15.11 Vision Clearance Area: [12/13/11]
(a) City of Woodburn : A vision clearance area shall contain no plants, fence, wall, structure, sign, parking space, loading space or temporary or permanent obstruction exceeding 30 inches in height [measured from the top of the curb or, where no curb exists, from the established street centerline grade] except trees, provided branches and foliage are removed to a height of 7 feet above grade:
(1) At the intersection of two streets, the vision clearance area is formed by a combination of the following lines: a

line extending 30 feet from the two lot lines adjacent to a street, and a third line drew across the corner of the lot that connects the ends of the lines, creating a triangular vision clearance area.
(2) At the intersection of a street and a driveway, the vision clearance area is formed by a combination of the following lines: a line extending ten feet from the intersection along the back of curb, a line extending ten feet along the side of the driveway, a third line drawn across the corner of the lot that connects the ends of the lines, creating a triangular vision clearance area.
(b) Senior Estates: A vision clearance area shall contain no plants, fence, wall, structure, exceeding 30 inches in height [measured from the top of the Curb] except a "post sign" not larger than $18 \times 24$ inches advertising that property for sale or rent.

At French Prairie Care Center we saw several members of The Estates and are pleased to report that Forrest Gutshall, the man in the picture with Annie and John, has returned to his home in The Estates. At Cascade Park we visited the exercise group. Annie was a great reward to them after their workout. At Heartwood Memory Care, residents were settling into their beautiful new home. John and Annie also visit the Salem Hospital pediatric unit. Wherever they go, they brighten peoples' day!

## Estates Women's Golf Club General Meeting July 21, 2014

President Sandy Blaylock called the meeting to order at 11:30 a.m. A Quorum was determined followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. A motion was made by Louise Davidson to approve the June 16 minutes as published in the News \& Views on June 27, 2014. Seconded by Becky Butts. Motion passed.

Treasurers Report - Nancy Reed: Reported that $\$ 25.00$ was sent to Leonard Schmidt for Rose Garden Maintenance.

VP - Jan Stein: Reported that \$ 600 is allowed for pay-outs for the Club Championship on August $11 \& 13$. The 9 and 18 holers need to sign-up by August 6. It should be a lot of fun.

Sandy Blaylock stated that she would like to give her Medallion to Shirley Boysal.

Nancy Reed stated that $\$ 50.00$ for membership was collected. She also has a box of old records from 2002-2011. Janice Aiken suggested where they might be stored. It was also suggested that a work party be formed to go over the records to see what to keep and what to put on the scanner.

## COMMITTEE REPORTS:

OGA - Nancy Littlemore: The OGA Packet has arrived. The OGA Directors handbook was enclosed, and the 2014 schedule will be posted.

Membership \& Books - Marge Epling: Read by Nancy Reed. "There are now 489 -hole members and 56 18hole members and 12 social for a total of 106. There is a deposit of $\$ 50$ which is dues from new member Judy Fredericks. She is going to be a 9 -hole member, and the reason the number stays the same for the 9 -holers is because Patty Cummings has changed from a nine to eighteen. Thanks, Marge."

Social - Penny Sealy and Louise Davidson: No meeting or Lunch in August.

Handicap - Marlene Johnson: August 11 and 13 is the Club Championship. Don't forget to sign up. I want to remind everyone to remember to put your scorecards in the white box before you leave on play day. We cannot accept a score card turned in at a later date.

BOD Golf Chair - Janice Aiken: Plantings at the 12th tee box - We have not made much progress on the plantings. Tim O'Larey has been in communication with the Nursery where he obtains nursery stock. They have indicated that it is not a good idea to plant rhodies and azaleas in front of a white vinyl fence because the radiated heat from the sun off the fence would burn the plants. Yardage Marker on 1st Tee Box - The yardage marker will be placed between the two tee boxes on number 1 . Concerns that were discussed Tim O'Larey gave a report on work that has been completed and work that will be completed on the Golf course.

1. Lines in front of the greens - Tim will be putting an orange line in front of greens to direct golf carts.
2. Golfers need to follow the 90 degree rule on the course. Do not drive down the fairways.
3. Two more trees will be planted behind the 18th green when weather cools.
4. The Estates sign on \# 1 needs repair and cleaning. The Woodcarvers Club will be asked if they would be interested in making a new sign.
5. Apple tree on 10 ; could someone trim up this tree in the fall?
6. Tim will begin spraying for grubs on 10 and 13.
7. Tunnel - Carts are not visible going through the tunnel. Could a light and switch be put at each end of the tunnel so that golfers know when a cart is going through the tunnel? Need fencing on the north side of tunnel, the same on the south side of tunnel. This is a safety issue.
8. Would like to see blinkers (like the pedestrian crossing blinkers) at the
crossing on Rainier Road and W. Hayes Street to stop traffic when carts are crossing.

Sharon Schaub has been asked to follow up on items \# 7 and $\# 8$ and find out who is responsible: the city, the state, or the golf course.
Tim's Report update:
. Trimmed suckers off the poplar trees.
2. Pruned the weeping cherries.
3. Pruned low-hanging branches on cedar, spruce and pine trees on several holes.
4. Pulled stumps from left side of \#4 fairway and behind \#12 tee.
5. Investigating and repairing irrigation heads where the ground is wet around the sprinkler. Have found some heads that were not running and repaired those.
6. Continuing to trim around new sprinkler heads.
7. Continuing to remove oId sprinklers and level fairways where the old sprinklers were.

