A member here in The Estates Golf & Country Club, recently sent me their July/August newsletter and The Pest Bulletin that they mail to their clients. I found several paragraphs of interest in their letter and, with permission, reprint them below.

"Here at Leupitz, we continue to spend our summer keeping the carpenter ants, termites, and other pests at bay from many of your homes and businesses. While the methods and products of controlling these pests have changed in the past 40 years of serving our clients, the dedication of providing quality service has remained the same. We continue to do all we can to provide the best service for our clients that you can expect from any local pest service provider and we truly appreciate your trust in us.

"However, our concerns stretch beyond just our clients; we do have a real concern for protecting our environment as well. Recently we heard of yet another Oregon pest control operator (this time in Eugene) who had their license recently suspended after apparently applying neonicotinoid insecticides onto flowering trees that were attracting honeybees. The Oregon Department of Agriculture reported that over 1,000 bees were killed as a result, which was not

as extensive as the Wilsonville bee kill last summer, where tens of thousands of bumblebees died as result of treatment of the same kind of product, but still quite serious. Though in both cases, the target pest was not bees but aphids, still it is imperative that pest control operators stay educated in using their products wisely to protect their clients and the environment, including pollinating insects such as bees.

"Sometimes we will occasionally get a call from someone who has a concern about honeybees in a structure, such as in a wall of their house or office building. In the interest of protecting pollinators, several years ago we made a decision to no longer offer elimination of structural honeybee infestations even in those circumstances. While it is true that honeybees can pose a serious health risk to individuals acutely allergic to them (according to the U.S. Center for Disease Control, some 90-100 humans die each year due to insect stings), we have chosen to refer such instances of infestation to local beekeepers to remove the colony rather than eliminate them. So if you or someone you know has a serious issue with honeybee infestation in their structures, we can provide the names of local beekeepers that may be able to assist. It's just one of the ways that we are serving to protect you as well as the planet we live on.

"Thank you for your part in allowing us to make our 40th Anniversary successful. Enjoy The Pest Bulletin with our compliments.

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

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
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
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Rules Committee

How does the process work for complaints?

A complaint letter is received at the office from a homeowner/ member.

A letter is sent to the complainant (sender) acknowledging the receipt of the letter to the committee by the office, usually within 1-2 business days.

The complaint is sent to the Rules Committee chair, by email or hand delivery. The Chair assigns a Complaint Case number, copies are made and assignment is given to a Rules committee member for investigation, usually within 1-2 business days.

Rules Committee investigator(s) investigate the complaint, takes pictures, if possible, make notations and return findings to the Rules Committee chair. The Investigator(s) retains a copy of the complaint and notes until the complaint is closed, whereupon the investigator updates files and returns any original documentation.

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The First letter to the homeowner is written and signed by the Rules chairperson within 1-2 business days. Sometimes the investigator(s) meet personally with the homeowner, if possible, and hopefully the issue is resolved. If not, a First letter is taken to the office; complaint folder is updated, and mailed regular mail to the homeowner, with a request from the receiver for a 10 day response. The office makes a copy for complaint file and original First letter is mailed out in 1 (one) business day. This is the first step in the Association's legal obligations for notification.

If there is no response, a Second letter is written, with the Association's Table of Fines enclosed. The office makes a copy for the complaint file and an original Second Letter is mailed out in 1 (one) business day by Certified mail. If this homeowner is already involved in legal proceedings, a copy is provided to the lawyer in addition to the office to keep the

legal file and fines current.

Further, it is noted that if the complaint is part of a current legal complaint process, or it goes to a legal proceeding, the Rules Committee's job is done, other than updated file notes and letters. The process then becomes the responsibility of the Corporation President, General Board and General Manager.

The 2014 Rules Chair and committee have created several new forms and procedures and are trying to keep our members more informed. A new procedure was added July 30th which will send an additional letter to Complainants whose complaint has gone to legal proceedings so that they are informed.

A reminder that some complaints are not issues that the Rules committee can handle.



The Meeting was called to order by President Ken Bourne at 1:30 p.m. in the Dining Hall, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. A quorum was established with Directors Bourne, Butts, Bunnell, Johnson, Aiken, Cornett, and Worley in attendance. Directors Cole and Westphal were absent with notice.

President's Welcome Report President Ken Bourne: Good afternoon everyone. I want to thank the Board Members and the members of our community for agreeing to

the scheduled date change of this month's meeting. The change allowed The Estates to enter a team in yesterdays' Chamber of Commerce Golf Tournament held at Tukwila. I understand some members of the community didn't get the word in time and showed up. I'm sorry. The weather was beautiful and The Estates team was made up of very fine players, Janice Aiken, Carol Bettandorff, Fred Bourne and myself. They all played great and I helped when possible. We had a great time laughing, and making fun of each other. We followed the posted rules with honesty and integrity and were pleased to post a score of 17 under par (55).

