

Grand Opening of New Exercise Rehab Room

Smith Creek Development Planning Commission Hearing

n September 27, the Planning Commission held the first public hearing on the Smith Creek Development Project (Smith Creek). Over the course of five to eight years, Stafford Land Company plans to develop approximately 150 acres, located generally north and west of 690 Ben Brown Lane on what was the Smith family farm. The Smith Creek Development is residential, consisting of over 800 dwelling units in the form of over 600 houses, almost 100 townhouses and over 100 multi-family units (i.e. apartments).

As proposed, the first phase extends Ben Brown Lane west to a southern extension of Harvard Drive. Amenities include, per the City Mill Creek Greenway Master Plan:

A cycling and walking path between S. Settlemier Avenue and Stubb Road along the west tributary of Mill Creek a combination of private common open spaces and public park land.

The Commission heard public testimony from the applicant, representatives from the owner of the property, and from neighbors surrounding the proposed development. The window for submitting written testimony ended a week after the Commission hearing. The Planning Commission will meet October 11 to hear the applicant respond to the testimony, deliberate on the project, and make a recommendation to the City Council, which is the deciding body and will hold its own public hearing with opportunity to testify in person or in writing. The Commission will not hear additional testimony.

The Council hearing is tentatively scheduled for a special date of Monday, October 29.

Men's Golf General Meeting Minutes

Woodburn Estates Men's Golf General Meeting October 3, 2018

President Ken Bourne called the Meeting to order at 10:00 AM in the Dining Hall, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll Call: All Officers & Committee Chairmen/Representatives were present except as noted in this report. There were 42 members in attendance at today's Meeting.

New Members Present: None.

Head Pro Report: Jason Hoth thanked the members who played in the Swing Speed Tournament, held on Sunday, September 30th. Jason then read the winners who participated in the tournament, stating also that the total payout was \$550.00.

President's Report: President Bourne welcomed the members to our Annual Meeting. He then discussed the luncheon and 9-hole Scramble Event to begin shortly after today's Meeting. The luncheon and the Scramble Event will include members of the Ladies Golf Club. There will be a 1 PM shotgun start and no handicaps will be involved as this will be an event for fun and to acquaint our members with members of the Ladies Golf Club. President Bourne then congratulated member Mike Archer for his recent hole in one on hole number 11. President Bourne concluded his remarks by stating that today's election for officers for 2019 will be conducted by Vice President Will Abshere.

Vice President's Report: VP Will Abshere stated that Ken Bourne has been declared our President for 2019 via acclamation. There were also no nominees for Vice President; therefore, Will Abshere will be our Vice President for 2019 via acclamation. The position of Treasurer has two nominees for next year...Allan Lindberg and Mark Jorgensen. VP Abshere requested that during our Meeting, those members who desire to vote for Treasurer to quietly move to the back of the room to cast their vote. The results of the vote for Treasurer will be announced at the end of our Meeting.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Allan Lindberg was absent with notice. Secretary Chuck Johnson read Allan's report as follows: Beginning Balance as of September 1st...\$3,493.78...Deposits...\$196.00...

Interest...\$00.15...Ending Balance as of September 30...\$3,689.93. As of September 30th, we have 141 members in the Men's Golf Club. The 50/50 Raffle balance as of September 30th is \$562.00.

Secretary's Report: Secretary Chuck Johnson had nothing to report.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

OGA: Representative Paul Eaton reported that at this time the OGA does not plan to raise the annual membership dues.

Greens: VP Will Abshere reported that there would be no Greens Committee Meeting in October. He then reported on the September Meeting of the Greens Committee as follows: the golf course maintenance crew performed the following service: grass sod placed over the sewer repair area; mounds near the 12th hole have been created; 6 trees to be planted to replace trees removed; aeration of the greens, fairways, and approaches. There will be 5 employees on the maintenance crew during the winter months. Will then reminded members to follow the arrows placed on the parking lot when approaching the tenth green and when concluding their round. He also reiterated that when in our golf cart, we must obey rules of the road, including stopping at stop signs. A number of concerns were then expressed by members present, including the need for more sand in the practice bunker, rings in the cups often placed too high, the need for the OGA to provide a slope rating on the new forward tees for male golfers, ground under repair needs to be so marked, and the work being done on the left side of hole number 11. Will concluded his remarks by stating that the 2019 Golf Schedule has been approved by the Board of Directors and that the Glow-Ball Tournament is scheduled for the evening of October 5th.

Handicap: Co-Chair Russ Krussow asked that local numbers again be recorded on the score cards as often it is difficult to even read the names as written on the cards. He then stated that the 2019 Rule Books are available for purchase at a cost of \$4.00 each if ordered in bulk. Members present expressed a desire to acquire the 2019 Rule Book and it was agreed that the Club would reimburse the Pro Shop for books ordered. Russ then discussed the OGA guidelines regarding scoring events, stating that he attempts to follow their guidelines as closely as possible. There have been questions as to the 10 stroke limitation in Two Person Best Ball formats. Russ pointed out that tournament events require a great deal of effort and time on the part of the handicap co-chairs. He then pointed out that the OGA annual billing structure has changed to December 31st each year. That means that if "snowbirds" head out prior to paying for the next year's dues, they may be deactivated while at their winter destination. This billing change will be published in the News & Views and posted in the Pro Shop and/or Lounge. Russ concluded by stating that Sid Longest is a new member of the Handicap Committee. Co-Chair Clint Hansen then discussed the USGA's position as to what events are deemed to be considered a tournament. Clint then stated that when a tournament involves a second date where there has been a new handicap change (every first and fifteenth of the month), the current handicap will be used when scoring the tournament.

