Crime Tip

Regulation and Licensing of Solicitors

There has been some question about what to do if a door-to-door salesperson comes to your home. How do you know if they conduct a legitimate business?

The City of Woodburn Ordinance 1187 requires solicitors to go through a process in order to protect the residents within our community.

IT IS UNLAWFUL FOR ANY PERSONTO ENGAGE IN BUSINESS AS A SOLICITOR WTHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF WOODBURN, WITHOUT FIRST OBTAINING A LICENSE.

Solicitors are required to submit an application to the City of Woodburn, including information about themselves and the nature of their business and goods/services to be sold.

Once the application is accepted by the City, an investigation of the applicant's business and moral character is completed - for the protection of public interest.

If the investigation of the person/ business is deemed satisfactory, the City will issue a license card to the applicant for the activity for which the application was made.

SOLICITORS ARE <u>REQUIRED</u>
TO EXHIBIT THEIR LICENSE
CARDS AT THE REQUEST OF ANY
CITIZEN!

VIOLATING THIS ORDINANCE IS A CLASS 4 CIVIL INFRACTION, WHICH CARRIES A \$125 FINE.

If you come into contact with a solicitor in Woodburn, request to see their license card. If they do not show the card, call the Woodburn Police Department at 503-982-2345 to report the violation. For your protection, DO NOT consider purchasing items from a door-to-door salesperson without first verifying they have a license card issued by the City. If there is any doubt, contact the police department.

Many other communities have similar ordinances. If you live outside the City of Woodburn, check with your City Hall or local law enforcement agency to learn what your community requires of solicitors.

Estates Men's Golf Club General Meeting August 5, 2014

The meeting was called to order by President Fred Bourne at 10:00 a.m. in the Dining Hall, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll Call A quorum of officers and committee chairmen was affirmed - Fred Bourne, Len Westphal, Jim Worley, Clint Hansen, Stan Hiller, Allan Lindberg, Paul Eaton, Bob Price and Gene Balfour.

PresidentFredBournecongratulated Chuck Stein as the 2014 Men's Club Champion. There has been a lot of talk about the handicap system and the idea of using what the snowbirds use down south. I (Fred) personally tested several months of data and found it just will not work here.

Vice President Len Westphal had nothing to report.

<u>Treasurer</u> Jim Worley gave our current balance of \$3,468.13. Your golf credit on the books can be used for food and drink items sold only in the pro shop. The only drawback, it will take longer to apply as he must find you in the credit book and make the necessary line item entry.

Mixed Tournament Allan Lindberg said the mixed tournament is coming along fine with paid sponsors, the getting of door prizes, pop and beer to finish out the year. Also be sure to stop in with our sponsors and thank them. Allan raised concern about the switching of tickets and asked that you call to let him know that you switched. In some cases, people have given their ticket to a guest and they forget to bring the ticket for the dinner. The meals have been a concern about the quantity and Allan and Diana are keeping track, so there really is no excess. The shotgun start seems to be working out well, along with the pictures by Ken Leonard and the slide show by Stan Hiller.

Handicap Clint Hansen said the course is in great shape compared to last year at this time due to the new irrigation system along with Tim's help and everyone agreed. Clint said he put together a "private match play" and he thought it was very successful. The "club match play" had some complaints, but overall it worked out. There were a lot of comments pro and con on the "club match play". Also each of us need to watch your score per hole for your own stroke allocation. I am totally satisfied with our current handicap system, which allows you to go to any course and have a fair handicap. It was developed in 1988 and is the world's largest handicap system still in use

OGA Rep Paul Eaton said the OGA is constantly sending emails to play other courses at reduced rates.

Rules Gene Balfour stated the many different legal ways you can mark your ball when on the green.

Membership Stan Hiller reported no change in the bag tag total.

Sunshine Bob Price said he sent one card and asked if there were any more that should be sent.

Publicity President Fred asked if someone was still going around to make sure the golf flyer containers are being replenished and if any tweaking needs to be done. Allan commented that the flyer needs to be tweaked, but the flyers are still good. Len Westphal said we should have some type of coupon to attract golfers. Paul said we need to be careful about what we give away without being too costly and age will still limit this coupon. Allan said he thought the age limit should be 50, the same age as our associate.

New Business:

Gene said he is having problems hitting the ball like he used to and wonders why he could not play from the "forward tees" on men's play day and still be counted. Clint said he can do this and still be fair to all players. Gene would like to see more players play from the forward tees. Let's keep more golfers golfing by allowing us to play from the forward tees.

Tony Pye said that Charbonneau would like to get about 12 guys together for a match play. Fred said it will have to played sometime in September.

Paul Eaton asked what does it really mean when we have a "computer pick". Clint said a true computer pick is done totally by the computer, but you can have many variations on how the pick is done by the computer. The horse races are done manually.

Let's Do Better with Antipsychotic Medications for Dementia

Dementia Care Management

One of the big problems with treating dementia effectively is that doctors typically get one 50-minute class on depression, delirium, and dementia in medical school. (Yes, one class combining all three topics, lasting less than an hour). Once in practice, doctors see their patients with dementia for about 15-20 minutes in the course of an office visit. If you are the primary care partner, it's likely you have more experience with the day-to-day ins and outs of dementia than the doctor does

Let's look at the top three reasons why people with Alzheimer's disease are put on antipsychotic medications, check the facts, and explore alternatives.

- 1. "The doctor said this medication is for dementia." Currently, there are only four medications approved for treatment of dementia: Aricept (donepezil), Exelon (rivastigmine), Razadyne (galantamine), and Namenda (memantine). Any other drug is NOT approved for the treatment of dementia.
- 2. "The doctor said this will make him stop having behaviors." Because dementia-related behaviors are attempts to communicate, it's much more effective to identify what is causing the behavior and then fix the underlying cause.
- 3. "The doctor said this will help her sleep." Instead of using an antipsychotic to achieve sleep, try these ideas: Is the person getting so much sleep during the day that sleeping during the night is difficult? If so, start gradually reducing nap times by 5-10 minutes until they're about 30-60 minutes long. If a person doesn't feel a sense of purpose or have something to look forward to during

the day, daytime sleep can become the default mode and disrupt nighttime sleep. Establish a bedtime routine and stick to it. Allow extra time to get through the routine (about 1.5-2 times as long as it would take you to do it) and provide cueing and assistance as needed. Check the environment. Ensure the temperature is comfortable (people with dementia often are colder than we are). Try soft music as a background noise, and introduce a nightlight for an added sense of security. Full days lead to good sleep. Exercise, household chores, leisure pursuits... these all create a full day. Be mindful though, of the difference between a "full" day and an over stimulating one. Overstimulation, just like under-stimulation, can lead to nighttime sleep difficulty.


