Controlling the Rat – A Community Effort

Rats like to live where people live. They quickly adjust to the neighborhood. Rats can thrive on just an ounce of food and water daily, so when they enter a neighborhood and gain access to meat, fish, vegetables and grains, they will stay. Rats prefer to feed in and around homes, restaurants and businesses. But they will settle for scraps from trash bags and cans, private yards and what they find at the community refuse disposal and transfer station. Rats get the shelter they need from tall weeds and grass, fences and walls, rubbish piles and abandoned appliances.

If rats are living in your neighborhood, there are steps you should take, even if they aren't in your home. Rats move freely in and out of buildings in the neighborhood, so any steps that your neighbors take to control rats will encourage them to move into a nearby building (maybe yours!). A community effort works best, where everyone in the neighborhood takes steps at the same time to prevent rats from entering the buildings and to remove their food and

Checking for Rats

The sooner you know rats have entered your home, the easier it will be to get rid of them. Here's how to check.

Listen.

- After dark, turn on the lights in a dark room or basement and listen for any scurrying sounds.
- Listen for gnawing sounds when it is quiet.

- Move stored materials and furniture to uncover any hiding places.
- Look at packaged goods, doors, windows, baseboards, and electrical cords for chewed spots, tooth marks, woodchips or shavings.
- Check for freshly dug earth near holes around foundations, walls, and embankments. Look under sidewalks, floors and platforms.
- Check for rub marks dark smears along hallways, or near pipes, beams, edges of stairs or around gnawed holes.
- Check near walls, food supplies and pathways for droppings. Fresh droppings are dark and soft; old droppings are hard, or gray and brittle. Fresh droppings are a sure sign of a current infestation.

- Dusty areas often show signs of pawprints or tailmarks. Sprinkle flour around the area and check for tracks for a few days.
- Place a small quantity of food where rats can get at it, and check daily for signs of feeding.

How Rats Get In

Once you know how rats come into a building, you can check your home for places they could use and take steps to prevent them from moving in. Rats (and mice) can enter buildings:

- through cracks or holes in walls or foundations, even holes as small as a dime;
 - by digging under house foundations if they are shallow enough;
- · through open windows, doors, sidewalk grates, or vents (check in the basement or walls for vent openings);
- · by squeezing through openings in the foundation or wall for pipes or
- through floor drains, quarter inch gaps under doors, letter drops and fan openings; and
 - from inside large packages of food or merchandise.

Keeping Rats Out

It is much easier to keep rats out than to get rid of them once they have moved in. But, taking these steps help control rats once they have come in. It's a three-step approach.

- Don't feed rats. Limit their food source by placing trash in covered metal or heavy duty plastic trash containers. The heavy duty plastic cans on wheels are resistant to rats' chewing, and so are metal cans. Fix plumbing leaks to cut off their water source. Keep the house and yard neat and clean. Remove uneaten pet foods. Don't fill up your bird feeder. Clean up food spills. Store food in ratresistant containers. Avoid storing food in basements.
- · Remove rats' shelter. Indoors, replace wooden basement floors with poured concrete. Place storage racks at a height of 18 inches above the floor. Move appliances, sinks and cabinets so they are flush against the wall or out far enough that you can clean behind them. Outdoors, restrict their shelter by ratproofing all buildings in the area and removing outside shelters like appliances, junk piles, old fences and walls. Keep the property, including alleys and yards, clean and trash-free. Pile wood and other stored items at least 18 inches above the ground and away from the walls. Clean out the area behind wooden steps, especially those leading into the house.
- Keep them out. Put in self-closing doors that open outward, and use latches or spring locks to keep doors closed. Check to see that doors and windows close tightly, and use metal screens on all windows that are kept open. Protect basement windows with a 1/2 inch wire mesh (called hardware cloth). Cover the edges of doors, windows and screens, which can be gnawed, with sheet metal or hardware cloth. Make a collar around pipe and wire openings into the house with pieces of sheet metal or tin cans. Rats cannot easily gnaw through metal. Fasten floor drains tightly to keep sewer rats from coming in.

Getting Rid of Rats

The two best ways to remove rats are traps or poison. The use of either requires caution!

