I watched as Mike entered the garage, which seemed to be almost intact, and he started up their Toyota Highlander and backed it out. It had escaped any real damage other than soot and ashes.

The McGillivrays are naturally stunned and thankful that the resulting fire was not worse. They have two cats that they are worried about, but hope they escaped and are waiting to return home. We certainly pray that is the case.



Our Membership rules require you to give notice to the office at The Estates with the ARCHITECTURAL **PLANNING COMMITTEE** APPROVAL REQUEST form if you plan to remodel or add a fence, etc. Fill out the form and return to the office for Architectural Committee review.

You may also check with the City of Woodburn to see if a city license is required for your contractor. 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How Lethal is Roundup Herbicide?

Back on May 6, 2014 I made my usual daily visit to Senior Estates Park to walk my dogs. A city worker was busy spraying Roundup around the park, so I asked if he sprayed the lawns too, since that is primarily where my dogs venture. He said no, but to my dismay, he did say he sprayed the paths. I asked why the city would use sprays that killed bees and he said the spray was safe, but bees have weak immune systems. That didn't sound right to me so I searched for the facts.

This herbicide is deadly to human cells, especially embryonic cells, and

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damage DNA according to Scientific American and other researchers. According to Scientific American, it is the combination of ingredients that is most toxic. There are worldwide court battles taking place to stop Roundup spraying. The lawsuits indicate that there are birth defects, cancers and serious illnesses in higher incidence where Roundup is sprayed. Even the label on Roundup warns against using it around wildlife and bodies of water.

My dogs enjoy their trips to the park, so I won't stop taking them, but if the bees are dying from this spray, and many of our residents have compromised immune systems, this should be reason enough for the city to stop spraying Roundup around the community.

- 1. CHOOSE A GOOD PARKING SPACE: If you are parking at home, consider parking under street lights or well-lit driveways, if not parking inside of a garage. If you are going to be shopping into the evening hours, think about where the lights are located in parking lots, so you can have your car well-lit. An open, lit area is ideal. Criminals like dark corners, so try not to park in one.
- 2. LEAVE YOUR VALUABLES OUT OF SIGHT: If possible, keep your goodies in the trunk instead of in the viewable passenger area. If a thief sees items that may be valuable, they are more likely to choose your car to break into. If they see nothing, they will likely move on to another car.
- 3. USE A VEHICLE WITH AN ALARM SYSTEM, IF POSSIBLE: Thieves are less likely to break into a car with a blinking alarm light. They don't want to attract any attention to themselves, so will look for cars without alarms. Double check to make sure the

alarm is activated.

- 4. TAKE **ELECTRONICS** (PORTABLE NAV, ETC) WITH YOU: Either put the portable devices in a hidden place, out of view, or take it with you. Those are items that attract thieves, because they are easy to grab, carry, and sell.
- 5. LOCK YOUR DOORS: This should be a 'no-brainer,' but we take quite a few police reports where car doors were left unlocked. Some thieves will actually walk around a parking lot checking car doors for an easy target.
- 6. PLEASE, PLEASE, PLEASE DO NOT LEAVE PURSES OR BACKPACKS ON THE SEATS: Again, should be a 'no-brainer,' but it happens often.

The bottom line: If your car interior is clean, with no visible objects, and locked in an open and/or well-lit area... the thief will probably overlook your car altogether. If you see someone in your neighborhood that looks suspicious, or appears to be looking into vehicles, please call the police. We can respond to see what they are up to, and this helps to deter thefts once potential thieves know that they've been noticed.

The doctor explained the situation to her little brother, and asked the boy if he would be willing to give his blood to his sister. I saw him hesitate for only


a moment before taking a deep breath and saying, "Yes, I'll do it if it will save Liza."
