That's Not What I Said, Is It?

Last issue I had two articles on the front page and what I thought I said and how some members interpreted what I said apparently wasn't the same.

Let me start off with: I am not perfect and please don't expect me to be. My vision is for Woodburn Estates & Golf to be a place of harmony and a place people enjoy. We have a fantastic community and so much to offer to our members, both homeowners and associates.

My second vision is to improve communications: in some cases, I have been successful; but in others, well let's just say there is room for improvement on my part.

Now to the articles in the last issue...

My intent with the first article "Say No to Increasing Membership Dues" was to focus on the importance of adding new Associate Members. By adding new Associate Members, we increase our revenues with minimal, if any, increases in our expenses. Adding new members helps to offset any increased operating costs we may incur.

My intent was not to scare you and for that I apologize. I know a majority of our members are on fixed incomes and they struggle to afford to live in Woodburn Estates & Golf and not just because of the dues.

I must also say we are in a very healthy position financially. I talk with many other managers of similar associations and we are by far one of the most financially healthy organizations.

I was also not trying to say we are planning an increase in dues. I won't make a George H.W. Bush gaff and say there won't be increases, but there are no plans this year to increase dues or fees.

My intent with the second article, "Recall Meeting Facts and Realities" was simply to say I have a responsibility to spend your money wisely and give you the facts. To me it's not an issue of recalling one or more board members; it's the issue of letting you know the costs and chances of a successful recall.

In all honesty, I do not believe there are enough members interested in the recall for the recall to be successful. To go one step further, I do not believe we will get the necessary participation to even count the votes. Please believe me; my intent is to look after your best interests.

I should have added this information in the previous article. It only takes 250 signatures to request a recall vote be held. However, it takes 1125 (75% of our membership) sending in their votes before we can even start to count the votes. It then takes 50% of those voting for the removal of each director.

As an update, the number of signatures currently on the petition is 222 and dropping. At the present time the recall process is over and it is time to heal the wounds and once again come together as a vibrant community. Yes, there will still be differences of opinion, but I know we can work together and make things better than ever.

Again, I apologize for any confusion in what I wrote and I hope you will forgive me.

Unconditional Surrender statue (A Kiss That Lingers)

The 26-foot-tall “Unconditional Surrender” statue on Sarasota’s Bayfront has been the subject of countless speeches, groans, quips, and kudos since it made its first appearance here in 2005. It will likely stay in that same spot for a decade, after the city accepted the donation of a World War II veteran who put up \$500,000 to buy the statue, on the condition that it stay out front of city-owned Marina Jack.

Jack Curran, a former signalman who served in the Pacific and European theaters, says he bought the statue for all the other guys out there like him, who were raised in the great Depression and served their country in World War II and came home to their sweethearts. He suspects the rest of the world is forgetting about them. Others have debated whether the statue is a fitting tribute to veterans or a big gaudy side-show on U.S. 41.

Ruth Ann and I visited the statue while we were in Sarasota, Florida and Jo Burdnett captured our photo on February 3, 2016. [According to Wikipedia, *Unconditional Surrender* is a series of sculptures by Seward Johnson resembling a photograph by Alfred Eisenstaedt, *V-J day in Times Square*, but said by Johnson to be based on a similar, less well known, photograph by Victor Jorgensen. The original statue was first installed in Sarasota, Florida, then was moved to San Diego, California, and New York City, New York. Copies have been installed in Hamilton, New Jersey; Pearl Harbor, Hawaii; and Normandy, France. Ed.]

Estates Men’s Golf General Meeting

Estates Men’s Golf General Meeting February 3, 2016

The Meeting was called to order by President Russ Krussow at 10 a.m. in the Dining Hall, followed by the *Pledge of Allegiance*.

Roll Call: A quorum of officers was established. Officers and Committee Chairmen/Members present were: Russ Krussow, Paul Eaton, Chuck Johnson, Stan Hiller, Allan Lindberg, Gene Stiles, and Ron Hansen. Also present were General Manager Tom Staskiewicz and Past President Fred Bourne who is also the Club’s representative on the Greens Committee. A total of 24 members attended the Meeting.

