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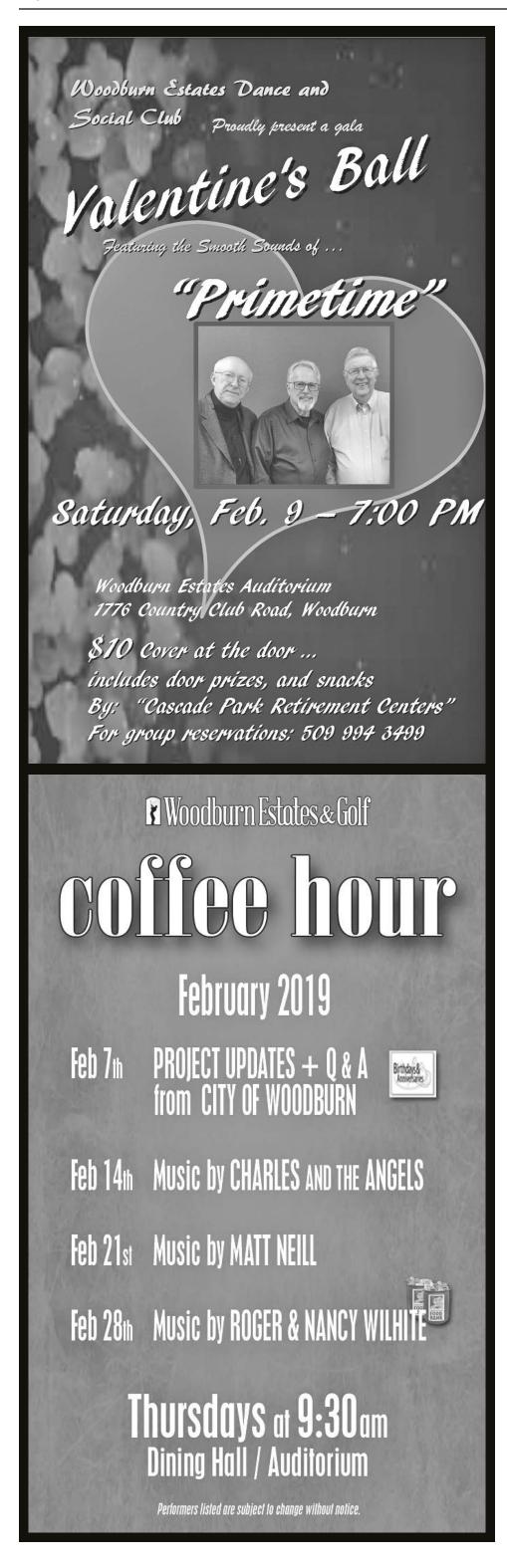
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On Roads Less Traveled*

It is tempting to think of the Eastern U.S. as wall-to wall cities with very little green space between them, but that is not true. There are many places that have been touched only lightly by human hands; and there are wilderness areas where one can lose oneself in the quietness of untrampled nature. My late husband and I lived in New Hampshire and we sought out such places often.

True, we camped with an RV in some campgrounds – usually dry camping in remote areas – but we were mostly backpackers who headed into the backcountry. We pushed deep into the mountains of N.H. and Maine on foot, but also some of our trips were by canoe.

One of our favorite canoe trips was to Lake Umbagog, a large body of water that straddles the border between New Hampshire and Maine. There were no lake cottages, and the shores belonged to the creatures who lived there, which from time to time, included us. We would simply find an appealing bit of shoreline and set up camp.

Another favorite place was in Maine along the Magalloway River (whose waters eventually emptied into Lake Umbagog). It was always fun to put the canoe into the river and spend a few hours enjoying the riverside scenery. But we had to be alert too. Once, we were moving downstream and almost collided with a cow moose who was swimming across the river; and another time we passed uncomfortably close to the shore where a mama bear and her two cubs stood watching us. Most of the creatures we met were more frightened of us than we were of them, but bears and moose can be dangerous. I remember one time where we had spent the evening sitting on a log at our wilderness campfire, and when we got up the next morning, we discovered that during the night a bear had come by and torn that log apart looking for grubs.

One of our more memorable trips involved a hike up a Maine mountain. We met a ranger who told us that there was an old watch tower at the top of this particular mountain, and we decided to go up to see it with the intention of camping at the top. He assured us that the trail was well marked and that, in fact, it had been worked on recently.

The mountains in N.H. and Maine are very old and have been worn down to a few thousand feet in height by eons of erosion. A trip to the top of one can be usually be done in a day or less on a good trail.

At daybreak the next morning we loaded up our packs and started up the trail. It was a good trail, at first...but the higher we went the less well-maintained it became until by early afternoon it was marked only by irregularly spaced bits of cloth tied to branches. We found ourselves fighting our way through brush and brambles. Should we turn back? The sun had already started on its western path, and since we were closer to the top of the mountain than to the bottom we decided to push on.

As we stood discussing the decision, we heard a slight rustle in the bushes behind us. We turned and found, about thirty feet away, a huge bull moose. He was an impressive sight with a massive set of antlers, and he was staring right at us. It was in the fall of the year, during the rutting season, when bull moose are known to be short-tempered and dangerous. We froze.

He looked at us and we looked at him. We had no weapons with us, and if he charged us, we would be in deep trouble. He looked us over for a few minutes and then, I guess, he decided we weren't worth the trouble so he turned and went back the way he had come. Definitely a memorable encounter!

But the next memorable happening was the result of our own inattention, a real rookie mistake.

We knew that the mountains were laced with springs providing streamlets of pure cold water. We had mentioned water to the ranger and he told us there were many springs on the mountain we were preparing to climb. Water is heavy to carry so we took a couple bottles with us, but not a lot. Sure enough, we came across springs where we drank our fill. However, climbing a mountain is thirsty work and we had failed to notice that the closer to the top we got the fewer springs there were. In fact, when we finally reached the watch tower, we realized we hadn't seen water for quite a while – and we were thirsty – very thirsty! We searched around the mountaintop area but there was no water there.

I was utterly exhausted. The "hike" had proven to be much more demanding than we had bargained for. But we needed water!

The sky was now that golden-rosy pink that precedes twilight. Nevertheless, my husband volunteered to go back down the mountain to the last spring we had seen and fill up every container we had with water. I promised, after a short rest, I would be able to set up camp. I did, and he did. And so we survived the night.

The old watch tower was interesting and I tried to imagine people spending whole summers in one like this while keeping watch for the smoke that identified a forest fire.

The trip down the mountain the next day was somewhat easier, partly because we knew what to expect. We kept a lookout for Mr. Moose but, apparently, he had lost interest in us.

Later, when we saw the ranger, we had a few testy words for him and his idea of a "good" trail. I could swear I heard him chuckling as he walked away.
