## Once Again... Time to Select a **General Manager**

There is a famous quote attributed to Albert Einstein: The definition of insanity is doing the same thing. insanity is doing the same thing over and over and expecting different results. As the need to search for a new General Manager once again presents itself, it is time to switch it up a bit.

The first change is the creation of a Screening Committee that is diversified and represents the three groups that are in our community. It will be comprised of a cross section of board members, community members, and some representation of WEG Staff. The exact number of each remains to be decided but the goal is to allow input from each group. This Ad-Hoc committee will be responsible for the initial screening of applications, the scoring, interviewing, and vetting of applicants. They will present the final candidates to the BOD who will then do another round of scoring, interviewing, and vetting before making the final choice.

The second change is to use a candidate scorecard system. What does that mean? Here is a brief explanation:

Candidate scorecards are standardized evaluations used to assess and compare multiple candidates on an established rating system. Scorecards are utilized to first sort the applications, and then during an interview, to ensure the conversation is guided and evaluated by previously agreed-upon criteria. Those who are screening the applications and then the candidates, do so individually and not biased by others' opinions. Afterwards, there can be comparison and discussion. Those with the highest scores are then moved to the next step of the

It is a process, but it does help keep it on track. There will be training for the Screening Committee so that everyone understands and is on the same page.

To practice and streamline this system, members chosen to sit on the Screening Committee will be selected by this process. Anyone is invited to fill out a Screening Committee application. The Screening Committee application is purposely designed to be thought-provoking and to show understanding and experience in how to rate and score applicants.

Screening Committee applications can be requested at the Front Office.

## Out-of-This-World Telescope

A quick look at the out-of-this-world James Webb Telescope

Move over Hubble -- a bigger, more advanced and arguably better telescope has entered the galaxy. Launched on Christmas Day, the James Webb Telescope is now NASA's most powerful telescope and will allow scientists to dig deep into the universe's past. Using images captured with the James Webb Telescope, scientists hope to catch a glimpse of the earliest moments of our universe and to study early planetary system formation, among other things.

So how can a telescope give us a peek into events that occurred a long, long time ago, in a galaxy far, far away? The universe is a vast place and it can take a long time for light to travel from one place to another. The sun's light, for example, takes over eight minutes to reach us.

The closest galaxy to our own, the Andromeda Galaxy, is approximately 2.5 million light-years away. That means when we capture life from the Andromeda Galaxy, the light itself has been traveling for roughly 2.5 million years to reach us. Thus, using powerful telescopes, astronomers can collect this ancient light and take a peek into the past.

The more powerful the telescope, the further it can see into the past. The Hubble telescope can collect light from roughly 400 million years after when scientists estimate the Big Bang occurred. The James Webb is expected to look back to just 250 million years after the Big Bang.

It took nearly a month for the James Webb Telescope to get to its Lagrange point, which is where the telescope can permanently rest in a stable orbit. The James Webb ultimately cost roughly \$10 billion -- a bargain price to help humanity unlock some of the mysteries of the universe.

## It's Starting to Feel Like Bingo!

We played our last carefree games of Bingo in March of 2020. Yes, that long ago!! We are ready to start up again and it looks like that will be on Wednesday, April 6th. There's lots to do to get ready including equipment checkout and refresher training of team members.

We want to be very careful about safety and the well-being of our players, so there will be some (temporary) restrictions in place relating to COVID.

RULES: All regular rules as posted in July 2019 will be in place.

In addition, the following restrictions will apply.

- Only members of WEG may attend. No guests until further notice.
- All players must be fully vaccinated and "boosted" and show proof. Remember to bring your vaccine card with you. You will only need to show this the first time that you play as we will be keeping the register to ease record-keeping in subsequent weeks. (Unvaccinated members will be invited to join us when it is no longer an issue.)
- Masks will be optional a personal choice based on your assessment of your health needs. Masks will be available if needed.
- Distancing will not be required. At WEG, Bingo is a social activity and creating a non-social setting doesn't fit well with our objectives.
- No coffee or other shared refreshments will be provided until later. You may bring your own non-alcoholic beverage and any prepackaged personal snacks not to be shared. The kitchen will remain closed and off-limits until further notice
- These restrictions are for our mutual protection because we are a large group, sitting in close proximity for a prolonged period of time. These restrictions will be modified as the threat is lessened.
- Tables and chairs will be set up as usual and sanitized. Cards will be rotated on a weekly basis to allow for recommended "aging". Hand sanitizer will be available in various locations.

Please enter through the Main (Office) entrance to the Dining Hall. The auditorium door and other access doors will be locked for entry.

The new sign-in procedure may take more time at the beginning, so doors will be open a bit earlier – at 5:45 p.m. But plan to arrive no later than 6:30 p.m. Bingo will begin promptly at 7 p.m.

As noted on the "Regular Rules", all costs will remain the same.

