ecently, an article appeared in the News & Views about why we need Nounteers, identified as being submitted by the entire Board of Directors. Unfortunately, it slipped by and was printed without complete vetting by the board. After receiving several complaints about the content of the piece, we would like to restate what the article was meant to convey.

While we do have an employed staff here at WEG, there are many areas for which we rely heavily on volunteers to help. While each and every activity or committee is directly under the supervision of a board member (who is also a volunteer, elected by you), without the generous donation of countless volunteer hours, our common areas and our lives would be poorer for it. Consider if we had to hire an activities director, for example, to organize and conduct the coffee hours many of you enjoy. How much of our dues might need to be allocated to hire a landscaper to design, plant and maintain the flower beds that brighten our common areas? What might it cost to hire someone to put up and take down our many holiday decorations that bring us joy just by looking at them?

Our office staff is highly committed to providing assistance to our members and taking care of the business end of our lifestyle here. This includes, but is not limited to, responding to requests from members and potential members, managing our paid employees, making sure payroll and taxes are paid on time and ensuring our paid employees do the jobs for which they were hired. Our Articles of Incorporation require that the administration of the community be done by the elected board members. They spend many hours trying to keep up with the endless requirements of running what is, essentially, a small town called Woodburn Estates & Golf on what is, for all intents and purposes, a shoestring budget.

We have a lot of talent in our neighbors and are always looking for volunteers to make this the wonderful place to live that it is. The article that was printed was in no way meant to be a threat of increased homeowner dues. It was simply a call for volunteers and we apologize for any concern that it might have raised.

t has recently come to our attention that one of our members received a very threatening, anonymous letter from one of her neighbors regarding alleged infractions of the pet policy here at Woodburn Estates & Golf. The individual has reported this letter to the police in the event any of the threats become a reality and felt forced to rehome her pet. We condemn the behavior of the individual who felt their only recourse was this type of intimidation.

We would like to reiterate that we do have specific pet policies (Rules & Regulations 17.2 state that all pets (dogs AND cats) must be on a leash) as well as a very well-defined process for dealing with infractions. The Board of Directors takes very seriously any and all complaints and is committed to action, per our Rules & Regulations. There is no reason for any individual to verbally browbeat a neighbor or threaten heinous action to resolve a disagreement.

We all chose to live in this neighborhood for different reasons but the fact of the matter is we are all members in a community with rules in place to minimize conflict and create a comfortable living environment for all. No one should have to be fearful of his neighbor, especially in our own backyard. Given the current societal tendency to verbally attack people for the least little thing, the board would like to think that we, as a community, can be better than that. Try talking to your neighbor; sometimes a friendly chat is all that is needed. If that doesn't work, you have every right to submit formal complaints. Trust that decisions will be made and consequences will be conveyed. Respect your neighbors, treat everyone as you would like to be treated and, above all, be kind to one another.

Craft Fair & Book Sale **Moved to September**

Crafters had an organizational meeting on April 21 discussing several aspects of the annual Craft Fair & Book Sale. The most important decision made was to move the date of the Craft Fair to Saturday, September 21. Several reasons for this move were cited, two of which were better weather and having our "snowbird" neighbors being able to participate.

Also reiterated from previous years, but sometimes not followed, is that only WEG members will be able to reserve a table initially. Crafters having had a table last year will have the right to reserve tables first. After a date to be determined, if tables remain unreserved by members, associate members will be able to reserve a table(s). There will be no "sponsored" tables, that is, a member reserving a table for someone outside of WEG. If a member has a family member wanting to help the member, that family member can bring her/his crafts as well to sell, with the proviso that the helper cannot bring more than 50% of the member's crafts.

Also, ALL crafts must be handcrafted. They must be made from "scratch" or taking something and embellishing it to become something else; i.e., a piece of driftwood sanded, painted/varnished to become a planter or décor item. Nothing that has been purchased to resell can be sold at the craft fair. As an example, items bought on Amazon or other vendors to be resold are not eligible.

Our next meeting is Saturday, June 1, at 10:00 a.m. in the Blue Room. At this meeting, we will be assigning tables, collecting fees (\$10 per table) and signing the crafters' agreement. Also, we will be setting up committees and volunteers. Anyone wanting to reserve a table must come then in order to make sure you have a table even if you had one last year. Those at the meeting in April who indicated they wanted a table must still come to the June 1 meeting to get specific table assignments, pay and sign as above. President Ken Bourne called the Meeting to order at 10 AM in the Dining Hall, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll Call: All Officers & Committee Chairmen/Representatives were present unless otherwise noted in this report. There were 25 members in attendance at today's Meeting.

New Members Present: George Allen and Dave Rushton introduced themselves as new members. George stated that he was just getting back into the game of golf. Dave stated that he had been a member of various golf clubs in the past and then complimented the golf course superintendent for the excellent condition of the course. Dave then complimented the Pro Shop staff of Jason and Joey for their friendly demeanor. He also stated that years ago he had taken a golf lesson from golf legend, Ben Hogan.

