Smoke Alarms Save Lives!

6 Smoke Alarms Save Lives" - On Saturday, April 27, the Woodburn Fire District in partnership with the American Red Cross put this slogan into action.

Across our nation, there are approximately seven people who die in home fires every day. Most of these victims die in homes that don't have working smoke alarms. With the help of over 90 volunteers from Woodburn CERT, students from Woodburn High School, American Red Cross volunteers, and the staff of the Woodburn Fire District, more than 400 smoke alarms were installed in 175 homes throughout Woodburn, Hubbard, and Gervais. Volunteers were also able to replace batteries in existing alarms, and use this opportunity to educate families about fire prevention and safety. The smoke alarms were provided free of charge thanks to a grant from the Oregon State Fire Marshal's Office.

Fire Chief Joe Budge stated, "The fire service has a long history of partnering with the Red Cross who provide assistance to people that are displaced from their homes due to fires. The Woodburn Fire District is proud to extend that partnership to the installation of smoke alarms that will save lives in this part of the Willamette Valley."

The Woodburn Fire District would like to send out heartfelt appreciation to the community volunteers that made this event so successful. For those that were unable to volunteer for this program, there are other ways to get involved. The Woodburn Fire District and Woodburn CERT (Citizen Emergency Response Team) are always looking for Woodburn and Gervais area residents who would be interested in becoming volunteer firefighters, emergency medical technicians, or community emergency responders. 

Men's Golf General Meeting Minutes

Woodburn Estates Men's Golf General Meeting June 5, 2019

President Ken Bourne called the Meeting to order at 10 a.m. in the Dining Hall, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll Call: All Officers & Committee Chairmen/Representatives were present with the exception of those absent with notice as reported in these Minutes.

President's Report: President Bourne welcomed the members to the meeting and ask for any new members. There were 3 new members in attendance – Jim Prickett, Sherman Lackey and Dave Mastalski. He then congratulated Jim Carter as the Men's Handicap winner. Those top 32 golfers now are qualified for the match play in honor of Sid Longest. President Bourne said that the Golf Chair at the last Board Meeting had a motion passed to lower the age from 50 to 45 for associate golfers only. "I have a petition request to sign for those for or against the 45 year age." The request sheet was then passed around to those in attendance. Some spoke about their thoughts on this important issue. Ken will then draft a letter and take the petition to the next corporate Board Meeting.

Vice President: Will Abshere reported on the Greens Meeting saying the 90 degree rule is in effect; the white line 30 yards in front of the green is not to be crossed, and some of you are parking your power carts too close to the green – meaning between the green and the cart path. There will be more disease and or damaged trees removed this year.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Mark Jorgenson provided the balance of the accounts as of June 4 as \$4,481.06. Balance of the voucher account was \$6,302.79.

Secretary's Report: Secretary Chuck Johnson was absent with notice. Stan Hiller filled in.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Handicap: Will Abshere: I believe that the new scorecards need to be looked at. The designation is being changed, with 1 being the hardest. Another question about the weeds around the trees. Response was that maintenance is trying to get caught up on the course. Will then had Clint Hansen talk about how to play Match Play and the rules involved and how to score your card when you concede the hole. Also, an early reminder that the dues are due by December 31. If you are a snowbird, you should pay before you leave.

Mixed Tournaments: Chair Fred Bourne said we had a huge success with 138 golfers and served 155 dinners. When you bring a guest, they need to be on the dinner list. The next tournament is on June 15. Be sure to pick up your golf bag tags.

Sunshine: Chairman Ron Gripenstraw was absent with notice. President Bourne said two cards had been sent out by Ron. Good note that Mike Dykes is with us today.

OGA: Chairman Paul Eaton said the OGA is not making the rules, but USGA worldwide is making the rules for everyone to follow. Now I beg everyone, please do not call the OGA with your golfing problems. That is why I am here to get the help you need on questions you may have.

Rules: Chairman Jim Hutchinson asked a trick question. True or false: Can a golfer declare an un-playable lie anywhere on the course? Answer is false, except in a penalty area. How about in a bunker? True. Can you go up to where the ball went out of bounds and play from that spot with a 2 stroke penalty? Answer is false, you must go back and replay the shot.

Membership: Chairman Stan Hiller stated that golfers need to pick up their golf bag tag. If it is not there in the golf shop, be sure to get on the list to have it made. We need 7 more golfers to equal last year's total of annual paid golfers. So, get more golfers!

UNFINISHED BUSINESS: Nothing to report.

