## Crime Tip

Microsoft Tech Support Scam
The Woodburn Police Department has recently received several reports of scammers claiming to be technical support from Microsoft. My research on the scam led me to multiple online hits involving the same scam method over the past year.

The caller tells the potential victim that they are Technical Support for Microsoft, and have located a virus on the consumer's computer. The scammer then directs the consumer to go to his/her computer and proceeds to give directions to 'get rid of the virus.' If the consumer follows the directions, it gives the scammer remote access to the computer. Once the scammer has access to the computer they can install malicious software, steal personal information, take control of the computer remotely or direct consumers to fraudulent websites where they are asked to enter their credit card information.

Microsoft's Online Safety and Security Center states that neither

Microsoft nor its partners make unsolicited phone calls.

Better Business Bureau advises consumers follow these tips to protect themselves from scammers attempting to access their computer:

- Go through your service provider directly. If you are concerned your computer may be exposed to viruses or other security threats, contact your service provider directly. Some providers offer free tools that can help detect and remove viruses.
- Install virus detection. To help protect your computer from viruses make sure you have virus detection software installed on your computer. This software can also help identify if a virus appears on your computer.
- Don't trust cold calls. Never give out personal information, over the phone, to someone you don't know. If the caller claims there is a security threat to your computer, hang up and call your computer company directly.

## Rules and Regulations

Note: We are looking for a group of men to start a Nine Hole Club. They must be members of the Men's Club and have an established Nine Hole Handicap. The time will be Mondays at 10:00 a.m.
14.21 Golf Cars
14.21-4 Any Golf car(s) operated on the premises must be registered by owners with the purchase of a decal that must be displayed on the windshield of the golf car.
14.21-5 The tires of golf cars must be at least eight inches wide with nonaggressive tires.
14.21-6 Children may be transported by a golf car to and from the club house. This also includes the tunnel and golf course path south of HWY-214. Golf car drivers should always use the streets north of HWY-214. A ticket maybe issued for using HWY-214 without a licensed golf car.
14.21-7 A golf car must be driven by a person at least 16 years of age, with.a valid driver's license, and may be occupied by no more than two adults.
14.22 Hand or electric type hand golf car must not be within 15 feet of the putting greens, onto the apron, onto the tee, into a sand trap or across other designated areas of the golf course.
14.23 Men's Day and Ladies' Day shall begin on the third Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of March and shall end on the third Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of October. lfMen's Day or Ladies' Day falls on a holiday, these days are to be open days in favor ofall players.

Tuesday from 8:30 a.m. until 11:30 a.m., nine holes of the golf course are reserved for Ladies who play in the nine-hole group. The other nine holes of the golf course will be open to all golfers.

Wednesday from 8:30 a.m. until 11:00 a.m. is Ladies' Day for ladies who play in the eighteen-hole group. From 11:00 a.m. until the course closes, ladies shall have preference, provided they are a twosome or more.

Thursday from 8:30 a.m. until 2:00
p.m. is Men's Day. Thursday from 2:00 p.m. until the course closes; men shall have preference on the first tee, providing they are a twosome or more. The Golf Professional will have the discretion to allow other players on the course if the times allocated for the Men's Club and Women's Club are not being used.
14.24 The Board of Directors will approve a schedule of golf tournaments.
14.25 Driving Range
14.25-1 Use Senior Estates Golf and Country Club range balls only. Do not use your own golf balls.
14.25-2 Pick up the same number of balls that you hit or more if time permits.
14.25-3 When a golfer is ready to pick up balls other golfers must stop hitting balls and allow the pick up of golf balls.
14.25-4 Woods are not to be used by men or women on the practice range, except when under the guidance of the Golf Professional.
14.25-5 Golfers must hit away from the \#9 fairway and be careful of players who may be in \#7 and \#8 fairways.
14.25-6 Leave the balls and shag bag inside the bench by lifting seat cover.
14.25-7 Golfers will be restricted to 50 yards of practice on tournament days.
14.26 Players will assume responsibility to inform other players and to remind them of the rules of golf and etiquette.
14.27 Members should report rules violations or complaints to the Golf Professional or his staff.
14.28 Violations or disregard of rules by a member or guest shall be referred in writing to the Golf Chair of the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors may revoke a member's golf privileges.
14.29 The USGARules and the Local Golf Rules fall under the responsibility of the Men's \& Ladies Club "Rules Committee". The Local "green" Rule
books are the responsibility of the Men's Club \& Ladies Club. The USGA rule books and the Local Rules "Green" book are available in the golf shop. The "Handicapping Policy" is posted in the Golf Lounge.
14.30 Dress Code for the Golf Course
14.30-1 Soft spike golf shoes are mandatory May 1 to October 1. Soft spike golf shoes must be approved by the Golf Professional.
14.30-2 Shorts must be reasonable and proper. Jogging shorts, short shorts, cut-offs or swimming-type shorts are not permitted.
14.30-3 Tank tops are not permitted; sleeveless tops are permitted.
14.30-4 Bare midriffs, halter-tops or strapless garments are not permitted.
14.30-5 Jeans are permitted but must be of good taste.
14.30-6 Sweat pants are not
permitted.