President’s Report: President Krussow asked the members present if they would be in favor of a three club or four club format for our Thursday Play. A discussion ensued and the majority of the members present requested that a three club format be scheduled for one of our Thursday Play Days. President Krussow then reminded the members that when they are using the Driving Range that dirty range balls should not be mixed with clean range balls, an issue right now due to the wet weather we have experienced.

Vice President’s Report: VP Paul Eaton, also our OGA representative, discussed the Pacific Northwest Golf Association (PNGA) and provided members with the PNGA magazine and brochures. He pointed out that all OGA members should be receiving the PNGA magazine. If you are not receiving this publication, you need to ensure that the OGA has your correct mailing address. Paul then thanked GM Tom Staskiewicz for taking over the Oregon Trail Program as this program is instrumental in obtaining new Golf Associates. Paul then stated that volunteers are often needed for major OGA and PNGA Golf Tournaments.

Treasurer’s Report: Treasurer Jim Worley was absent with notice. He had provided President Krussow with his report which was then read by President Krussow as follows: Current balance of the Club’s Account \$2,196.19 with \$70 paid to the Sunshine Committee in 2015 for cards sent out by Chairman Bob Price. Annual Club Fees are now \$45 with \$35 being sent to the OGA.

Secretary’s Report: Nothing to report.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Rules: Chairman Ron Hansen asked the members present to answer “True” or “False” to three questions involving the rules. A question was also raised regarding a ball stuck between the rakes that are now vertically placed and the sand trap. The answer to the question was to drop the ball in the trap without penalty.

Sunshine/Mixed Tournaments: Chairman Bob Price was absent.

Handicap: Allan Lindberg reported that on April 19 he would be attending a Handicap Certification Seminar at the Stone Creek Golf Course. Allan also stated that the Family Golf Weekend (free golf for family members), scheduled for July 9 and 10, has been changed. Due to the Classic Car Show on July 9, the free Family Golf will only be provided on Sunday, July 10. This change will also be published in the *News & Views*. Allan then discussed how the payoffs are determined on our Thursday Play. He also stated that OGA publishes a monthly bulletin that often discusses the rules of golf. Allan provided two questions involving golf rules and stated that he would post the subject bulletin on the Golf Lounge bulletin board.

Greens: Committee representative Fred Bourne stated that the golf maintenance crew would soon be repairing the cart paths and removing some of the poplar trees. Fred stated that the Golf Course Superintendent, Tim O’Larey, had committed to eventually removing all of the poplar trees on the golf course. He also stated that the members of the Greens Committee had not yet been approved by the Board. Fred then discussed the need to have yardage markers painted on the cart path, especially when carts have to remain on the path during wet weather. A member suggested that perhaps a permanent yardage marker could be installed in the cart path rather than a paint stripe. Fred will follow up on these issues with the Greens Committee and the Golf Course Superintendent.

Membership: Stan Hiller reported that bag tags for golfers who have paid their annual golf fees should be available later this week at the Pro Shop. Stan is also a Board Director in charge of Marketing and our website. Stan reported that the website will be linked with the Oregon Trail website as prepared by GM Staskiewicz. He also reported on the advertising placed with the Pamplin Group in our local *Woodburn Independent* and in the *Boomer Magazine*. His focus, as well as that of our GM, is to solicit new Golf Associates and other Associates. By adding new Associates, the annual golf and homeowner dues could remain the same or even be reduced. He has prepared a form to be placed in the Pro Shop to track our efforts in soliciting additional Associates.

