Golf Car Drivers, Take Note




This is an example of what can happen. This is not a picture of an actual crash in or around Woodburn Estates & Golf.

Gentle Yoga Classes

I'm John Porter. I have been practicing and teaching yoga for 35 years. I own Pegasus Training and Consulting Company. I have been a teacher and trainer for the past 15 years, providing training for mental health and substance abuse disorder treatment counselors. I have a Masters' Degree in Special Education/Psychology from Texas A & M University, and have lived in Woodburn Estates & Golf for 2 1/2 years. I'm attempting to retire

and would like to fill some of my time with an activity that I find useful in my everyday life.

Gentle Yoga is a great class for beginners, baby boomers, active seniors and anyone interested in exploring a gentle practice. This class includes basic breathing exercises, as well as a variety of foundational postures (standing, seated, and on the floor). The intention of this yoga practice is to cultivate an internal meditative experience while stretching and recharging the body.

It offers the opportunity to maintain flexibility and mobility while providing stretches and simple yoga postures. The activities are designed for those who currently have sufficient mobility to do floor exercises as well as standing and balancing exercises.

Local Rules for Members, Associates, and Guests as posted on the sign in front of the Pro Shop.

- 1. U.S.G.A. rules govern all play, including SLOW PLAY.
- 2. Dress Code:
 - A. Shoes & shirts at all times. No steel spikes.
 - B. Men shirt with collar, short or long sleeves.
 - C. Women blouse/shirt with or without sleeves.
 - D. NOT ACCEPTABLE spandex pants or shorts; sweat pants, tube or tank tips, t-shirt or spaghetti straps of any kind.
- 3. All players must sign in at the pro shop and start from the 1st tee unless otherwise approved by the pro shop staff.
- 4. Foursomes only, unless authorized by pro shop. No more than 2 riders per car. No animals of any sort allowed on golf course, or in car on golf course.
- 5. All guests must have a receipt for the day's play and members must have a current year's bag tag along with a set of golf clubs and bag for each player.
- 6. Replace divots with the sand that is provided, repair ball marks even if not yours.
 - 7. Be courteous of fellow golfers and allow faster players to play through.
 - 8. We ask you to take responsibility for any damage personal property.
 - 9. Play at your own risk.

Sundowners Golf will be starting its regular playing season the first Monday in June, which this year will be June 1. Sundowners is a 9-hole golf competition that plays each Monday through the last Monday in September, which this year will be on September 28. All players are welcome.

The entry fees for the entire season will be \$5.00, with all money collected to go for awards at the season end banquet. Sorry, no discounts for late comers.

Each week each player must sign in at the Golf Pro Shop to pay your daily golf green fees if you are not a paid golfer. Then be at the Gazebo by 3:30 p.m. to draw for a playing partner. This is a shotgun start with play starting at 4:00 p.m.

Each week each winning team member is awarded 2 points for first place and 1 point each for second place for low net and 2 points for first place and 1 point each for second place for fewest putts. Follow the rules of the course regarding the use of the cart paths or fairways and rules for winter and summer play. Individual handicaps are not required to participate. A modified Callaway Handicap system is used for each weekly event. Details of the modified Callaway Handicap System will be provided each week for those new or unfamiliar with this handicap system.

This year, as in past years, players can, after the game, get together at one of the local restaurants for dinner and/or libations (Dutch treat) – and of course bragging of those spectacular shots or pains and sorrow for those missed. Any and all are welcome whether playing or not.

Secretary's Report: Secretary Chuck Johnson reported that member Lon Reed had given him a "Thank You" card in response to a "Get Well" card sent to him by the Men's Golf Club. Lon asked that the card be read at today's Meeting. Unfortunately, Secretary Johnson had a "senior moment" and left the card at home. Upon his return home, he opened the card from Lon Reed which read: "Thank you for the Get Well card. Surgery has been a challenge. Look forward to getting back to golf soon. Lon."

Stan also stated that all of the Association activities are now being publicized in the News & Views.

Closing Comments: Russ Krussow stated that we should thank the golf course maintenance crew for their work on our course, specifically mowing closely around the yardage markers found on the sprinkler heads. Gene Stiles appealed to our members to always post all scores to ensure that a valid handicap is established and avoid cheating via "sandbagging". A discussion then ensued relative to when scores should be posted (practice rounds, partial rounds, etc.). Kurt Benson reiterated that our members should post accurate scores for each round. Len Westphal stated that sometimes a new member posts scores played on our course, but the computer does not recognize that the new member is posting for our course and instead posts the score for their old course. This issue will be brought to the attention of the Men's Golf Club Handicap Chairman, Clint Hansen, upon his return. Russ Krussow then inquired if the Men's Golf Club had ever considered placing a cap on handicaps. He stated that he was aware of some Men's Golf Clubs that limit handicaps to a 36 max. Chuck Johnson commented that when he lived in Northern California, the Northern Californian Golf Association placed a men's handicap max at 36 and women's handicap max at 45. President Bourne stated that establishing a maximum handicap had previously been discussed, but he had no objection to revisiting the subject in the future.