## On Tim's to-do-list:

1. Plant arborvitae along the 4 , fence behind $\# 12$ tee.
2. Measure distance from part circle sprinklers to property lines and order and install back nozzles.
3. Paint orange lines in front of greens to direct golf carts.
4. Level lateral lines of new irrigation system that are ruts across the fairways.
5. Put the tee sign back on first tee.

Mixed Tournaments - Diana Lindberg: Absent with notice but submitted e-mail to be read by Nancy Reed. "We have had a busy season since the last meeting. The shotgun starts have proven to be successful this year. We are finishing the game in about 4 hours and 15 minutes. We have had an average of 132 players at the 4 tournaments and 18 extra guests for dinner. We look forward to the over 80 , sponsored by McCully Realty, on August 4th. On August 9, the Woodburn Hearing Center Tournament is a two-person scramble, with signups starting today July 21. We will have another "closest to the line" competition on August 9. ## Zucchini Season

Now is the time to do something about saving your zucchini harvest for the winter. Previously I have frozen thinly sliced whole unpeeled smaller ones in zip lock freezer bags. These can be dumped into a soup in the winter, or thawed and soaked in milk or dipped into lightly beaten eggs and then covered in bread crumbs and fried in vegetable oil. Another way to preserve them is to shred the larger,
seeded, peeled ones and make them into bread. The loaves freeze very well and are welcome in the winter as a quick treat.

Recently a friend gave me the idea of freezing shredded zucchini, a cup at a time. Many recipes call for one or two cups of shredded zucchini, so this sounds practical and especially useful for using up those large zucchini that "got away". Here is a quick recipe for turning shredded zucchini into patties:

## Zucchini Fritters

Combine 2 cups of grated zucchini with 1 grated onion, 1 slightly beaten egg, 2 tablespoons of wheat germ, 1/2 teaspoon of tarragon leaves, 2 or 3 tablespoons of flour and salt and pepper. Drop a tablespoon at a time of the mixture into vegetable oil on medium heat in a frying pan. Flatten with the back of the spoon. Turn when brown. Drain onto a paper towel and season with seasoned salt before serving. Can be reheated.

Wondering what to make for Christmas gifts this year? How about some homemade zucchini marmalade?

## Marmalade

Combine 1 peeled, seeded, chopped orange, 1 8-ounce jar of chopped maraschino cherries and syrup and 5 pounds of shredded zucchini in a large cooking pot. Add 1 20-ounce can of pineapple and juice, the juice of two lemons and 5 pounds of sugar. Cook until desired thickness. Pour into sterilized jars and seal.

Whoever thought zucchini could be so good?

## Protecting Your Computer from Identity Theft

One overwhelming component that I have found in dealing with Identity Theft and various other scams is the use of computers and the internet. Although many of us are not 'up to date' on the latest computer gadgets, issues, etc., we can still play a role in making it more difficult for people to access our information on our own computers. I visited the FBI website (http://www.fbi.gov/scams-safety/ computer_protect) to find solutions for those in my community to take basic steps to protect themselves and their computers and found the following information useful:

Below are some key steps to protecting your computer from unwanted intrusion:

## Keep Your Firewall Turned

 On: A firewall helps protect your computer from hackers who might try to gain access to crash it, delete information, or even steal passwords or other sensitive information. Software firewalls are widely recommended for single computers. The software is prepackaged on some operating systems or can be purchased for individual computers. For multiple networked computers, hardware routers typically provide firewall protection.Install or Update Your Antivirus Software: Antivirus software is designed to prevent malicious software programs from embedding on your computer. If it detects malicious code, like a virus or a worm, it works to disarm or remove it. Viruses can infect computers without users' knowledge. Most types of antivirus software can be set up to update automatically.

Install or Update Your Antispyware Technology: Spyware is just what it sounds like-software that is surreptitiously installed on your computer to let others peer into your activities on the computer.

Some spyware collects information about you without your consent or produces unwanted pop-up ads on your web browser. Some operating systems offer free spyware protection, and inexpensive software is readily available for download on the Internet or at your local computer store. Be wary of ads on the Internet offering downloadable antispyware-in some cases these products may be fake and may actually contain spyware or other malicious code. It's like buying groceries-shop where you trust.

Keep Your Operating System Up to Date: Computer operating systems are periodically updated to stay in tune with technology requirements and to fix security holes. Be sure to install the updates to ensure your computer has the latest protection.

Be Careful What You Download: Carelessly downloading e-mail attachments can circumvent even the most vigilant anti-virus software. Never open an e-mail attachment from someone you don't know, and be wary of forwarded attachments from people you do know. They may have unwittingly advanced malicious code.

Turn Off Your Computer: With the growth of high-speed Internet connections, many opt to leave their computers on and ready for action. The downside is that being "always on" renders computers more susceptible. Beyond firewall protection, which is designed to fend off unwanted attacks, turning the computer off effectively severs an attacker's connection-be it spyware or a botnet that employs your computer's resources to reach out to other unwitting users.

If you are having difficulty with the information provided, find a reputable computer sales or repair company for assistance. They should be able to show you some basic steps to protect your computer, which could very well protect you in the long term.