NEW BUSINESS:

- 1. Fred Bourne welcomed everyone to come out and play Texas Hold 'em. He talked to Jim Worley the other day and Jim is doing very well, but doubts if he will be coming back to work in the golf shop. President Bourne said that this Friday and Saturday will be the Rose-A-Rama ladies' event, so give them room as it is just like the men's Harvest for us.
- 2. Golf Pro Jason said he looked into the scoring cards and you were right, we use the red instead of the white tees. And please use the restrooms we have, instead of the trees.
 - 3. Ron Sartin asked about how the blind draws are done and how is it paid

out. It was decided that the blind draw person does not pay and does not get paid. That the golf system now can handle it. Example: if the winner should have won, now only get half the winnings.

4. Clint Hanson reemphasized that all need to ask your question of the handicap chair, instead of asking the OGA office.

Door Prizes: Steve Hobson had a member draw the winning 50/50 ticket and the winner was Fred Bourne.

Closing: President Bourne asked for a motion to adjourn the meeting, motion made, seconded, approved, and the Meeting was adjourned at 11:05 a.m.



The addition of Halpern will aid the Woodburn Fire District in fulfilling the commitment to the District residents to provide a minimum of four firefighters on-duty at all times including at least one paramedic with advanced lifesaving skills. Funds that prevented firefighter lay-offs and enhanced the fire district staffing were provided by a local option levy approved by voters last November.

The levy funds will allow the four firefighter constant staffing to begin on July 1st. The advanced life-saving service that will be provided by fire district paramedics will be incrementally phased in as the components of the paramedic program are put in place. The first steps of this process began earlier this year with the selection of two existing firefighters to receive paramedic training. Firefighters Ryan Johnson and Mitch Raines are currently enrolled in a paramedic training program while maintaining their current full-time duties as career firefighters assigned to a 24 hour shift. The initial phases of the advanced live-saving service are scheduled to begin in November of 2019.

Chief Quote: "Four Firefighter Staffing is an industry best practice for providing a high level of protection to the lives and property of the residents we serve while maintaining the safety of our firefighters working in hazardous conditions. The presence of a paramedic on-duty at all times will bring near emergency room life-saving capabilities to those residents of the district that experience a medical emergency. We are thankful to the voters for providing the funds that make this professional level of service to the community possible."

Register Your Surveillance Cameras with WPD

WEG has been experiencing more thefts recently and with the help of more surveillance cameras, WPD hopes to locate and apprehend the person or persons who are doing this. If you are not signed up for the City of Woodburn's Weekly E-Blast which is sent out each Friday, you may not be aware of their S.C.R.A.M. program. Their E-Blast from May 24, gives details on how we may help them and ourselves - at the same time. Following is their message:

The Woodburn Police Department has officially launched their **Surveillance Camera Registration & Mapping (S.C.R.A.M.)** program. The Purpose of the Video Surveillance Registration Program is to provide the community with a means to assist the City of Woodburn Police Department in preventing and fighting crime. The program allows residents and businesses to register the locations of their exterior video surveillance systems with the Woodburn Police Department so that when a crime occurs, police will be able to identify the locations of nearby video cameras easily and efficiently.

Participation in this program is voluntary.

How it Works: Any City of Woodburn resident or business that has and maintains an exterior video surveillance camera or camera system within the City may register the location(s) of such camera(s) using the program registration form. Registration is voluntary and at no cost to the registrant. Registrants may ask to be removed from the registration program, or request edits to their information at any time, by contacting WPD at scram@ci.woodburn.or.us or call 503-982-2345 during normal business hours.

Only law enforcement personnel who are investigating a crime near where video surveillance systems are registered will have access to registration information. Police personnel, if necessary, may request to view or retrieve a copy of any video recording captured by a registrant's surveillance system, which may assist in the investigation of a crime.

An individual's personal information that is tied to, or associated with their registration will be kept confidential by the City, except as required by law.

Registration in this program does not obligate the Woodburn Police Department, or police personnel to monitor or inspect the location of a registered surveillance system or take any targeted law enforcement action in response to activities observed or not observed through a registrant's video recording.


As needed, the Police Department will reassess this program and consider any appropriate changes needed to ensure the program's success.


She says her happiest days were when she had her boys. She had prayed for a boy baby as they traveled through Boys Town, Nebraska, on their winter pilgrimage and her prayer was answered – three times!

Charlie & Ryllis were snowbirds for many years, traveling to Mesa, Arizona, for the winter. They lived in Minnesota and Wisconsin when they were first married. They moved to Oregon, living in Salem, Lake Oswego and finally Woodburn Estates. They often met former classmates from Wisconsin when they traveled to Arizona.

Her physical therapists were so impressed with her determination to get better, because she did all the exercises they needed her to do and she recovered very well.

Ryllis' goal for the past couple of years was to make it to 100, and thankfully, this too has come to pass. She is still sharp in her thinking and enjoys that she is able to still live in her own home with minimal assistance. Happy Birthday, Ryllis! Thank you for the party today!