General Manager’s Report: GM Staskiewicz asked if anyone had watched the “Albatross” (a 2 on a par 5 hole) scored by Jason Gore in last week’s PGA Event. He then asked if anyone knew what a score of 1 on a par 5 is called. He stated that the term for a score of 1 on a par 5 is known as a “Condor”. Tom then reiterated his marketing efforts to solicit new Associates, stating that any member who obtains a new Associate would receive a \$100 Gift Certificate, either to the Pro Shop or the Country Cottage Restaurant. This Program was recently approved by the Board, with the \$100 being taken from the initial Associate annual fee. Tom then stated that the roof on the golf cart barn should be completed today. He

is working with House Director Larry Jones to have an outbuilding constructed in our large RV Park, said structure to house golf course equipment. By placing the structure in the RV Park, we avoid the costs and requirements of the City of Woodburn as our RV Park is located in Marion County. Tom then spoke regarding the Oregon Trail Program, stating that he had recently driven to the Juniper Golf Course in Redmond to meet with Bruce, the golf pro previously in charge of the Program. Member courses in the Program will now be able to set their own parameters as to the cost to play their course. There are currently up to 27 courses in the Oregon Trail Program and new marketing ideas are continually being discussed. The Oregon Trail website will show the golf courses that are members of the Program.

OLD BUSINESS: Nothing to report.

NEW BUSINESS: Nothing to report.

CLOSING COMMENTS: Allan Lindberg suggested that perhaps the Men’s Golf Club and the Ladies Golf Club could sponsor an activity for the community in an effort to show our concern for the entire community. A discussion ensued as to erroneous opinions that many non-golfers have regarding our golf course and the cost to maintain our course. Chuck Johnson, who recently served on the Board of Directors as Treasurer, stated that during his three year tenure as Treasurer, he had received in writing comments from non-golfers who expressed concern that up to 75% of their annual homeowner dues were being spent on the golf course. Johnson stated that the issue of cost to maintain the golf course was analyzed in detail by the then GM and the Association bookkeeper in 2014 and the cost to maintain the golf course was approximately 23% of the annual homeowner dues. When you consider that resident golfers who pay the annual golf fee of \$650 as well as the \$550 annual homeowner dues, the percentage of the annual golf course maintenance for non-golfers would be less than 20% of their annual homeowner dues. It was decided that the suggestion of a joint activity sponsored by the Men’s and Ladies Golf Clubs be tabled and after discussion with the Ladies Golf Club, a decision could be made at a future Meeting. Ron Aiken commented on the Oregon Trail Program and suggested that perhaps a copy of a map could be provided that would show the location of the various golf courses that are members of the Program. GM Staskiewicz reminded that the locations are available on the website. Ron Aiken also commented that the PNGA often advertises discounted fees to play great courses within the Northwest. Larry Jones reiterated that the PNGA needs volunteers on occasion at their tournaments. Paul Eaton stated that he is working with the OGA to provide a rules seminar, probably in May when our “snowbirds” have returned. Allan Lindberg stated that many rounds of golf are played on our course by golfers who are not just those golfers paying the annual golf dues, a fact echoed by member Will Abshere. Larry Kemper encouraged golfers to run for the Board of Directors each year to ensure that we are properly represented. Larry also commented on the water saturation problem on the sixth fairway, near the seventh green. Could the excess water be removed, perhaps pumped to another location? Fred Bourne will discuss the issue with the Golf Course Superintendent. Fred Bourne then discussed the marketing motion at the recent Board Meeting involving the solicitation of new Associates. He pointed out that the Golf Chair, Director Connie Lum, and the Membership Chair, Sharon Schaub, both refused to make the motion to approve what was obviously a good marketing tool to solicit new Associates. He stated that Treasurer Allan Lindberg was the Director who made the motion to approve the solicitation program, said motion passed with only Directors Lum and Schaub opposing the motion.

Closing: President Krussow moved that our Meeting be adjourned, motion seconded, approved, and the Meeting was adjourned at 10:50 a.m.

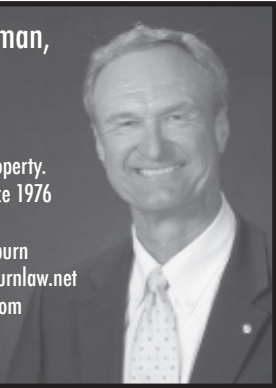
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RSVP Volunteer of the Month

From the City of Woodburn's Weekly E-Blast

"It's proven that if children learn to read by third grade they will read to learn for the rest of their lives. But if they don't, they will have reading struggles the rest of their lives," said RSVP Volunteer and Nellie Muir SMART Coordinator, John Venner. "It's book give-away day," he said with a grin as he laid out over 100 books for the kids to choose from.