Mixed: Representative Fred Bourne stated that the Ladies Golf Club conducted a vote as to when after-tournament dinners will be held, choosing between the current time of 2:30 PM and a proposed time of 5 PM. The Ladies Golf Club voted in favor of keeping the 2:30 PM dinner time. A vote was then taken among our members present and the vote was in favor of keeping the 2:30 PM dinner time.

Sunshine: Chairman Ron Gripenstraw sent out two cards during the month to Larry Stewart and Don Peters.

Rules: Chairman Jim Hutchinson reviewed the new rule changes for 2019. A vote was conducted among members present regarding a possible adoption of local rules involving lost and OB balls and removing a ball from a sand bunker with a two stroke penalty. The members present voted to not adopt the suggested local rules and maintain play as to lost balls, OB balls, and balls in a sand bunker.

Membership: Chairman Stan Hiller requested that all members readily pick up their bag tags at the Pro Shop. He stated that based on bag tags made, we have 16 less golfers paying the annual golf dues when compared with last year.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS: Nothing to report.

NEW BUSINESS: VP Abshere collected the results of the voting for the Treasurer for 2019. The candidate receiving the most votes was Mark Jorgensen. Mark will be our Treasurer in 2019. The Secretary of the Club serves at the request and pleasure of the President of our Club and is not an officer of the Club.

CLOSING COMMENTS: Fred Bourne reported that there will be a Texas Hold 'em Event held on October 20th. A question was raised as to why the Club did not use any Club funds in the annual Turkey Shoot. A question was raised as to why members choose to play in a "money game" on Thursday rather than play in the Men's Golf Club Thursday Play. Clint Hansen then thanked members for their support and Clint acknowledged the many hours that Russ Krussow spends as a co-chair of the Handicap Committee.

Door Prizes: The 50/50 Raffle was then held. The total money collected for today's raffle was \$118.00. Dave Schuur held the winning ticket and split the pot, winning \$59.00.

CLOSING: President Bourne asked for a motion to adjourn our Meeting, the motion made, seconded, approved, and the Meeting was adjourned at 11:05 AM.

NOTE: OUR NEXT GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING WILL BE HELD IN THE DINING HALL AT 10 AM ON WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 7, 2018.

I suppose some of you have heard the saying, "telling tales out of school." It was first recorded in the 1500's. At that time it alluded to school children gossiping and later broadened to include anyone spreading misinformation. Surely, you have all been party to those juicy secrets whispered and soon carried on foul breezes to first one recipient and then another.

Well, the back story is far more impressive, and accredited as well. Trust me, I would never lie!

I worked for the Monarchy for nearly 13 years. First, as a companion to His Highness, and later my duties came to include keeping an eye on the maintenance of his personal rooms and a nearby schoolhouse as well. You could say we grew up together.

In January of 1547, Edward VI was crowned King of England and Ireland. It was a surprise to many, as at that time he was but 9 years old. He was also the first monarch to be raised as a Protestant. Early on, the King showed more compassion for the lowly than many previous Kings. He (along with his Regency) instituted reforms that caused unrest and rioting. There would be brief periods of time when he just asked that I sit with him quietly. When he felt better, he might talk of plans for the future of England. By this time, a truce had been made with Scotland at great financial hardship to the Monarchy. Nevertheless, he still had goals for the future, and the welfare of all his subjects.

In May of 1553, even though his illness was deemed terminal and his Council had drawn up a "Devise for the Succession" to prevent the country's return to Catholicism, I truly thought he had experienced a miracle and been healed. He bounded out of bed shortly after I entered the room and declared that we were going to the schoolhouse to see "the boys."

He was glad to get back into a routine, and remarked on how well I had managed in his absence. I did have a sense of pride, but tried not to strut about. After-all, I am but one of many necessary to keep the country running. Once at the schoolhouse, I was left to my own devices. Edward conferred with the Headmaster, while I inspected the structure. I then took a seat near the doorway and watched His Highness. He had such a wistful countenance, and as he turned to leave, he whispered for my ear only, "How I wish I were but a poor lad rather than a King." This is the first time I've told anyone.

My Dear Edward died in August of that very same year. He was only 15. At that time, my only duty became protecting the schoolhouse from vermin. And so, I'm the cat, let out of the bag, "telling tales out of school."





Favorite Thanksgiving Dinner

My friend Angela Ayres. Angela lives in Portland, but grew up in Lima, Peru. She married a Reed College chemistry professor who was in Peru climbing the Andes. When our children were young, we did a lot of camping together and have always shared a love of gardening. It has often been my good fortune to be invited to eat at her house. The tastiest Thanksgiving dinner I ever ate was prepared by her. She agreed to let me share her recipes:

HERB TURKEY

Thaw turkey; remove giblets and wash turkey. Stuff with dressing below.

Rub lemon, salt, pepper & thyme inside of the turkey. Rub garlic, salt, pepper, thyme & rosemary on the outside. Place in a large pan on a layer of vegetables and water. Cook at 325 degrees F, breast down for 2 ½ hours. Turn up and add herbs again. Bake 18 minutes per pound. Can baste with this mixture: Cook giblets and add dry white wine, celery and carrots.

DRESSING

Use bread or rice, add garlic, celery, water chestnut, pepper, thyme, milk, onion, parsley, melted butter and one egg. OR, use Tuscan bread with garlic, celery, apricots and prunes. Use a rubber spatula to loosen the skin and stuff the dressing under the skin on top of the breast.

CRANBERRY SAUCE

Cook cranberries in orange juice. Add 1 pear, 1 apple, ½ cup of Splenda & candied ginger.
