Treasurer's Report

Estates Golf & Country Club Treasurer's Report For December 22, 2014

Current Account Status

The balances reported today were reconciled with bank statements and balance sheets provided by the Estates bookkeeper as of November 30, 2014.

The Operating Account balance as of November 30, 2014, was \$301,734.85. The Reserve Account balance as of November 30, 2014, was \$876,794.70.

The Accounts Receivable statistics presented in this report were determined as of December 22, 2014. On this date, the balance of our Accounts Receivable was \$54,152.43. We have 40 delinquent accounts which represent a 2.7% delinquency rate. We have 13 liens filed against properties with delinquent accounts. There are 8 delinquent properties in foreclosure and 5 other delinquent properties that are either bank owned or will soon be owned by the lender. Our attorneys are handling 15 delinquent accounts in an effort to collect the delinquent money owed to the Association. The Board recently approved the write off of 13 delinquent accounts as "uncollectible" based on advice from our attorneys. This uncollectible debt totaled \$12,023.02.

Keep in mind that each year the Budget Committee projects an amount of bad debt that will be uncollectible and written off. This is an expense item, line item 6-7050, in the Operating Budget. For 2014, the Budget Committee projected bad debt totals to be \$15,000.00; thus, the \$12,023.02 actually written off as uncollectible was \$2,976.98 less than projected.

The Rules Committee would like to remind you about rules in the Health Center (Exercise Room) and the Swimming Room:

Unattended children have been observed in the Exercise Room. Not only is this against our rules, but it is potentially dangerous for the child.

Please note the Association's established rules, which may be found on our website, under Community, and are posted at the Health Center.

HEALTH CENTER - Rules and Regulations, Page 3.

- 6.1 Pets are not permitted in the Health Center.
- 6.2 Guests are requested to donate 50 cents each time a facility is used.
- 6.3 Guests under the age of eighteen (18) are limited to the hours of 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. in the Swimming Pool only.
- 6.4 Guests under the age of eighteen (18) are not permitted in the Spa or to use the Exercise Room or exercise equipment.
- 6.5 Guests under the age of four (4) are not permitted in the Swimming Pool or Spa.
 - 6.6 Lifesaving equipment is for emergency use only.
- 6.7 Persons with a communicable disease, an open sore or wound, or a bandage of any kind are not permitted to use the Swimming Pool or the Spa.
 - 6.8 Diapers are not permitted in the Swimming Pool or Spa.
- 6.9 Members and guests must take a soapy shower before entering the Swimming Pool or Spa.
- 6.10 Suntan lotion or oils must be removed before entering the Swimming Pool or Spa.
- 6.11 Food and beverages are not permitted in the Health Center or the sundeck area.
- 6.12 Persons using the Swimming Pool or Spa must wear bathing suits. Cut-offs or street clothes are not permitted.
 - 6.13 Lap swimmers have priority over casual swimmers.
- 6.14 Diving, running, and horseplay is not permitted in Health Center or sundeck areas.
 - 6.15 Toys, inner tubes, surf boards, etc. are not permitted in the Health Center.

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Taking a Winter Trip?

Preparedness is paramount when it comes to road trips year-round, and hitting the road for a long drive during winter months is no exception. With an increased risk of potential driving hazards like sleet, snow, strong winds and frigid temperatures, it's a good idea to think about ways to ensure you'll travel safely.

Consider the following tips when preparing for your winter road trip:

- Invest in an emergency kit for your vehicle. Available at most major retailers, these kits are relatively inexpensive and contain items like flares, booster cables, flashlights, ponchos and first aid supplies for minor injuries.
- **Develop a contingency plan.** Create a strategy for dealing with a flat tire, vehicle accident, dead battery or other potential travel delays. Keep a hard-copy list of people or businesses to contact for help should you need it.
- Stay in touch. Check in with a designated contact during your journey with updates on your location, delays encountered or unexpected situations that require longer travel time. When driving, remember always to pull off the road before using your cell phone.
- Check the local weather report before heading out. Winter weather can be tricky and forecasts aren't always accurate. You can double check your destination's weather history on a variety of websites to determine typical conditions to expect in that area during your travels.
- Store warm clothes and blankets in your vehicle. Be prepared to stay warm if you're stuck for extended periods by keeping a blanket or two in your car. Also, pack a small travel case with snow boots, socks, gloves, a scarf, hat and heavy sweater in case you need to leave your vehicle.
- Review your travel route without GPS. Read through detailed driving directions, including alternate routes, so you know your options. Also consider keeping a map handy in case your navigation system is compromised during your trip.

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

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
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
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Swanson Has Been Saved!



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I Tawt I Taw a Puddy Tat

Many of you are aware there are skunks in our neighborhood. Those of us with pets need to be extra careful that our four-legged friends don't encounter them. Because many of you don't have access to the Internet nor an easy way to get to the library, I would like to share with you what I've learned about these creatures and how to get rid of their stink, if your pet...or you...have an unpleasant encounter with one.

