

Cart Path and the 90° Rule

Spring has sprung and a lot more activity is happening on and around the golf course and clubhouse.

I thought it would be a great idea to talk about the use of the cart paths.

My first thought is to remind those homeowners, who have purchased a yearly cart sticker for \$10, that they only are allowed to drive on the cart paths to and from the south side, through the tunnel, where they must leave the path and drive up either Randolph, Stanfield, or the other Estates streets to the clubhouse, Pro shop and other areas not down the cart path on the north side of Rainier Rd.

Those with the Yearly \$50 Golf Cart Sticker must abide by the same rules except when playing a round of golf. The parking lot area on the east side has arrows marking which direction you must drive. Please, for safety reasons, follow the arrows.

90° Rule is just that. As the early spring is fairly wet, the ground being very soft, the need to protect high traffic areas is vital. The Grounds Crew has chained off certain areas so that the grass can reseed and grow in filling those areas that are bare. The Pro Shop and the Greens Superintendent will determine if the course can be driven on and signs will be put out. If we want the golf course to be as beautiful as it can be, then a few little sacrifices must be made. 90° is just that - straight out to your ball and straight back to the path. Not everyone should follow the leader; that way a wear pattern will not be formed and the need to heal the worn areas will be less.

Cart path only means exactly that - no driving on the fairways or rough.

The Golf course crew is remarking the white lines that are 30' out from the edge of the greens. You need to return to the cart path at these marked points and not go forward of them. No one is supposed to drive beyond these lines and Never Ever up beside the greens. We must treat our course with care in these areas if we want it to be a beautiful place to play the game we all love.

Please repair your divots, add sand, and repair your ball marks. Drive straight and hit them long.