President's Report: President Bourne welcomed home the Snowbirds and stated that with the return of our good weather golf is now in full swing. He then provided information regarding upcoming golf events in the month of May as follows: tomorrow we will play a 2 Man Chapman format in the Men's Golf Club Thursday Play; May 9th and 16th will be the two rounds of the President's Cup; May 11th is the Tulip Festival Golf Tournament; May 25th is the Men's Horse Race; May 27th, Memorial Day, is our first Mixed Tournament of the year; May 30th, 31st, and June 1st will be the three round Men's Golf Club Handicap Tournament. for our Thursday Play and President Bourne promised donuts would be provided on those days.

Vice President's Report: VP Will Abshere is also our Greens Committee representative. Will stated that they had a very brief meeting in April and he had nothing new to report. Member Jimmy Carter stated that the cups on our greens do not hold the pin upright and asked if new cups could be ordered. Head Pro Jason Hoth stated that new cups are on order, but even new cups would not always hold the pin upright due to wind and slope of the greens. Member Dave Rushton stated that our practice greens are completely flat and he would like to see slope added to our practice green to replicate the greens on our course. Will then reported that the plaques displayed in the golf lounge have been engraved and are ready for pick up. He is doing his best to keep updated on events won and by whom to ensure that information is correctly placed on the plaques.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Mark Jorgensen provided the following report: Balance of the Club's Account as of May 1, 2019 - \$4,576.73; Balance of the Men's Golf Club Voucher Account as of May 1, 2019: \$4,767.09.

Secretary's Report: Secretary Chuck Johnson had nothing to report. **COMMITTEE REPORTS:**

Handicap: Co-Chair Will Abshere stated that his co-chair, Clint Hansen, has returned and he will be consulting with Clint in the future regarding handicap duties/questions. Will then stated that to his knowledge there are no problems relating to the handicap system. Discussion among members reminded that when playing "solo", scores cannot be posted. A person riding with or accompanying a golfer must be a competitor to be defined as a marker that could attest to a golfer's score and allow the score to be posted.

Mixed Tournaments: Representative Fred Bourne stated that our sponsors are on board for 2019 with the exception of one sponsor. Fred then stated that there is a sign-up sheet in the Pro Shop for the Memorial Day Tournament. He then reminded members that if a guest will attend the dinner, sign up and payment must be done in advance or that guest will play the full \$18.00 rather than the dinner only cost.

Rules: Chairman Jim Hutchinson discussed accidental movement of a ball on the course and when a ball accidentally moves on the green. A penalty stroke is assessed if an accidental movement of the ball occurs on the course (tee box excluded) and there is no penalty for a ball that accidentally moves on the green.

Sunshine: Chairman Ron Gripenstraw was absent with notice. President Bourne reported that a card was sent to member Jim Worley.

OGA: Representative Paul Eaton had nothing to report.

Membership: Chairman Stan Hiller reminded members that he needs to be informed when new members join our Club. He then reported that as of April 24th he had completed 223 bag tags; 150 for men golfers and 73 for lady golfers. Stan is preparing posters to advertise our Mixed Tournaments.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS: Nothing to report.

NEW BUSINESS: Nothing to report.

Closing Member Comments: Fred Bourne reported that the Woodburn HS Golf Team Fundraiser held on April 27th was a success. Our Club sponsored two teams and Fred thanked the Club for supporting this important event. One of our teams placed third in the tournament and all prizes awarded were in the form of peach pies as this is strictly a fundraiser tournament. Fred also stated that the Woodburn HS Golf Team has seen much improvement in recent years. Chuck Johnson addressed the question of high handicap golfers being forced to play from the back tees rather than the forward tees during our Thursday Play. After discussion, it was determined that due to appropriate flights, the high handicap players will be in a flight similar to their handicaps so play on Thursday will continue to be from the back white tees. Ron Sartin requested that we have more computer pick formats for our Thursday Play. After discussion, it was agreed that upon the return of the Snowbirds a computer pick format will be played once each month. Paul Eaton then discussed a new facility for golf cart service that is located in Keizer, OR. Tim Tarpley is the owner of this new facility and a co-owner of the Cross Creek Golf Course. This is a Yamaha dealership, but they will service all brands of golf carts. There is no cost involved in the pickup and delivery of your golf cart. Stan Hiller encouraged Paul to have this new business advertize in our publications. Russ Krussow described a new scam received via a phone call regarding social security. A brief discussion was held regarding the logo for our golf course as last month we were presented with a twin Sequoia Tree logo to replace the current logo of a golfer. There was a mixed opinion among members regarding this issue, some in favor and some recommending we keep the current logo or brand.

Door Prizes: The 50/50 Raffle was then held. The total money collected for today's raffle was \$49.00. Mark Jorgensen had the winning ticket and split the pot, winning \$24.50.

