
In no particular order these are the great people who helped to make this event a success:

What's That Smell?

by City of Woodburn

Notice an odd smell around the neighborhood? The City has received numerous questions and concerns from citizens regarding industrial hemp farming that has been taking place on property located nearby Woodburn Schools and the livability matters for surrounding neighbors.

Unlike with marijuana production, which is subject to both regulation by the Oregon Liquor Control Commission as well as certain local time, place, and manner restrictions, the State Department of Agriculture has sole regulatory authority over industrial hemp production and oversees the registration of hemp farm locations. Because hemp has been categorized as an agricultural commodity by the State Legislature, Woodburn is prevented by Oregon's "right to farm" law from placing local restrictions on things like noise, odor, dust, or vibration that may come from surrounding hemp farms.

Please know that the concerns raised about hemp by local residents are shared by many similar communities across Oregon and other jurisdictions are looking to the State for help in finding solutions. We will keep the community informed if and when developments or changes in the law are forthcoming.

Hummingbird Friends Updates An article advising readers to stop feeding hummingbirds during autumn and winter months was published in the September 27, 2019 edition of the

My husband, Jim, just spoke with Portland Audubon Society and they said that the article about the danger of feeding your hummingbirds thru the winter is a Common Myth. Around Woodburn, the hummingbirds that stay over the winter are Anna's Hummingbirds. They have been gradually extending their range northward over the last several years. In fact they are now overwintering as far north as southern Alaska.

Other biological factors will tell other species of hummingbirds that it is time to migrate south. Obviously there is less naturally available food in the middle of winter, so if you start to feed the birds thru the winter keep your feeder full. You can safely enjoy watching the hummingbirds thru the winter without fearing that you are going to kill them.

In the last *News & Views*, a "concerned feathered friend" wrote to say we should all bring our hummingbird feeders in so the "buzzys" would migrate and not hang around here and freeze to death this winter. I called the Hummingbird Society in Sedona, AZ, (1-800-529-3699) to see if this is true and it's not! Hummers migrate in the fall at a time determined by genetic programming. When the right time comes, they just up and leave us! Besides, we need to keep our hummingbird feeders filled year-around for our local populations of Anna's, who are year-around residents in western Oregon. They will greatly appreciate it!

The Post Boys

From the time I was two to when I turned 12 our neighbors were the Posts. They had two boys, Vernon and Walter, who were a few years older than me. A creek ran between our properties. When I was five, and while I was in the process of exploring more of our two aces, I discovered that the boys had dammed up part of the creek near the highway and had built a series of elaborate waterwheels that turned by the flow of the water over their dam. Well, the boys caught me looking at their construction and warned me that school was starting the next day and they did not want me disturbing their waterwheels while they were gone. They even told me that they had a magic mirror and would know if I was messing around in their stuff.

The next morning I could hardly wait to go back and learn more about those beautiful waterwheels! I waded into the water and picked one up from its moorings. Asking myself "How could they make anything so intricate?" I turned it over and over until a spoke fell off! My efforts to repair it didn't work so I threw it into a patch of evergreen blackberries growing nearby. When the boys got home from school and saw a water wheel was missing they accosted me and wanted to know what I had done. I sassily told them "Look in your magic mirror!"

Later at school I learned to play hopscotch and would draw out boxes on our gravel driveway for me and my two sisters to play. Vernon and Walter would come over and ask to play. Of course their feet were much too large for the small squares I drew so they always stepped on the lines and lost the game. I thought if they were smarter they would ask to draw the boxes bigger.

When I joined the Girl Scouts, I obtained a copy of the handbook that told what you had to do to earn merit badges. Of greater interest to me was the section in back that showed how to make camp equipment. My sisters and I set up a camp near the creek where it flooded in wet weather. We wanted to deter the Post boys from messing with it so I took a crayon and wrote on a wooden shingle "Poison water. Don't drink. By order of the health department". Then I drew a skull and crossbones. Two weeks later Dad asked us if we knew anything about the water being bad in the creek. When we told him what we had done, he laughed and said all the neighbors were hauling water from the city because the boys told them about the water being poison.

An article advising readers to stop feeding hummingbirds during autumn and winter months was published in the September 27, 2019 edition of the Woodburn Estates & Golf newsletter. I contacted the Audubon Society of Corvallis for their opinion of the article's accuracy. It is my understanding that Anna's hummingbirds remain in the area throughout the year and am concerned that removing feeders will limit their food source.

Soon had a response to my inquiry: You are right that Anna's hummingbirds are in most of our area year round and will use hummingbird feeders. They also eat small insects and spiders year round. At my particular house, out in the country, we do take down our feeders in September because we only have rufous hummingbirds breed here, and don't want to encourage Anna's to come out

here. In town, Anna's are everywhere! The one thing is, people who keep feeders up for Anna's need to be prepared to provide food even when it freezes hard, and you have to take feeders in or warm them somehow (commercially available devices). I hope this answers your question and thank you for contacting the Audubon Society of Corvallis!



Greens Committee: Director Paula Kilgore

The Meeting in September will be on the 9th so that the Tournament Committee can be at this meeting to go over the 2020 Season for Mixed Tournaments and other Tournaments that impact the schedule and the labor force. The meeting will be a 10am. The purpose of this is to have ready for presenting at the September General Meeting for approval.

Director Kilgore gave an update on the closing of the Front nine holes of the golf course starting, September 16, 2019. Safety of workers and golfers are a priority!



There will be work going on by NW Trees to remove several more poplars that have started dying and with the equipment being used, it will not be safe for any golfers to be in the area. This will involve #'s 6-4-5 with stump grinding being done on the already downed trees. There is one tree on # 15 to come down later in the week and we will be closing off that area when this work takes place. In conjunction with the tree removal, All City paving will be working at the Pro Shop and maintenance areas, rebuilding and paving. They will be fixing the drainage in this area. Please avoid! At the same time Bernhardt Construction will be renovating # 3-6-8 tee boxes. There will be temporary tee boxes or use of the forward tees for the remainder of the year at those tee boxes, so they have time to heal and be ready for the 2020 season. Please stay off these.

Director Kilgore will be asking the Rules committee to bring back the Red Flag Program for golfers, with the following additions. A golfer who would like to have one, bring to the office their Handicap placard or a note from their physician stating their limiting condition and one will be issued along with the guidelines for use around the course. In the past these were abused, and the program was discontinued but we see there is a need and would like to have it reintroduced to help those who need it.

The Maintenance crew brought up the Problem of Golf Etiquette and the failure of members to use it. Mark Jorgenson thought that the best solution for now would be to have mentors in each group help remind them of it.

Maintenance Mondays is ongoing, and members are coming out and playing before 9 am. This is **not** permitted, and we ask that all golfers refrain from doing this in the future. The crew is spraying chemicals on some days or are working trying to get those areas that require more work done before play begins.

The white lines and the yellow chained off areas are being ignored. These are in place to help our course stay in prime condition. Please do not go around or over. If you notice a wear pattern starting to happen - avoid. Tree stumps are considered ground under repair. Beverage cart and fencing were put on next month's agenda. Ken Bourne has resigned and is being replaced by Mark Jorgenson.

The carpeting work has been completed. All that remains is the work in the Golf Pro Shop. This will be done this fall after the tournaments have been completed. Our maintenance stall will be installing a new tile floor in the men's restroom across from the *News & Views* office.