Traps. Choose wooden base snap traps, and enlarge the traps by fastening a 2-inch square of cardboard to each trigger. Set out several traps at a time at least 10 if you think there are many rats. Place the traps behind boxes and against walls, so that the rats must pass over the trigger. Be sure the traps are out of the reach of children and pets! Fasten food attractive to rats, such as peanut butter, raisin bread, bacon or gumdrops, tightly on the trigger of each trap. Don't let the trap run out of bait. An advantage to traps is that they are less of a hazard to children and pets than poison.

Poison. Warfarin, chlorophaconone and Pival are all rat poisons. They work by making the rats' blood unable to clot, so the rats die of internal bleeding. Rat poisons must be fed daily for six to 10 days. Read the poison label before you begin, and be careful to follow all steps. Watch out for children and pets! Make sure the baits are clearly marked, and put them in low traffic, secure areas that might attract rats, such as under or behind boards, boxes, pipes or cans, and out of the rain and snow. Remove the baits when all signs of rats are gone. Follow what the label says about how to dispose of the leftover poison. If, after a month or two, there are still signs of rats, skip a month and start again. Stopping for a month and then starting helps keep the rats from building up resistance to the poison.

Keeping Rats Under Control

If you do have rats, it's a community problem and the entire neighborhood should work together.

Once the rat infestation is under control, the goal is to prevent them from coming back. Help yourself and your neighbors by keeping trash picked up and placed in covered, rat-resistant containers. Promptly remove or repair any shelter areas, such as fences and old appliances. Periodically check for new entry holes into neighborhood buildings, and seal them up quickly.

In 1969, Mariette Pilgrim reorganized the "Writers Group". Members

produced articles or stories about subjects of their own choosing. These were presented to the members for constructive criticism that might be helpful to the writer. Membership fluctuated between 10 to 15 writers.

January 1, 1969 Publication and Delivery of the News & Views to all

January 1, 1969 Publication and Delivery of the *News & Views* to all residents of SEGCC was the courtesy of Northwest Natural Gas Company for the second year.

January 6, 1969 Board minutes President Pete Laurs held a short discussion concerning the Annual Meeting. The Woodburn Trucking Company will move the chairs from the clubhouse to the Woodburn Armory and return them.

House chair, Joe Blazek stated that William Marpert, Richard Steen, and Dewey West had been contacted and had agreed to run as nominees, and these were the committee's recommendations.

Membership chair, Charles Addleman presented an offer from property owner, 2014 Rainier Road, to purchase the property lying between 2014 Rainier Road and the fence to the underpass. Treasurer Gus Stroh moved that the Board give permission to landscape this bit of property as she see fit, subject to cancellation of this permission on determination of need by the SEGCC golf committee – motion passed.

January 14, 1969 ANNUAL Board minutes President Pete Laurs called the meeting to order at the Woodburn Armory where there were 148 certified individual members present.

January 25, 1969 News & Views article ATTENTION reports have been received by the Board that a number of non-dues paying residents are taking advantage of recreation facilities. Only those who have paid their current dues are permitted to participate in potlucks, card games, dances, etc. Names of violators should be given to the Board of Directors.

February 4, 1969 Board minutes Planning chair, William Marpert stated that Elmer Hayes and his committee had surveyed the Trailer Storage (RV) area and that the size indicated the need for 1,500 lineal feet of six foot cyclone fence at the cost to be approximately \$5,000 dollars.

February 11, 1969 Board minutes Directors considered installation of two comfort stations on the golf course to replace the toilets which are rented and cost the club \$480 per year.

Directors are considering an operating budget for 1969 and it is expected that dues will be continued at the same rate as in 1968.

February 18, 1969 Special Board minutes a short discussion; Annie Franson was placed in nomination to fill the un-expired term of resigned Joe Blazek for the balance of 1969. It was then moved and seconded to cast a unanimous ballot for Annie Franson – motion passed.

Considerable discussion evolved over the presentation of an addition to the Bylaws by attorney Pruess, to be known as Bylaws Article XV. Vice President, William Marpert moved to adopt this addition to the Bylaws in its entirety – motion passed.

Bylaws article XV section 1: ORDER OF BUSINESS at either membership or directors' meetings, the order of business shall be as follows: (a) Proof of notice of the meeting; (b) Determination of quorum; (c) Reading of minutes of previous meeting; approval or correction; (d) Treasurer's report, acceptance or rejection; (e) Report of officers and committees, general and special; (f) Unfinished business; (g) New or Special business; and (h) Matter of adjournment.