There were no changes to the There was a motion by agenda. Director Bunnell to approve the minutes of the May 27, 2014 regular meeting. The motion was seconded by Director Butts. The minutes were approved unanimously.

Treasurer's Report - Treasurer Chuck Johnson: (1) The balances reported today were reconciled with bank statements and balance sheets provided by the Estates Bookkeeper as of May 31, 2014. Our Operating Account balance as of May 31, 2014, was \$571,303.59. Our Reserve Account balance as of May 31, 2014, was \$809,843.87. (2) The Accounts Receivable statistics presented herein were determined as of June 24, 2014. On this date, the balance of our Accounts Receivable was \$74,247.90, a slight reduction from my last report of May 27, 2014. (3) We have 65 delinquent accounts which represents a 4.3% delinquency rate, a reduction of 3 delinquent accounts from my May report. We have 17 liens filed against properties with delinquent accounts. There are 8 delinquent properties in foreclosure and 14 other delinquent properties that are either bank owned or will soon be owned by the lender. We are reviewing 11 delinquent accounts that may be uncollectible due to our lien being subordinate to other liens, resulting in a lack of equity in the property. (4) If forced to write off these 11 delinquent accounts, the uncollectible amounts may total \$10,467.85. (5) I will be preparing a Mid-Year Financial Report in August, 2014, as to do so sooner would be premature as many homeowners will be paying the remaining half of their annual assessment on or before July 31, 2014. I cannot speculate on how many homeowners will indeed pay their remaining half of their annual assessment. I will present the Mid-Year Financial Report at the Board Meeting scheduled for August 26, 2014. (6) Also at the Board Meeting scheduled for July 22, 2014, I will make a motion to approve those homeowners and/or Estates employees I have selected to be on the 2015 Budget Committee. Upon approval by the Board of these various Budget Committee Members, I will initiate the Budget process for 2015 as multiple meetings will need to take place over several months to adequately prepare the 2015 Operating and Reserve Budgets. **Committee Reports:**

Architectural - Director Len Westphal: Presented by Director Worley. Since the last board meeting there have been 12 compliance requests. Nine were approved and 3 were not approved.

Activities-Director Sharyn **Cornett:** (1) The Carnival Sunday was really fun. There was lots of dunking and 2 extra volunteer clowns who even got wet in full costume. There were 177 people who attended. The food provided by Cascade Park was great. Thanks to all that helped make this a fun event. (2) The last addresses the Golf Committee. (See general Neighborhood Watch meeting will be June 25, at 5:00 p.m. It will probably be moved to the News & Views Office due to a conference

room conflict. (3) Neighborhood Watch stickers for your windows are available in the office for \$1.00 each. (4) Tomorrow, from 5:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m., the Dance group is making a video for advertisement. They would like to fill up the audience and here is your chance to be in a movie. Come and join them. (5) Relay for Life is July 11-12. (6) I scream, you scream, we all scream for ice cream. Ice Cream Social July 23 sponsored by Emerald Gardens. (7) Sign up for National Night Out –forms are in the office. It will be on August 5th.

Golf - Director Janice Aiken: (1) On June 3, 2014, Ken Bourne, Board President, called a meeting to discuss the plantings behind the 12th tee box. Those attending were: Janice Aiken, Golf Chair; Fred Bourne, President of the Men's Club; Sandy Blaylock, President of the Women's Club; Sharon Schaub, General Manager; Tim O'Larey, Golf Course Superintendent; and Chuck Siver, Golf Pro. After discussion of the different plantings it was decided to plant dogwoods, rhododendrons and azaleas. Tim was asked to draw up a plan of the planting area for review by the Golf Committee. The plan was submitted on June 13 and a review of the plan was held on June 17. Since our window for planting rhododendrons and azaleas is narrow, it was decided that the dogwood trees would be planted. It was also decided that a rhododendron and three azaleas would be planted at the northwest corner, where the arborvitae ends. The General Manager approved this plan. The balance of the plantings will be completed in the fall. (2) Also, on June 3 the role of the Greens Committee was discussed. We were unable to find any mention of the Greens Committee in The Standard Operating Procedures. Therefore, it was decided to disband the Greens Committee, which was actually a duplication of the Golf Committee. The Standard Operating Procedures

the Men's Club, and a representative of the Women's Club. The Administrator (General Manager), Golf Professional and Golf Course Superintendent are advisors to the Golf Committee. A report from Stan Hiller was received stating that 256 bag tags have been made as of June 17, 2014. A copy was given to the Directors.

