

60 Years of Women's Golf (1961–2021): Part Three

In June 1962, the City of Woodburn was dealing with a cleanup of the Woodburn city jail after a grand jury recommendation, including hiring a fulltime jailer and moving the joint police and fire offices closer to the jail.

The council also reviewed several zoning changes for Woodburn Senior Estates.

Variously called the estates and senior estates, Woodburn Senior Estates third tract was not approved until the City of Woodburn resolved the enlargement of the sewage treatment plant. Sewer bonds were sold, plans were drawn, and negotiations were started for purchase of the land for the plant. Woodburn Senior Estates at \$65,000.00 and Birds Eye cannery, at \$20,000.00 were already assured as part of the enlargement process. Woodburn Senior Estates continued to be a large part of the building permits applications in Woodburn during that time. [Reference - Statesman Journal, October 3, 1962]


The Eugene Register Guard on April 14, 1962, reported that a Woodburn delegation had asked for reconstruction of the Silverton-Hillsboro highway through Woodburn. It was reported that the highway was congested by traffic to and from Woodburn Senior Estates, which had 1200 dwellings and Birdseye Food Plant, both being expanded at that time. No reply was given by the State Highway commission.

As more homes were planned, recreation was recognized as part of the community, with a report saying the golf course was scheduled to be completed

Visitors and potential buyers were invited to stay at the new Fairway Inn, then located behind what is now the men's long tee box on hole two. You could drive through the whole community and see and feel the entirely alive atmosphere and play a challenging golf course.

In December 1962, the Club House was dedicated with about 500 people attending as then Governor Mark Hatfield spoke at the podium along with Mayor Otto Halter. The MacLaren School for Boys Choir sang at the event.

Deferred Sewer Maintenance

Deferred maintenance has the potential to eat up a large portion of the equity in your home. When a problem that needs a repair is put off, it generally gets bigger and can affect nearby items making repairs even more extensive and expensive. Addressing repair issues early on saves money and equity in vour home.

Recently, my clients have experienced sewer issues: tree root intrusion, prior earth movement resulting in misaligned sewer joints, collapsed pipe, and of course the ever popular, blockage due to "Whoever stuffed it down the toilet" issue.

Sewer scopes currently cost under \$200 and are something most buyers will do when they buy a home. A tiny camera, creating a video is run down through your sewer line from the cleanout valve adjacent to your home to identify any issues in the line. If you have noticed a slowing or backing up of your drains, sometimes "snaking" doesn't resolve the issue. I recommend having a Sewer Scope done to identify and resolve the issue. In Woodburn, the Homeowner is responsible for the sewer line to somewhere around the middle of the street.

If you plant trees, research the type of trees and know where your water and sewer lines are. Some tree root systems spread out horizontally in the ground. Others are more vertical. When planting near the sewer lines trees whose roots grow vertically may have roots extending horizontally into the pipes, causing expensive repairs and removal of trees.

To quote my Grandmother (and those before her): "A stitch in time, saves nine."

The Assumed Business name for Senior Estates and Golf is Woodburn Estates & Golf and is registered in the State of Oregon and is Woodburn Estates

ADD: Oregon Business Corporation - An Oregon Business Corporation is created under Oregon law by filing articles of incorporation with the Oregon Corporation Division.

ADD: Association – An association is a group of people who share a common interest.

I move to APPROVE 2020-0630 Bylaws #Lot Owner to change all occurances of the word LOT OWNER back to PROPERTY OWNER in the document. **Motion** approved.