## Another Mass Elimination of Bees!

As I came out of my adult Ballet Class in Salem this morning, I saw the headlines in the Statesman Journal newspaper about the bees being killed due to pesticide spraying in Estacada, Sandy and Eugene - of all places. Why are we so careless? I don't want to say that we are uneducated because we know what all those chemicals do, not only to nature, but humans as well, and the picture is not pretty. Rachel Carson's book "Silent Spring" has been around for over 50 Years and the world is still in denial.

When I moved to Woodburn 10 years ago, there were many birds, bees, worms, ladybugs, and butterflies too, in my yard or at Champoeg Park where I do my walking. And even there, herbicide sprays are being used just as they are here in our area and on our doggy trails and on the grass in the Friendship Park.

I met a lady one evening a month ago, as she was walking her dog. The dog had a funnel around its head. I asked her what had happened and she told me that her dog had rolled around in the grass which had been sprayed with Roundup and sustained chemical burns on its back. Needless to say, she had to take the dog to the veterinarian.

I went to City Hall the next day and asked to speak with the Facility Maintenance person. I was given a telephone number and I talked with the Manager of maintenance directly. He told me that they have to use Roundup in order to keep the weeds in check. His work force is limited, but must take care of all the city parks and beyond.

I asked him if he could put out signs after the spraying was done to warn the public. He declined. Then I asked him how often do his workers spray? He said, generally the first week of each month along with the grass mowing. I asked him if he is aware of the poisonous effects of Roundup. He said that Roundup is not dangerous 1 hour after it has been sprayed onto the ground or anywhere else. I disagreed with him and asked him to check it out for himself and get back to me. I never heard back. But then, we do know the answer already.

I have one more question for our immediate neighborhood. What do we do if our neighbors use Roundup, etc.? Will the produce we grow also be laced with the chemicals they use? Too many bees have given their lives so that pollination is done. Please, take care.

Jane Goodall, who has spent many years of her life researching, studying, and writing about chimpanzees, has written another book. Cheers for Jane Goodall! ## Rules for Temporary Signs for Events, Garage \& Estate Sales

Cummer is a great time for cleaning out the garage, closets, etc. and having garage $N$ and yard sales. Homeowners are allowed to have temporary estate, garage and yard sales, subject to the following rules:

- You can have two sales in any calendar year.
- Each sale can be no more than three consecutive days.
- Sales can only be conducted between the hours of 8 a.m. and 8 p.m.
- You don't need a business license or permit to have a garage sale.

How can I advertise? Use the newspaper, Craigslist and put up temporary signs, subject to the following standards:

- You can have a maximum of two lawn signs.
- These signs can be a maximum of 8 square feet total (only one side of a twosided sign is counted, even though the back side can display a message).
- Signs cannot be placed on or over a sidewalk.
- No signs are allowed on utility poles or traffic signs.
- All signs must be taken down the day the sale ends.

Please remember not to place signs or flyers on utility poles!