House & Marketing - Director **Donna** Cole: Director Cornett reported for Director Cole. (1) The house and marketing committees have been busy this past month. AngledEnd (Whit Gurley) has introduced several potential logos to us and with some work to refine them, we expect to have a presentation for the Board for the July meeting. (2) The House Committee has met twice with Rebecca Abraham from Rebecca Abraham Design. A color palette for our house remodel was selected and the selection will be presented to the Board at the July or August meeting. (3) We also had an initial consultation with Metropolitan Design Studio to investigate how to marry upgrades on the inside with a refreshed look on the outside. It is expected that this will be presented to the Board in August.

RV Lot - Director Jim Worley: The maintenance staff has continued spot spraying for weeds as things move in and out. There have been two alarms in the RV lot this month. The alarms have been reset for the summer lot hours. Staff is doing a great job there.

Membership - Director Dave Bunnell: A new member get acquainted meeting was held on Friday, June 13th at 10:30 a.m. in the Dining Hall. There were approximately 20 new members present. In addition, there were board members and representatives from several of the various clubs present. There was coffee and a variety of cupcakes provided by Director Butts and a good time was had by all.

Real Estate - Director Dave Bunnell: A total of 12 homes have were sold through June of 2013.

News & Views/Directory/Website - Director Becky Butts: We are still working on ways to improve and upgrade our paper. Our next meeting is on July 7th at 1:00 p.m.

Rules & Regulations CC&Rs - **Director Jim Worley:** (1) The committee with our General Manager have completed their review of the Bylaws and made changes which will go to the attorney during the regular Rules Committee meeting today. (2) The attorney will be there to answer questions about our Bylaws and any changes that we have. We will be giving the Board updates as they are received.

General Manager's Report -**Sharon Schaub:** (1) Statistics from the National Association of Realtors report that sales nationally increased by 4.9% in May. The Estates housing sales increased 7.5% from May 2013 to May 2014. Statistics on our 2014 home sales to date shows 71 homes sold, highest price \$180K, lowest price \$42K. Total dollar amount of sales is \$7,459,127 - average sales price \$105,058. Two homes sold to fix up and resell, one paid \$42K in January, sold for \$72.9K in March. The second house sold for \$57K in February and resold for \$72.9 in May. The average age for females is 65, for men 68. Sales to date show 19 single men & 17 single women. 108 new residents moved in and 86 moved out. (2) Director Donna Cole arranged meetings with committee members and Becca Abraham of Rebecca Abraham Design to select conceptual color palettes for updating interior design. Additional meetings with Whit Gurley of AngledEnd for creating a new logo and tag line for our rebranding project in marketing, and finally an initial meeting with Jeremy Miller, Principal Architect, Metropolitan Design Studio for a proposal on exterior design for entrances to office, restaurant and (3) Paychex Human auditorium. and updated Employee Handbook and Safety Manual. (4) Schwindt & Company, CPA, will present the audit results at the Board meeting on

July 22, 2014, pending availability of David Schwindt; otherwise a member of the company will do the report. (5) Our Maintenance Department installed new sprinklers in the flower bed by the Pro Shop and replaced 15 sprinkler heads in other garden beds around the facility. Damaged screens were replaced in the front of the building. All the vents and filters in the restaurant were pressure washed and the carpets cleaned. All facility windows were washed inside and out. Replaced the stolen mirror in south ladies restroom on the golf course. (6) Golf Maintenance – Tim added two summer maintenance employees to the golf staff. Crews fertilized the fairways for the first time this year and applied fertilizer and wetting agent on the tees and approaches. New yardage markers installed.

Unfinished Business: There was no unfinished business.

New Business:

(1) Director Butts made a motion for the Board to approve the following members for the Nominating Committee for the 2014 Elections: Lon Reed, Joan Foster, Virginia Mustion, Ron Sartin and Gene Stiles. The motion was seconded by Director Cornett. The motion was approved unanimously.

(2) Director Butts made a motion for the Board to approve the following Staff of the News & Views for 2014: Editor, Kathy Hiller; Reporter, Lettie Zimmerman; Advertising, Glen Barlow; Distribution, Vicki Spencer; Proofreaders, Connie Doyon, Lorna Weller, Gloria Bourne, Nancy Dale, Malena Turner, Christina Brown, Shirley James; Photographer, Ken Leonard; Publisher, Judy Crittenden; Printer, Eagle Press. 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