Section 2: NOTICE OF NEW BUSINESS – any and all new business requested by members to be considered by the members of this Corporation at any regular, special, or adjourned meeting, shall first be stated in writing, in meaningful and concise language, and signed, and shall be in the office of this Corporation for use, notice and publication, thirty (30) days prior to the date of such meeting. This requested business matter shall then be placed upon the agenda for consideration.

Section 3: The agenda of business to be transacted at a membership meeting, shall be posted in the Clubhouse of the SEGCC thirty (30) days prior to the meeting.

Section 4: The latest edition of Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the conduct of all meetings; when not inconsistent with the Bylaws of This Corporation.

Activities chair, Pete Laurs reported that 22 men from the Men's Chorus dressed for the street, hats and all left for the Salem First Methodist Church for Lincoln's birthday to perform. Mrs. Moran, the clubs' accompanist from the SEGCC along with leader Rev. Leonard Leikauf.

February 25, 1969 Board minutes President Clarence Smith announced the appointment of members to a committee for the study and possible revision and up-dating of the Bylaws.

March 4, 1969 Board minutes President Clarence Smith announced the selection of a committee to study the corporation Bylaws and recommend changes to the directors. Rules chair, Dewey West will work in conjunction with this committee.

Treasurer Gus Stroh reported on dues charges for the first quarter of 1969, showing there are 397 golf-paying members and 512 recreation-paying members, making a total of 909 persons. Associate golfers total 28 and associate recreation total 23, with four business firms listed.

Membership chair, Charles Addleman stated that a good start has been made in checking all **membership cards** at social functions and meetings.

March 26, 1969 Board minutes Secretary Max Dunham read a letter from the Men's Golf Club turning over to SEGCC several items this group purchased for everyone's use: TV, 24-folding chairs and a clock.

April 1, 1969 Board minutes Treasurer Gus Stroh reported that the Finance Committee had read and tentatively approved the 1969 Operating Budget. There is no need for a change in the dues structure and they will be continued as established in 1968.

Attorney Clarence "Doc" Pruess reported making application for **tax exempt status** for the SEGCC. To bring this about, we must maintain our non-profit status, and conform to all aims and objects of a Fraternal and Benevolent Organization. The request is now in the hands of the District Attorney for an opinion. This could save the SEGCC over \$7,000 in taxes on Real and Personal Property.

Treasurer Gus Stroh moved that on April 1, 1969 that the SEGCC 18-hole golf course is now <u>closed</u> to the general public and to non-members of the SEGCC. The exception to this rule are (1) guest of members shall be permitted to play when accompanied or vouched for by a member in good standing upon payment of the prescribed fee; and (2) regular "recreation" members not paying for the golfing privilege, will be permitted to play golf upon paying the prescribed fee.

Treasurer Gus Stroh moved that 10% of the 1969 dues assessment be considered for the Capital Investment Fund – motion passed.

April 8, 1969 Board minutes Rules chair, Dewey West moved all associate memberships will be available for golf only with the exception of Senior Estates Mobil Home Park renters, Fairway Apartment renters and those renters with the SEGCC – motion passed.

Planning chair, William Marpert moved to authorize Membership chair, Charles Addleman to solicit business firms as associate golf members – motion passed.

April 11 1969 Board minutes President Clarence Smith appounced that all

April 11, 1969 Board minutes President Clarence Smith announced that all members must show their membership cards for all activities.

House chair, Floyd Good moved that the rate for green fees be raised from \$1.50 to \$2.00 for nine holes; also regular "recreation" members, not paying regular golf dues will be permitted to play golf upon payment of the \$2.00 green fees or \$4 for 18-hole – motion passed.

Also reported was the Men's Golf Club, headed up by Fred Comer to collect funds to purchase a First Aid Car for the Woodburn Fire Department, and collected \$1.668.

April 22, 1969 Board minutes Treasurer Gus Stroh stated that the new Phone Directory was now available at 50 cents each.

April 26, 1969 News & Views article SENIOR CITIZENS MONTH -President Richard Nixon has issued the following proclamation designating the Month of May 1969 as Senior Citizens Month. There are today 20 million Americans who are 65 years of age or older.