SMART students are able to pick out a book to take home twice a month, building up their own reading library at home. Seeing the kids and adults with smiles on their faces while they read has kept Venner as a SMART volunteer since 2009.

SMART, which stands for "Start Making A Reader Today," is an Oregon-based nonprofit that partners with elementary schools across the state to pair youth ages K-3, with volunteers to read. Some reading pairs have the adult read to the student, and some have the student read to the adult. It just depends on the reading level of the student, but the ultimate goal is to provide a fun reading experience that encourages them to develop a love of books and reading.

In addition to volunteering with SMART & RSVP, Venner is also an active volunteer with the Red Cross. Last year he volunteered at the forest fires in California and John Day, and the flooding in Ohio. He is the type of person and volunteer that every community wants, one who jumps in with both feet to help!

SMART is in three schools in Woodburn: Nellie Muir, Lincoln, and Washington Elementary schools. At Nellie Muir, Venner is still accepting volunteers for the school year, and a particular need is for volunteers who also speak Spanish. His goal for this year was to have enough volunteers to serve 70 students in the program. He was able to recruit enough volunteers to serve 118 students so far this school year; however he could always use more volunteers!

"With more volunteers I can serve more students who may need a little extra attention with their reading," he said. Venner was also quick to point out that cash donations are also accepted by SMART, as those donations go toward the purchase of books the students take home each month.

In addition, I have an “open door” policy for our members to drop in (although I may not always be available because of meetings and such), set up an appointment or call to talk. I’m also trying to do more with articles in the *News & Views*, on Facebook and soon to be on YouTube to share information and work with our members to answer questions and be even more transparent by not speaking in the language of “meeting minutes”.

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Some February Garden Tips

Slugs and snails are out!

- Clean up leaf piles or pieces of wood now before they hatch.
- If you do not use chemicals, keep a container of water with added liquid dish soap.
- “Pick” snails early in morning and drop into container.
- I have soapstone slug traps that look like mushrooms in the yard.
- If you use beer in the traps, the containers may fill up faster, but I have had success with no added slug bait or beer.

Time to trim blue berry plants

- If you have not already done so, trim about 20 per cent off each plant each year, including dead or diseased limbs.
- Production should improve if your berries are getting smaller.
- Time to put organic oils on your plants and fruit trees.
- If you use oils on your plants or fruit trees, it is time to have that done, before they bud out.
- If too late, then read the label to see when the next best time is for your specific plant.

Tool practices

- Some of the best tools in the garden tool box are scissors, a good set of hand clippers and a good shovel that fits you.
- In addition, keep a bottle of alcohol around your garden shed or cupboard.
- If you trim something that may be diseased, spray your hand tools with the alcohol before you use them elsewhere.
- Let your tools air dry.

And those weeds!

- The weeds don’t care if it is winter. They are growing RIGHT NOW.
 - One of the worst weeds in our areas is Bittercress (aka Shot Weed) and it is out there blooming RIGHT NOW. Bittercress is that small little weed with the white flowers and ALL OF THOSE seeds that fly into the air almost 3 feet away from the plant populating a new area.
- HAVE FUN and ENJOY – flowers are blooming.

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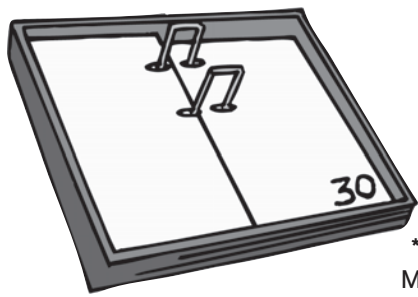

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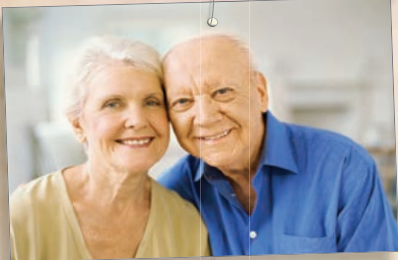
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