Your full volunteer team will be vaccinated and on duty as helpers and monitors.

#### The Estates Rules for Bingo (rev: 7-10-19 GENERAL):

We welcome ESTATES members and their guests who are at least 18 years of age. No one under 18 will be admitted.

No alcohol can be brought into or consumed on the premises during bingo. Players must sign in with name(s) and member # when paying.

All monies received will be paid out to winners during the session, with the exception of the unpaid Hot# pot, which accrues at \$5 each week.

General seating is first come-first served. One additional seat may be saved. **BINGO:** 

Select bingo cards: 3 cards for \$5; 4 cards for \$7; 6 cards for \$10.

Regular bingo is won 7 different ways: horizontal, vertical, diagonal, postage stamp, four corners, inside corners and small cross.

Good Neighbor patterns are selected by the caller and the winner's neighbors will each be paid \$5 unless there are multiple winners.

Multiple winners will be paid equal shares of the prescribed pots.

The caller & cashier determine the method of payout of monies leftover after the last game - a Regular bingo on the way up to the blackout or designate it to the coffee fund.

"BINGO" must be called by the player on the winning number (last # called). Once the next number is being called, previous bingos are invalid. Raise your hand and call out loud enough to be heard to assure your win.

The Hot # is the first number called. Anyone winning a bingo on the Hot # will receive the designated game payout plus the Hot # pot.

Hot # pot is started with \$5 and \$5 is added each week until it is won. Then the pot is started again with \$5 the next week.

Once the Hot # has been called there will be no exchange of cards.

The final game is a blackout with a \$50 pot.

MISCELLANEOUS: Players' birthdays during each week will be recognized and paid \$1.

Anniversaries will be recognized and applauded.

New players will be recognized and welcomed.



## An Invitation: First The Traveling News & Views

Here we are at Badwater Basin, 282 feet below sea level. We had a great vacation in Death Valley with OregonWest Excursions that did all the planning for 34 vacationers. This is springtime in Death Valley as the temperature stayed in the high 80s. We visited White Gold, home of the Borax 20 Mule Team site with wagons and water tank, Devil's Golf Course, Salt Flats, Furnace Creek, Ubehebe Crater about 550 feet deep created by steam, and various other Death Valley viewpoints.

In July 2021, the low temperature was 115 and the high Guinness record was 134 degrees. The sand is not like ours but like a granular powder. We stayed at the Furnace Creek Resort in Death Valley, CA all week. They offer dining, gift shop, bicycling, horseback riding, golf, and a museum. The swimming pool is naturally heated from a hot spring and the cool water is recycled on the grass, plants, and golf course. Gas and diesel prices were \$7.29 a gallon. Las Vegas' gas price was \$5.55 a gallon. If you do this trip on your own, be sure to have a very good spare tire.

## Lamp Repair 101:

Old lamps are easy to find – junk shops, flea markets, antique stores, and yard sales are full of them. Some might be hideous, but others might look great in your living room – as long as you do something about those exposed wires.

Fortunately, cleaning up and rewiring old lamps is a straightforward task. You will need pliers, a screwdriver, a wire cutter, and a lamp rewiring kit that contains a socket, cord, and plug.

- 1. Make sure the lamp is not plugged in, then use the screwdriver to press the sleeve of the socket out (the part where the bulb screws in). If the socket is labeled with "press here," press your thumb against the inscription and lift the sleeve off.
- 2. Pull the socket up and snip the old wires with the wire cutter, then flip the lamp over and unscrew the nut on the bottom of the base. Pull the thread up and remove the old socket, then pull the cord out of the bottom of the lamp.
- 3. Feed the new cord from the lamp kit through the hole in the bottom of the lamp until it comes out at the top, then attach the new socket.
- 4. Split the top two inches of the wires by cutting along the groove with the wire cutters and removing approximately one-half inch of insulation from each wire. Tie the split cords using an underwriter's knot – the lamp kit should have illustrated
- 5. With the screwdriver, loosen the screws on each side of the new socket brass for hot, silver for neutral. Check your lamp kit instructions to determine which wire is hot, then wrap the exposed hot wire around the brass screw. Wrap the other wire around the silver screw, then tighten the screws again to secure the
  - 6. Snap the sleeve back onto the socket and plug the lamp in to test.

## Steps for a Healthy Fruit Tree

Looking at planting an orchard or maybe just one or two fruit trees? Sometimes planting and taking care of fruit trees can feel daunting, but once they get established, it is easy to get into a care routine. The trick to being successful is starting them off right. Here are some simple steps to starting your fruit tree off right.

#### 1. Dig the planting hole twice as wide as the root system.

Make sure the spot you choose is in a nice sunny spot because they need full sun. Dig the hole twice as wide as the root system and as deep as the root system. In the Pacific Northwest, we can get some layers of hard pan or clay, so be sure to break that up so that drainage is not a problem.