The older Americans in our midst have been pioneers and builders during a period of dramatic change and severe testing. They remind us of the moral values and personal qualities which have been the basis of our national achievements. Having learned to live with change and challenge, they offer us, now and for the future a valuable resource of skill and of wisdom. We are grateful for scientific advances which have given us the longest life expectancy in the history of the world. But we must also be concerned with the quality of that longer life span.

It is therefore fitting that each year we designate one month in honor of older Americans. This is a special time to express our appreciation to older citizens for their services to the Nation, to recognize their potential for further contribution, and to consider whether we are doing all we can to assure their full participation in the adventures of our time and in the affluence of our society. Now, Therefore, I, Richard Nixon, President of the United States of America, do hereby designate the month of May 1969 as Senior Citizens Month...

I especially invite the older citizens of this Nation to use this month as a time for reexamining the social role which they are playing and the condition under which they live. And I ask them to share their conclusions and recommendations with their countrymen.

April 29, 1969 Board minutes Recreation Committee, Ann Pape presented a flyer showing chrome clothes rack with hat shelf for \$79, suitable for the Blue Room. Large folding tables, 30 x 72" are offered by Walters Mfg. Company for \$20.25 plus transportation. Max Dunham moved to buy 12-tables at once motion passed.

May 6, 1969 Board minutes House chair, Floyd Good recommended the acceptance of D & D Paving Company of Salem, bid of \$5,480 for surfacing the area south of the golf clubhouse plus \$710 for 2000 square feet of surfacing north of the clubhouse and repair of street, proper curbing and entrance – motion passed.

Attorney Clarence "Doc" Pruess for SEGCC was concerned with non-dues paying members need a better understanding why each delinquent member should pay the \$23.35 basic dues. Many do not know that since January, 1968, we have been "on our own" and must look to all members to pay their dues in order to keep going - to keep this "The Happy Place" - to keep your property and surroundings attractive, more valuable and easier to sell if you want to sell. The members now own all the assets and each member has pro rata ownership.

May 21, 1969 Board minutes President Clarence Smith called on Merle Lietzke to present the new Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws as presently recommended by the committee plus several suggestions not contained in either instruments. These suggestions are as follows: (1) that the Board starts a complete publicity campaign to notify all club members of the changes being contemplated, and the reconstruction thereof. (2) That the Board study the possibility of changing the date of the Annual Meeting to a more convenient date weather wise (this could result in a larger attendance). (3) That the Board draw-up its next year's budget to be submitted at the Annual Meeting which shall be binding.

May 27, 1969 Board minutes House chair, Floyd Good reported that surplus dirt will be removed from the south area for the new parking lot addition. He suggested using this surplus dirt to build **raised tees** for several fairways. Floyd moved to approve the use of this dirt where wanted on the various tees – motion passed.

June 3, 1969 Board minutes Vice President William Marpert moved that a committee be appointed to study and record all aspects of the benevolent, charitable, and fraternal facets of our entire community in connection with the tax exempt status of the club as suggest by attorney "Doc" Pruess - motion passed.

June 10, 1969 Board minutes President Clarence Smith stated this was the first meeting between the Board and rules committee for the reading of and step by step analyst of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws.

July 15, 1969 Board minutes President Clarence Smith announced that that the News & Views has published in full the Restated Articles of Incorporation and the Bylaws that will be voted on September 24, 1969. Residents of the SEGCC who have questions concerning the proposed revision will be given an opportunity to submit the inquiries in writing.

July 29, 1969 Board minutes President Clarence Smith announced that the Board awarded a contract to Woodburn Construction Company, operated by Jake Triplett, for construction of two restrooms (toilets) on the golf course, one on each nine for a total of \$5,436.

The Board voted to reverse the two golf nines, the present #1 to be #10 and the present short #10 par-3 to be #1. Date for the change was not announced.

September 13, 1969 News & Views article Death takes Leo C. Rush, 67, who built the first home in Senior Estates in July, 1960, and was vice president of Senior Estates Inc. died September 9, 1969 in a Portland hospital following heart surgery.

A resident of Oregon for more than 40 years, Rush was president of Leo C. Rush Inc., general contractors. He was in the construction business for nearly 25 years, during which time he built over 6,500 homes.

Leo Rush was a former director of the SEGCC, former SEGCC chairman, and a member of the North Marion Development Corporation Board of Directors, Woodburn Chamber of Commerce, Woodburn Rotary Club and the Lions Club.

