
Third "Ask the Lawyer" Meeting

Bond Update from the Woodburn School District

oodburn, Ore. – It has been less than three months since voters approved a \$65 million bond to fund repairs, renovations, and technology and security improvements for Woodburn schools. Since that time, school district officials have made progress in several areas:

Bond Offering Completed – Bond sales for the Woodburn School District were very successful, grossing \$72 million, or \$10 million more than originally anticipated. (This will not increase the amount paid by taxpayers over the life of the bond.) This premium was attributed to Moody's Investors Service assigning the Woodburn School District an A1 rating in mid-July based on its sound financial practices and high investor confidence in the offering.

Project Manager Hired – The Woodburn School Board approved a contract for professional services with the J.J. Henri Company of Lake Oswego, Ore to provide construction management services for projects funded by the bond. The J.J. Henri Company was founded in 1993 and has managed construction projects with a combined value of over \$1 billion for education, industrial, health care, transportation institutions or government agencies.

Bond Advisory and Accountability Committee – The Woodburn School Board approved the charter for the Bond Advisory and Accountability Committee on August 6. The BAAC will actively review and regularly report to the school board and Superintendent about bond projects, including the use of bond revenues, performance and financial audits, and assist the school district in reporting back to the community. The BAAC will include two school board members and five community members, ideally with experience in building design, construction, construction financing, public contracting, budgeting, and/or auditing. It is anticipated that the Woodburn School Board will appoint the BAAC members at its meeting on August 20.

Property Acquisition – Laws governing bond expenditures are precise: school districts must spend five percent of the funds within six months and 85 percent within three years of when the bonds are issued. To that end, the Woodburn School District made the timely purchase of a vacant medical office building to provide space for the Welcome Center, district offices and access to a new facility for Success, our alternative high school. These projects can begin immediately without disrupting student learning as they make progress.

The Woodburn School District provides a world class education to more than 5,700 students. Woodburn has rigorous academic programs such as all-day kindergarten, dual language programs in English and Russian or Spanish, Advanced Placement, and the International Baccalaureate Diploma. Woodburn is in the top 10 percent for graduation rates in Oregon; tied for 1st in graduating students with English as a second language; and, is 4th for students from low income households. Go Green with Mint Compost!

Has our community ever thought of Going Green? In case you have not missed their singing and fluttering around your trees and flowers, they have disappeared just like the bees because of, well, continued use of chemical fertilizers.

The other day I delivered a pamphlet to the main office about the local Mint Hay Compost farm in St. Paul. It is an old family farm business run by Cindy Smith. Her farm produces fantastic mint compost. If you walk along Champoeg road you can smell the mint in the big fields throughout the year.

What is mint compost? Their pamphlet explains:

- Mint Compost is a 100% natural compost product. It has quickly gained popular status with landscapers, vegetable growers, and homeowners alike for its overall performance. Mint compost is made from the leftover parts of mint plants used to produce natural mint oil. The mint is processed locally in St. Paul, OR. It is steam distilled at 212 degrees under pressure to extract peppermint essential oils from the mint plant. The end product is a rich black high nutrient natural compost. There is no blending or adding to the mint compost.
- Amendment Report: The nutrient content of the compost is nitrogen (N), phosphorus (P), potash-potassium (K), and sulfur (5). The Meeting was called to order by President Fred Bourne at 10 a.m. in the Dining Hall, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

ROLL CALL: A quorum was established. Officers and Committee Chairmen/ Members present were: Fred Bourne, Len Westphal, Jim Worley, Chuck Johnson, Allan Lindberg, Paul Eaton, Clint Hansen, Bob Price, Stan Hiller, Gene Balfour, Gene Stiles, and Steve Hobson. A total of 24 members attended the Meeting.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: President Bourne acknowledged the winners of the Over 80 Tournament as follows: Bob Scholer, Gross Winner, with a score of 41 (Three way tie with Scholer winning based on the Western Breakdown); Sherman Rogers, Net Winner, with a score of 31. President Bourne then acknowledged the winners of the Club Championship as follows: Fred Bourne, Club Champion; Dennis Wichert, winner of the Second Flight; Don Pooschke, winner of the Third Flight; and Stan Hiller, winner of the Fourth Flight. President Bourne then reported that the End of Watch Tournament scheduled for August 15, 2015, now has 29 teams signed up to play, including 13 teams from Woodburn Estates & Golf. He stated that the 29 teams represent the most participants in the history of the End of Watch Tournament. The Watch Commander and his wife are scheduled to play in the tournament. President Bourne then requested two volunteers to assist with the tournament. Stan Hiller and Gene Stiles agreed to volunteer as needed. The tournament has a shotgun start of 9 a.m. There will be two beverage carts operated by young ladies. The beverages are included in the entry fee, but tips are encouraged for the young ladies operating the beverage carts.

VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT: VP Len Westphal had nothing to report.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Treasurer Jim Worley stated that the balance of the Club's funds at the beginning of July was \$2,783.22. During July, there was an expense for donuts for \$47.92 and a deposit made of \$265.00, leaving a current balance of \$3,000.30.

SECRETARY'S REPORT: Secretary Chuck Johnson had nothing to report. **COMMITTEE REPORTS:**

OGA: Paul Eaton had nothing to report.

Mixed Tournaments: Allan Lindberg stated that there are only two Mixed Tournaments remaining this year. He also reported that the Mixed Tournament fund has balanced out thus far, taking in the approximate amount of money spent for these events.

Handicap: Clint Hansen stated he was pleased with the set up and outcome of the Club Championship, but disappointed in the lack of participation. He would like to see around 60 participants. Members of the Club need to support the Club Championship. The consecutive three days of play has previously been discussed and approved as the Club Championship is meant to be a competitive and demanding tournament. It was mentioned that the Club Championship played this year was on the three hottest days of the summer. Member Ken Bourne suggested that the Club Championship be moved to September as August is a busy month for various tournaments and the weather would undoubtedly be cooler. This is an option that will be discussed by the Golf Committee.

Rules: Gene Balfour reviewed the rule for a ball that stays in a tree and is identified by the golfer. A discussion then ensured relative to the three options available to the golfer in this situation.

Sunshine: Bob Price stated that he sent out 5 appropriate cards in July to the following individuals: Pete White, Farmer Fiebiger, Dorothy Monnier, Nancy Littlemore, and Kim Kilgore.

Membership: Stan Hiller reported that in 2006 there were 553 golfers who paid the annual golf fee. That number has steadily declined, but Stan reported that in the current year there are 255 golfers compared with 254 golfers at this time last year. The breakdown is 163 men golfers and 92 women golfers.

CLOSING COMMENTS: Stan Hiller recommended that new members who move in during the year be allowed to pay the \$40 Men's Golf Club Fee rather than \$45. A discussion ensued on how to encourage more golfers in our community. Dick DeFerrari suggested free golf lessons. Will Abshere asked if new members are still receiving complimentary rounds of golf. Jim Worley verified that new members receive a free round of golf for four with a cart. Steve Hobson stated that the New Member Meetings that are held should have a golf representative there to encourage golf and explain the different golf clubs and programs available. President Bourne stated that we are now publicizing our Associate Golf Member annual fees in the Woodburn Independent and at the Portland Golf Show. He also suggested that we could advertize our annual Associate Golf Member annual fees in the Salem newspaper, the Statesman Journal. Dick DeFerrari suggested that the Salem area is a large market where we should be soliciting new Associate Golf Members. Stan Hiller stated that we are already publicizing our golf course and rates in several other publications. Kurt Benson stated that the rings in the cups often are not at ground level, a problem that needs to be addressed by the Golf Committee and the golf course maintenance crew. Clint Hansen stated that often the rings are moved within the cup when golfers use their putter to pull their ball out of the hole, a problem that has previously been addressed. Kurt Benson also stated that the dress code for the golf course is much more stringent for male golfers when compared to the female golfers. There is an issue with golf carts parked in the shade and yet on the golf course on the right side of the 9th hole. President Bourne reminded that golf carts are not allowed to be parked on the golf course as they can come into play during the course of a round. Paul Eaton suggested to Allan Lindberg that the tables that are set up for the Mixed Tournament dinners are too close together, making it difficult for people to move thru the aisle to their chairs. Allan will ensure that the tables are set up to allow for more space. Gene Balfour stated that this is his last year to reside in Oregon as he and his wife will be living in a warmer climate. He expressed how he will miss his association with the Club and its members. He also reminded the members that Bob LaVere is still at the Hope Village in Canby, Oregon, and would welcome any visitors or phone calls. He can be reached at (503) 984-4871. Gene Balfour then addressed the enclosed patio deck off the Golf Lounge. He stated that the Men's Golf Club paid for the installation of the enclosed patio deck and wondered why it is used by the general public. Will Abshere and Chuck Johnson informed Gene that the subject enclosed patio deck is considered "common area" and available to all members of the Association. Will Abshere further informed Gene that the Country Cottage Restaurant was concerned as to whether our facility would be large enough for their patrons. To encourage the Country Cottage Restaurant to relocate to our facility, owner Renee Hayes was granted access to the enclosed patio deck and the golf lounge to accommodate their patrons. Will Abshere stated that he was sure that Renee would allow the enclosed patio deck to be reserved for a specific time on Men's Golf Play Thursday if requested in advance.

CLOSING: President Bourne moved that our Meeting be adjourned, motion seconded, approved, and the Meeting adjourned at 11 a.m.

THIS WAS NOT A MAILING FROM OUR OFFICE!!

- 1. Bogus return address.
- 2. Postmarked from Fullerton, CA.
- 3. Recipient needed to reply to their website within 7 days.
- 4. Probably collecting email addresses.
- 5. Could have added a virus to the recipients email.