I move to APPROVE 2020-0728 SOP-1 #Forward, however is intended for Woodburn Estates and Golf members only. **Motion approved.**

I move to APPROVE 2020-0728 SOP-1 #1.4.2.2 Emergency Oregon State of Oregon, Oregon Health Authority and CDC guidelines will be followed and

implemented. Upon approval by the Board, the Site Manager has the expressed authority to file a complaint for those members who do not comply with pandemic imposed rules. The Board may implement fines and suspension of member(s) that refuse to follow these guidelines including suspension for (30) thirty days of all privileges associated with membership. Removal of status of a member in good standing will be enforced. **Motion approved.**

I move to APPROVE 2020-0728 SOP-1 #1.4.2.3 Member Medical Exemption a member claiming a medical exemption must provide a written documentation from their medical physician regarding COVÎD 19 mask requirements upon

request. Motion approved.

I move to APPROVE SOP-1 #2.11 Ad Hoc Committees. Ad hoc Committees are appointed by the Board for specific purposes to meet the Board's management needs for limited periods of time. Each Ad Hoc committee will expire at the end of the calendar year or when their specific purpose is finished, whichever comes first. Each Ad Hoc committee will be named to avoid confusion with other Ad Hoc Committees or regular committees which may not be described within this document. Each ad hoc committee will be chaired by a Board member reporting to the Board with their progress. Committee members will be property-owning members of the corporation. Motion tabled until next meeting.

I move to APPROVE 2020-0728 SOP-1 #1.2.6-4 Procedure for making a

Using Robert's Rules of Order the following should be followed:

- (a) The board member will be recognized by the chair or presiding officer.
- (b) The maker of the motion will be identified in the minutes.
- (c) State the Motion by saying I move to or I move that.
- (d) A second is required and does not need to be identified in the written minutes.
- (e) No Second If a motion is not readily seconded, the presiding officer should ask if there is a second.
- (f) If there is not a second, the motion is dead and a failed motion. No Discussion is allowed.
- (g) If there is a second, the presiding officer will repeat the motion, state that the motion has been moved and seconded and ask for discussion.
 - (h) Discussion.
- (i) An amendment may be added to the main motion, as follows, I make a motion to amend the motion.
 - (j) A second is required and does not need to be identified in the written minutes.
 - (k) Vote for the Amendment first and then vote for the main motion.
 - (l) Failure to pass the amendment does not change the main motion.

- (n) The presiding officer shall announce the vote and whether the motion passed or failed.
- (o) A member of the board may ask for a hand or name count if there is a question whether the motion passed. (Division of the house)
- (p) The motion and motion voting results are entered in the minutes as a permanent record.
- (q) There are other options for motions, including, but not limited to: POSTPONE INDEFINITELY (Kill a motion), QUESTION (end the debate), TABLE (lay aside for later in the meeting or at another time).

I move to APPROVE 2020-0728 SOP-1&2 #Title Change to SOP-1 to SOP for Standard Operating Procedures and SOP-2 to SSP for Standard Security Procedures to end the confusing between SOP-1 and SOP-2. **Motion approved.**

I move to POST 2020-0728-BYLAW #5.5-1(g) Emergency Oregon State of Oregon, Oregon Health Authority and CDC guidelines will be followed and implemented. Upon approval by the Board, the Site Manager has the expressed authority to file a complaint against those members who do not comply with pandemic imposed rules. The Board may implement fines and suspension of member(s) that refuse to follow these guidelines including suspension for (30) thirty days of all privileges associated with membership. Removal of status of a member in good standing will be enforced. **Motion approved.**

Less the general manager section, allowing for a document with less corrections, deductions, additions, and changes to make the document match the past motions by the Board. **Motion approved.**

I move to POST motion 2020-0728-BYLAW #7 Manager, as follows; Replace section 7 with the following definition for manager section language as approved by Vial Fotheringham in the 2015 proposed document review.

"Manager or Managing Agent" means an employee or independent contractor hired to perform such duties and services as the Board of Directors may direct or authorize. On behalf of the Association, the Board may employ or enter a contract with a manager or management agency to perform such duties and services as the Board may direct or authorize. The manager or the managing agency shall work at the pleasure of the Board. The Board shall establish the compensation of any manager or a managing agent to be paid. Motion approved.