September 24, 1969 Special Election to be held at the Woodburn High School to vote on the Restated Articles of Incorporation and the Amended Bylaws of SEGCC is of importance to every property owner. A committee of long-time residents along with the Board's attorney, Clarence "Doc" Pruess, has worked diligently since last February to produce these two instruments to be voted on. The Board of Directors feels they are excellent, adequate in every section, and deserve your "yes" vote or your proxy.

Why do we need the new Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws?

The present Articles were for promotion and sale of property. The new Articles and Bylaws were revised and amended for benefit and protection of all home owners and to delete the right of owners to vote vacant lots. The entire instruments were printed in the News & Views for all members to read.

September 27, 1969 News & Views article Proposals got okay by a 3 to 1 at a special election meeting. Articles of Incorporation – yes 911 and no 280; Bylaws - yes 893 and no 273.

October 11, 1969 News & Views article Senior Estates, Inc. pays city \$6,307. City Attorney Wallace Gutzler took the Woodburn city council by surprise September 30, when he came forth and presented Mayor Burlingham with a check of \$6,306.72 from Senior Estates, Inc.

This represented Senior Estates share of the cost of increasing the capacity of the Woodburn sewage plant and settled a controversy of several years standing with George Brice Jr., Senior Estates promoter. The payment was made by Brice's attorney, J.J. Higgins, Portland who has been working with Gutzler for several months in bringing about a settlement.

October 25, 1969 News & Views article Senior Estates, Inc. Brice gives deed intent on RV property. Deeds to the five-acre tract of land, north of SEGCC now used for trailer storage, and all personal property will be given to SEGCC upon the completion of sale of all property in sections 7 and 7A.

November 8, 1969 News & Views article Honor voted for Leo Rush by Directors. In honor of the late Leo C. Rush, vice president of Senior Estates Inc., and former member of the Management Council and director of SEGCC, the Board of Directors has voted to name the recreation hall in the clubhouse the **Leo** Rush Hall and to place a plaque over the fire place in the lounge area.

November 22 1969 News & Views article the printing and distribution of our newspaper will no longer be subsidized by NW Natural Gas Company and the Board has been notified. The gas company has financed the publication for the past two years. Arrangements were made by the late Leo Rush and vice president Charles Holloway Jr. of NW gas. Publication of the News & Views newspaper on the present basis entails an expenditure of some \$2,700 per year.

December 13, 1969 News & Views article Four Directors to be named as Floyd Good resigns due to his commercial activities. Seven candidates are in the race for four positions on the SEGCC Board and the election will be held in the Arts and Crafts room on January 14, 1970.



The Woodburn Fire District welcomes four new members into the student resident volunteer program. Abigail Frey, Nolan Moore, Jared Redmon, and Noah Wierstra join the program as they work towards completing their fire science and paramedic degree programs through Chemeketa Community College. The new students join current student volunteers Troy Jordan, Zack Richardson and Brock Rogers.

The student program is partially funded by a four-year federal grant that was awarded to the fire district in 2018. The grant provides tuition assistance, personal protective gear and uniform items for volunteer firefighters. The program goal is to support students and volunteers as they gain training certifications and real-life work experience in the response to fires, motor vehicle accidents and emergency medical incidents under the supervision of career firefighters and experienced volunteers. This helps the students in achieving their goal of becoming career firefighters while providing a valuable service to the community. Students typically spend two or three years in the student resident program.

Student residents are required to be enrolled full-time in a fire service degree or paramedic training program. In addition, students must meet physical fitness requirements and attain certifications that allow them to enter burning structures, treat patients experiencing medical emergencies and operate the district's fire response vehicle and equipment. Housing for the group is provided at Station 22 on James Street in Woodburn and Station 24 on River Road in the Waconda area. The students are responsible for cleaning and maintaining their home station and the emergency response fire vehicles and equipment housed at those locations. The students are provided additional experience by riding along and being mentored by Woodburn career firefighters that respond from the main station on Newberg Highway.

Fire Chief Budge: "The Woodburn Fire District has a long tradition of mentoring students enroute to careers in the fire service. The students help meet the fire district's mission to the community by assisting other volunteers in the response to overlapping emergency calls and public service duties. During the September wildfires, the students helped in covering the high volume of indistrict emergency calls and participated in the assistance provided to other fire districts in the region that were impacted by the fires. Student programs play an important role in training and preparing the next generation of professional firefighters."