The invitation read:

"Our neighborhood is using a free private online network called Nextdoor Woodburn Estates & Golf and you should join us. On this website, we share service provider recommendations, items for sale/free, safety concerns, local events and much more.

Please join us to build a better neighborhood!

Your Camellia Way neighbors

P.S. It's a great way to meet neighbors and get recommendations for sitters, painters, cleaners and more!"

She was asked to RSVP to their website, using a "free invitation code" that was said to expire in 7 days.

If you have received a similar request, please do NOT respond to anything that seems bogus. Better safe than sorry.



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Keeping Food Safe for Seniors

Are those science experiments growing in the refrigerator? Turns out the molds and invisible germs in your fridge can actually kill you, particularly if you are over age 65 or have a compromised immune system. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reports that every year in the United States, about 48 million people are sickened from eating contaminated food – 128,000 are hospitalized and 3,000 die. Studies reveal that 20 percent of food-borne illness outbreaks – when two or more people become ill from the same contaminated food or drink – start from unsafe food or beverages consumed at home.

To help the public understand the essentials of food health, the Partnership for Food Safety Education sponsors National Food Safety Education Month each September. Formed in 1997, the nonprofit organization works with the food industry, consumer groups and government agencies, including the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and CDC, to help end food-borne illness and death nationwide. This September's awareness campaign addresses the importance of properly chilling foods at home and highlights the Partnership's ongoing program, FightBAC!® (fight bacteria!).

"It is especially important for seniors to avoid eating and drinking unsafe food and beverages," said Sheryl Sodorff, Community Outreach Administrator, Right at Home of Woodburn. "As we age, our bodies may not digest foods the same way as when we were younger, and our kidneys and liver can become slower in removing toxins. Many older adults live with chronic conditions such as arthritis and diabetes, and these diseases, plus medications to treat the conditions, can make the elderly more susceptible to food-borne illness. Caregivers are often the first line of defense in ensuring seniors eat nutritional foods that are properly handled, prepared and consumed."

Sodorff notes that older people with cognitive and vision limitations may read food expiration labels and cooking instructions incorrectly, and this can put the individuals at risk for life-threatening infections. A loss of smell with aging also can prevent seniors from determining when some foods go bad. Common food pathogens include Listeria, Salmonella, E. coli, Campylobacter jejuni and Clostridium botulinum, which can lead to symptoms including diarrhea, vomiting, fever and neurological deficits.

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Through the FightBAC!® four core messages – clean, separate, cook and chill – the Partnership for Food Safety Education encourages children through seniors to know how to prevent microbial hazards in their food.

- Clean. When handling and preparing foods, frequently wash your hands thoroughly with warm water and soap for at least 20 seconds, and clean surfaces that foods touch. Rinse fruits and vegetables well with water, including melons and produce that grow on, in or close to the soil. Drying fruits and vegetables with a paper towel after rinsing helps remove bacteria and limits moisture that contaminants need for growth. When cleaning produce, remove outer leaves, stems, bad spots and dirt because bacteria can thrive in these areas. Also, regularly clean your refrigerator with hot, soapy water, including the storage bins, refrigerator walls and undersides of shelves.
- **Separate.** Raw meat, seafood, poultry and eggs can drip juices on other foods and spread bacteria. Avoid cross-contaminating foods by using a separate cutting board, plates and utensils when handling and cooking raw meat, seafood and poultry.
- Cook. Proper cooking temperatures vary with food type and thickness. When microwaving leftovers, be sure there are no cold spots in the food, where bacteria can survive. Stir and rotate foods for even cooking. Food safety guidelines recommend that most foods be cooked to a minimum internal temperature of 160° F, measured with a food thermometer. The USDA provides a chart of safe internal food temperatures that you can keep handy in the kitchen.
- Chill. Always refrigerate or freeze perishable foods and leftovers within two hours of purchase or use (one hour when the temperature is 90° F or above). The refrigerator temperature should be 40° F or below and checked with an appliance thermometer available at grocery, hardware or discount stores. Do not thaw foods at room temperature. Thaw foods safely in the refrigerator or use the quick-thaw method of submerging airtight-sealed foods in cold water. Or, thaw food in the microwave and cook it immediately. Marinate foods only in the refrigerator. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) offers a thorough cold storage chart of how long foods can be refrigerated or frozen safely. For example, keep hard-boiled eggs only up to a week in the refrigerator, and keep ground meat and poultry refrigerated one to two days before cooking and consuming. Cooked ham safely stores in the freezer for one to two months; a frozen turkey, up to a year.

Greater food safety vigilance is needed than in previous generations because today's bacteria are adapting and becoming more resistant to treatment. "This is where people can help each other stay healthy by following the basic 'clean, separate, cook and chill' safety tips," Sodorff advises. To help ensure older loved ones are protected from food pathogens, Sodorff explains that Right at Home caregivers can assist with shopping for safe, clean foods; properly storing and cooking foods; and providing sanitized cleanup of kitchen and dining areas.