At our St. Monica's Circle meeting on April 6, Rita Girard gave us an in depth report on death. It will help your children if they know what you want done. This is an important subject because we all have to die. Death itself is painless, it's getting there that is so painful. We shouldn't be afraid to die.

What to do in preparation for your death:

- 1. Be prepared each day as if it was your last day, by prayer, etc.
- 2. Have a current notarized will.
- 3. Prepare an Advance Care Directive if you do not wish to be put on life support.
- 4. Prepare a Durable Power of Attorney. This will give someone the ability to make decisions on your behalf if you are declared unable to do so.
- 5. Pre-plan your funeral. This is easiest through a funeral home, but otherwise discuss it with a family member.
 - 6. Decide whether you wish to be an organ donor.
- 7. Name someone in your will as your personal representative, and make sure that person has current data regarding your financial and medial information.
 - 8. Prepare an obituary.

Other Information: If you are a veteran, or spouse of a veteran, you can have a burial spot in Willamette National Cemetery free of charge. If you have contacted a funeral home and have a pre-planned funeral, they will arrange a military burial. The Social Security Department will pay the funeral home \$250 toward burial expenses.

Joyce Hewitt Saari, Founding Mother

We hear a lot about "Founding Fathers" but I'm willing to bet that if we looked a little closer we would find just as many "Founding Mothers". Usually, of course, their names don't appear in the history books or on the official documents. The truck museum is fortunate to have a founding mother who is still an active member of the organization. Let's back up a bit and find out how this all came about.

Joyce lives in King City now, but she was born in Portland and remembers fondly the days during World War II when she volunteered at the USO (United Service Organizations) and danced with the sailors whose ships were docking at the port in Portland... she taught them to jitterbug. Certainly it was a time of hardship and anxiety and grief, both here and abroad. Families were torn apart and, sadly, some of them would never be put back together again. So it was a patriotic duty to help the war effort by bringing some relaxation and entertainment to those in the military, and besides that, it was fun for young women like Joyce to meet and dance with all those handsome young men.

It was also a time when there were more opportunities for women in the workplace, and Joyce, who had a business degree, went to work for a business that provided supplies to the military. Later she would become a paralegal and spend 35 years in the legal profession.

She married and had two children with her first husband, but that marriage ended in divorce. It was in 1973 that she married Del Hewitt and began the journey that would put her on course to become a Founding Mother of the truck museum. Del was a former truck driver who then began a business selling truck accessories for big rigs. He used his own plane to make deliveries, but when the rental for hanger space at the Hillsboro Airport became too expensive, he found a 20 acre property in Aurora with a hanger and moved the business there. They also found 16 acres with a 5,000 square foot house on it and moved themselves from. Portland to Aurora as well.

Del had always been interested in old trucks and became president of the local chapter of the American Truck Historical Society. That organization was Joyce's introduction to the world of trucks and she soon developed an avid interest in them. When a friend asked Del to store a truck that he had just restored, the idea for a museum was born. It took a few years and there were a few misfires, but eventually a deal was made for a 99 year lease at \$1 a year for four acres of the 63 acres on a property in Brooks. This property was already the home of a tractor club, but was largely undeveloped at the time. (Now it is the home of 15 different museums.) By 1989 a group of truck enthusiasts had coalesced and were actively working to turn their dreams into reality. That first group consisted of Joyce and Del Hewitt, Ken Self, Judy and Terry Dovre, and Don Butcher. The "reality" was a building 100' x60', and the first truck to go on display there was a 1917 Gersix - forerunner of Kenworth. Later, a man in Grants Pass donated an additional six trucks and the Pacific Northwest Truck Museum was on its way to becoming one of the premier museums of its kind in the country.

Now, more than two decades later, the museum has on display between 70 and 75 trucks of all brands, models, and ages. The original building was enlarged to house an office and library, and later two more buildings were added. Because the museum has continued to expand, it has outgrown its space once again, and there are plans to add yet another building to meet its developing needs.

Del Hewitt died in 2004 and Joyce remained a widow for three years. In 2007 she married Arnie Saari, but they were destined to have only four very happy years together before she was once again a widow. Joyce is justly proud of her contributions to the museum, and remembers with pride the early days when she served as secretary to that small founding group. Like any good mother, she still supports her off-spring as it moves into maturity.