Closing: President Bourne asked for a motion to adjourn our Meeting, the motion made, seconded, and approved. The Meeting adjourned at 10:55 AM.





Grapevine, Texas, was our next overnight. We traveled by bus to two horse farms and learned about their horses, saddles, and all the work that goes into training horses. Just before dinner in Grapevine, we enjoyed their Glockenspiel, which featured two cowboys who came out to face each other. They both had plans to rob the train and challenged each other. Two shots rang out! Neither was hit, and they realized they had wasted their time, since they missed the train.

Our final two days were in Dallas. We visited the museum on the 6th floor of the School Depository building where Lee Harvey Oswald fired at President John F. Kennedy, mortally wounding him and injuring Texas Governor John Connally as their convertible passed by the "grassy knoll" on November 22, 1963. Each museum visitor was given earphones to be able to hear the full history as we took in the photographs and the details of that day.

We also visited the Ewing Mansion at the Southfork Ranch from the television series "Dallas" which aired on CBS from 1978 to 1991. We learned some of the secrets behind the filming, such as the opening scene each week of a car driving in on a long unpaved driveway. The actual driveway has always been paved and is about 100 yards long. To make it seem longer, the car was driven for a ways, then backed up and filmed several times, then all these clips were spliced together to make it seem like it was a mile or more in length. Powder was added to the pavement to make it seem like it was a dirt driveway.

Our meals on this trip were all very good. Breakfasts and dinners were included in our trip and we had lunch on our own in three or four places. The steaks were the best I have eaten. The chuck wagon dinner at Southfork of chicken, brisket with Miss Ellie's barbecue sauce, potato salad, rolls and whipped cream and peaches dessert topped off our trip.

Mules & More

Several months ago I gave some old copies of a mule magazine to the *News & Views* office. They contained articles I had written in the past and I wondered if they would be interested in sharing them in the newspaper. As you know, some have been reprinted. In looking through the magazines, Kathy Hiller became fond of mules and told me she'd like to own one! Since that's not possible here, the next best thing was visiting mules.

I have mule friends nearby that I met years ago when we were both active in Back Country Horsemen. BCH is a nationwide organization dedicated to keeping trails on public land open. BCH members volunteer in both National Forests and Wilderness areas. Volunteers who are trained and certified can use chainsaws in the forest, but in dedicated wilderness areas motorized equipment is not allowed. Volunteers must be trained and certified to use crosscut saws. These can be either

one-man or longer two-man saws.

There are several chapters of Back Country Horsemen in Oregon, and they all gather for a state-wide campout somewhere each summer. More often though, local chapters gather at trailheads for work parties, to clear sections of trails. Typically, this involves several volunteers riding horses or mules, and leading a pack animal that carries either a chainsaw or crosscut saw, and riding down the trail until they come to a tree that has fallen across it. Everyone then ties up their animals, and unloads the saw or saws. Depending on the size of the tree, people start showing up and often take turns. Wedges are used in the kerf (path a saw makes as it cuts through wood), to keep the tree from closing up on the saw. The Forest Service has specifications for the width of trails, and as I recall it's about 3 feet wide on the ground, and closer to 5 feet wide higher up to accommodate a pack animal with pack bags on either side of it. When the fallen tree has been cut in two places, the center section is rolled out of the way, the equipment put back on the pack animals, and the group continues on down the trail until they come to another tree blocking the way.

It was in BCH that I met Dr. Del and Marlene Orchard. When I called them to ask if I could come and bring a friend, they were eager for a visit. They said their mules were pretty shaggy and starting to shed. I said that we could brush them while we were there. Kathy and I drove out there once the weather warmed up.

The house the couple lives in was designed while Dr. Del was elk hunting. It is a barn, and the mules live on the bottom. The couple lives in half of the top and the other half is for hay storage. The mules get used to people going up and down the stairway, carrying all manner of things, and the increased interaction is good for the mules, oh, and their owners of course!

We got a tour of the unique home, the tack room downstairs, and then met the animals. We enjoyed brushing two mules and an older horse. They shed like crazy but enjoyed the attention. Dr. Del is a retired veterinarian, and Marlene is a retired science teacher. Both are happy to teach, and share their knowledge.

Mules are a cross between donkeys and horses, generally the horse is the mother. Mules are usually sterile. They tend to be hardy, smart, and generally live longer than the average horse. They come in all sizes from miniature to draft. Like horses, the males are generally castrated. It is generally accepted that their sense of self-preservation is stronger than in a horse. This probably contributes to the choice to use mules in the Grand Canyon. Some consider them stubborn. I strongly believe that they simply need a good, and kind trainer. They are not apt to forget mistreatment.

Winston Churchill once said, "There is nothing better for the inside of a man than the outside of a horse", and indeed it was refreshing to be around members of the equine world. It is refreshing to be in the countryside, in the presence of lovely people, and beautiful animals. Thank you, Kathy, for showing interest, and to Dr. and Mrs. Orchard for allowing us to share your passion.
