Plumbers, cable or internet installers:** When you have something installed in your home like cable; internet, etc. the installer may not properly cover the holes that go under the house to keep rats out. You should check to see that this is done properly. Go outside and check your vents to see if any of them are open. If you see that all the holes are closed off then critters should not be able to get under your house where they can get into the walls and chew wires which can cause fires. Vent covers are usually a mesh screen which, if it is replaced, use stainless steel mesh as the rats cannot chew through it and stainless steel mesh will not rust.

**Hoarding:** This can also cause problems, especially if the property is not kept free of debris. Debris can be overgrown vegetation. We could all help one another in all aspects of getting rid of this problem of rats and help out our neighbors at the same time. If you are capable of cleaning your neighbor's property, and they are not, then it would be the neighborly thing to do and help them out. That neighbor could possibly do something nice for you. Just a thought.

How to correct the problem: The problem is beyond individual effort and needs a total neighborhood approach to solving it. If possible, the whole community of Woodburn Estates & Golf®- all at the same time - could work together to help clean up the neighborhood. Hire an exterminator and let them handle the situation. Get rid of the bird feeders. Yes, we know you like to watch the birds, but to help all of us here why not clean up the bird food? We are asking that all residents help out with this problem. Let's get rid of the rats!

Clean up the yards and gardens: If you have a mess in your yard, clean it up. Debris in the yard provides a place where rats love to hide. If you have a garden, be sure to keep fruits and vegetables picked up. If you have an arborvitae hedge, clean up the bottom of the hedge which takes away the space for the rats. Rats do not like to be in plain sight and this helps keep them away from your yard.

**Baiting and trapping:** This is another way to go, but remember to keep poisons way from areas to which pets have access. Use caution when using traps. Don't put out open rat bait. Use the closed stations to put your traps in so your pets can't eat the bait/poison. We don't like the rats, but we love our pets!

Outdoor Feeding: Do not feed your pets or stray animals outside as the leftover food will draw rats. Even water dishes help attract rats to your house.





Noisy Bells: To scare away critters, hang bells. Someone I know did this and the rat took off like a jet and they have not seen it again.

Possible temporary ban on bird feeders and composting: If all else fails, and the population of rats keeps increasing, the next step may be a temporary ban on bird feeders and composting (except the enclosed composting units).

#### We contacted a local Pest control company:

Matt White of Killers Pest Elimination says that he has been in this industry for 24 years and in the last 5 years he has seen the population of rats explode in Woodburn Estates & Golf. Matt wishes the rat problem would just go away but also knows that is an unreasonable thought. Killers Pest Elimination not only treats for rats but also for ants and carpenter ants. Happily, he has not seen termites here. Some of the services his company offers is:

- Look to secure home. Check Foundation, vents, garage door.
- Bait and Trap Bait works best in the outdoors. They use a bait station that is a hard plastic locking box that weights 10 to 12 pounds and stays dry longer. They will come out periodically to check the traps. They use the kind of trap that holds the poison so only the rats can get to the poison and not small animals like dogs and cats.
  - Spray under and outside walls and spray wall space.

#### **Special Offer for Woodburn Estates & Golf:**

Matt White grew up in the Woodburn area so he is a native of Woodburn. Killers charges about \$595 for 1 year warranty, this includes 3 to 4 treatments a year. Matt has a special for Woodburn Estates & Golf members and he is the one to speak to if you want to get your neighbors together to take advantage of Matt's offer for small groups

If you can get your neighbors to form a group, call him he will be willing to give a price of about \$400 for each household in the group. This is nearly a \$200 savings. This is an even bigger savings over the folks in the Salem Metro area whose charges can range \$500 to \$1000.

Matt can be reached at 503-981-2270 or www.thekillers.net. Also, Matt's wife is a member of "Lost & Found Pets of Woodburn" and "Lost & Found Pets of Salem". If you ever have the need to contact a helpful person in finding or acquiring a pet, Matt's wife is the go-to person.

Unless we can stop the rats, or kill them all, we still need to at least monitor them and do what we can to get rid of them before we have to give them our houses. We as a group can take care of this problem if we work together. We can work with our neighbors and, as a group, decide to remove the bird feeders and clean up our garden crops. Rats stockpile their food enough for a two week supply so NOT having food in bird feeders or gardens to eat from for about six weeks is more likely to not give the rats food to eat and they would starve or move on.

If you are thinking of doing something about the rats, **NOW** is the time to act.

Climb the Great Wall?


See a favorite movie more than once?