Skunks are typically solitary creatures which live in burrows and are most active at dawn and dusk.

Omnivorous scavengers, they enjoy digging in lawns and gardens for grubs and worms. Those of us with gardens are pretty much offering them a smorgasbord. As with raccoons, it is wise to keep pet food indoors and the area around your garbage cans tidy.

With poor eyesight, skunks often are unable to discern what is and isn't a threat. As a result, they'll usually err on the side of caution. Good for them; not so good for us. Not long ago, our dog surprised one in our backyard garden late at night when we'd let him out. Luckily, it didn't hit him square in the face, since a skunk's musk can cause temporary blindness.

A skunk's scent glands produce a mixture of sulfur-containing chemicals which, as we all know, are remarkably strong and which render the odor long-lasting. Many people will recommend a bath of tomato juice or vinegar to neutralize the odor, but that only masks it and then your pet smells like a skunk salad. Here is one recipe I found online which worked for us.

As soon as you realize your pet has been sprayed by a skunk, put on rubber or latex gloves and old clothes and look him over for bites or scratches. Also check his eyes for redness or discharge. If any injuries are found, you should contact your veterinarian immediately. You're working against the clock here: The longer you wait to begin the process, the harder it will be to remove the odor. Get set up for bathing your pet outdoors or in an easy-to-clean area of your home, such as the laundry room or bathroom. If indoors, open windows and turn on fans.

In a large plastic container, combine 1 quart hydrogen peroxide (a large, 32-ounce bottle), 1/4 cup baking soda, and 1 to 2 teaspoons of liquid soap (such as Dawn, which has helpful grease-removing properties. If you can wash a duck in it, you can wash a dog or cat in it). Add lukewarm water if needed (for large dogs). Mix ingredients carefully and well. The solution will fizz because a chemical reaction is occurring. *Use immediately; do not store, especially in a sealed container.*

Apply a small strip of eye lubricant (such as Puralube) or 1-2 drops of mineral oil to your pet's eyes.

This will help protect the eyes in case any of the solution splashes or drips in. If the solution does get into your pet's eyes, flush them immediately with warm water

Do not soak your pet with water prior to bathing. Wash your pet thoroughly, massaging the solution deep into your pet's coat. You may wish to use a sponge or washcloth, especially on the face. Avoid getting the solution in the animal's eyes, ears or mouth.

Allow the solution to remain on your pet for at least five minutes or longer if a strong odor persists. Try to restrain them gently from shaking it off (good luck with that). Rinse your pet well with lukewarm water. Repeat as necessary until the odor is gone.

Please keep in mind that anything the skunk's musk has touched...your lawn, plants in your garden...and whatever your pet has touched after being sprayed... your carpets, your furniture, you...will also have the odor. It will fade but it may take several weeks to do so. Since hydrogen peroxide is a type of bleaching agent, I don't recommend you wash anything in this solution that you don't want bleached even slightly. I don't know what it would do to plants. You can bathe in it, of course, but I couldn't find any home remedies online about how to get rid of the odor in furniture, etc. There is a product called Nature's Miracle Skunk Odor Remover available online for about \$12.00 (including shipping) for a 32-ounce bottle. I found it at Pet360.com, but your veterinarian may also carry it. Walmart and G.W. Hardware do not. I've yet to receive it so cannot say if it works or not.

We called the recreation coordinator for Parks and Recreation, Kyle Buse. He drives most of these trips for seniors, including this trip. Kyle is so good to us seniors. He is like a grandson you could only wish for.

No questions asked, he drove us to Roseburg Mercy Hospital, 22 miles north of Canyonville. Kyle stayed with me the whole time while Will was in the ER. They finally admitted Will because he was actually classified as still bleeding and they couldn't release him. We were there until 10:30 p.m. before the medical staff decided what they were going to do.

Kyle and I drove back to Canyonville. The next morning, he drove me back to Roseburg, leaving the other 8 people at the Casino. He had a side trip planned for Thursday, October 2, but I think he told the others what was going on and nobody really was interested in the side trip. Will and I had asked for a side trip because we really don't like to gamble all that time.

So Kyle and I went back to the hospital. They were prepping Will for a colonoscopy but the doctor couldn't do the procedure until 6:30 that evening. When that was done, the doctor came out of the procedure room and walked up to me and said, "Your husband has cancer." That was it. He showed me some pictures of the mass and polyps that were involved. We didn't get away from there until 7:30 that night.

All day long Kyle stayed with me. He just sat on either a chair or on the floor doing his work on his laptop that he would have done back in his room, a lot more comfortably. There was never a complaint out of him. He is to be commended for his humanitarian actions. I thought when Stu Spence transferred to La Grande they would never find anyone to replace him who was as

conscientious but, they have. Kyle is a hardworking, conscientious, giving, warmhearted young man and I am very proud to call him our friend. I told him if he needed a grandma and grandpa we would adopt him in a heartbeat.

Will is still recovering, and we are taking it one day at a time but with Kyle's assistance, we were well taken care of away from home and we wanted to say a public "Thank you".

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
