


The route takes both sides of Highway 214 past adult care facilities with people waiting for us to go by. Local police and fire lead the way.





# raveler's Report

#### Southern Italy Is Wonderful!

On September 29, my sister-in-law Mary Stotler and I left for a tour of Southern Italy. It was Mary's first trip to Europe, and my fourth trip to Italy. We found a delightful Italian restaurant and had a wonderful dinner. In fact, it was so good we went there on our second night in Rome.

Day 1 in Rome consisted of a walking tour where we saw many old ruin sites, the Forum, walked down the famous Spanish Steps, toured the Vatican and St. Peters Basilica, and saw the Colosseum up close. It's truly amazing to view untouched ancient 2000+ year old ruins in amongst the modern city of Rome.

Day 2 included another walking tour of Rome to see the Pantheon, lunch at Piazza Navona where we watched heavy rain from our covered street side café, and then saw Trevi Fountain (remember the movie Three Coins in the Fountain?) in the afternoon sun. Then a bus took us to the Naples terminal where we embarked on an overnight ferry to the island of Sicily.

Day 3 meant arrival in Palermo in time for breakfast, the capital city of Sicily, and a walking tour of the old part of the city. Enroute to our hotel we stopped in the medieval coastal town of Cefalu. Our hotel was on the sea, and a few brave souls took a swim in the chilly water.

Day 4 included a walking tour at the top of Mt. Etna, and a visit to the charming hilltop medieval city of Taormina where we sampled famous Sicilian cannoli and Arancini (aka rice balls, a crusty snack with rice, cheese and meat inside).

Day 5 had us visiting a honey processor, and a vineyard where we saw how they made wine and enjoyed a delightful Italian lunch that included wine tasting.

Day 6 we left Sicily and took a 20-minute ferry ride across the Strait of Messina to the "toe" of Italy. We traveled to Scilla on the coast and spent the night in the hill town of Tropea, another medieval village.

Day 7 included a visit to a water buffalo farm where we sampled mozzarella cheese, yogurt and gelato made from buffalo cow milk. It is mild and a favorite delicacy for the Italians. The farm has been in the same family since the mid 1600's, and the original herd was imported from India. This area is a bit marshy and thus suitable for water buffalo. Their current herd numbers about 600 and are milked the modern way by machine.

Day 8 & 9 were spent in the Naples area. We visited Sorrento, tasted the Italian national food of gnocchi with marinara sauce and basil (the colors of the Italian flag), had the renown Napoli pizza at a traditional Naples pizzeria, took a walking tour of Naples, drove the Amalfi Coast, took a boat ride to view this coast from the sea, and visited the ancient city of Pompei at the foot of Mt. Vesuvius. In Pompei I had the added adventure of being separated from my tour group and getting lost, spending over an hour trying to find the exit, which turned out to be at a different location than where we entered. Pompei is huge!! I was finally able to find my way to the bus and met up with my group. Whew!!

On Day 10 we had to say goodbye (ciao) to Italy and the new friends we met on this vacation. Hopefully we'll meet up again one day.

Traveling is educational and fun. I encourage you all to try it, or to continue traveling if it's something you already enjoy.