#### 2. Mix in compost, native soil, and transplant fertilizer.

You want to mix in 50% compost and 50% native soil (the dirt you dug out to get the hole). You will also want to use Al's Transplant Fertilizer which has Mycorrhiza. This will help kick start the tree's growing process. Mycorrhiza works with the plant's roots and soil to make the plant more efficient in picking up water and other nutrients in the soil. Refer to the label for how much fertilizer to use and place the fertilizer in the hole around the roots. It is important that you place fertilizer around the root system. These nutrients are available for the root system of the new tree. Incorporating them at the time of planting makes them more quickly available to the tree.

#### 3. Do not cover the bud union.

The bud union is where the root stock and fruiting section of the tree have been grafted together. This happens because some root systems are stronger and survive better when they are grafted onto those stronger root systems. You want the bud union to face northeast, which is away from the direction of the hot afternoon sun. That way it does not get sunburned. When refilling the hole, fill it without compacting the soil and drench the soil several times allowing it to settle. This eliminates any air pockets that might pop up. Add 2"-3" of mulch around the tree but do not to cover the bud union with dirt or mulch; you want that to stay above ground.

#### 4. Add an irrigation system.

It is important that a growing tree establishes its roots. The best way to do this is to water consistently ensuring the water soaks all the way down and saturates the roots. Installing a soaker hose can assist with this step.

#### 5. Support your tree with stakes.

Lastly, you will want to support your tree with stakes. The best way to do this is with two sturdy stakes. Since your tree is new and does not have an established root system, support needs to be established above ground. To secure your tree to the stakes, counterbalance but do not tie it too tightly. We suggest a chain tie. You will need two pieces of the same length. Loop the one tie to include the tree and one stake and then the other tie goes around the tree and the other stake. Make it look like a Venn diagram with the tree in



the middle! Provide a little bit of wiggle room so it is not too tight for growth. Give the roots a minimum of a year to establish and then you can remove the stakes.

After hearing of the infrastructure money passed by Congress to be given to each state, an ad hoc committee was formed to attempt to procure some of that money to build a sound wall along I-5 in Woodburn Estates.

Several WEG members submitted letters and spoke at the first open forum.

The committee met several times and asked the City of Woodburn to submit a letter on our behalf which they did. Our Board of Directors also submitted letter.

At the second open forum, there were many speakers, all of whom had official designations – ie: mayors, Chamber of Commerce presidents, etc. The committee decided to ask someone in the city government to speak on our behalf. We received an affirmative answer from the city and the head of the Planning Commission was supposed to speak at the last open forum.

Unfortunately, that never happened.

ODOT will be announcing its decision about the funding later in March. If we do not receive any funding, the committee will then meet to discuss other funding options, including grants and fundraising efforts.

#### **Expenses**

February was under budget by \$11K.

At this point in the year, we will continue monitoring. After 4 to 6 months, we should be able to make year-end projections.

Reviewed Reserve Fund

Current balance \$1,009,689

Expenses in February were \$54,202. (Electrical Project)

Income was \$28,558

Pool Spa project analysis still in process. We will have to re-budget Reserve Fund when costs come in.

Electrical Project costs were \$75,800

There are 44 homes either sold, in process of sale, or for sale. On average that would net us \$180,000 in Capital Fees.

**Operating Budget\_** *Are our 2022 Revenues on target?* Too early to tell. More members are taking advantage of bi-annual payments, which is fine. We are still waiting on some members to make payments.

Ancillary Incomes (Golf fees, storage fees, room rents, publishing income)—Tracking a little slow, but it may be seasonal and Covid restrictions aren't helping. By June we should have a good idea how these funds are performing. How does revenue performance affect us? If we do not achieve close to budget on revenues, we will have to cut expenses, if possible, or borrow from our reserves which affect HOA dues next year.

Are expenses on budget? We are tracking good. We are a little high but that is due to we have paid the balance of this year's property taxes and that will balance out over the year.

At this point we are monitoring operating budget; it will be June before we can make forecasts for the year end

#### **Reserve Budget-**

How do we pay for pool/spa repairs? \$1,009,000 balance, of which about \$700,000 is available for pool/spa repairs. We are waiting for final pool and spa repair costs to re-budget Reserve Fund for this year. We have spent \$110,000 in electrical repairs and fire system repairs so far this year.




#### Summary of House Committee Report from BOD Meeting: 03-22-22 Director Dennis Griffiths

- Extremely serious structural issues around the Pool and Spa structures issues from the foundation to the roofs many of which raise the question of the physical safety of our members. While the costs and the time involved in addressing these issues are significant safety comes first.
- Vincent Cantwell, our Maintenance Manager, brought us up to date on diagnostic progress on several issues he also provided us with 10 diagrams, 3 of which are printed herein. Referring to the righthand portion of diagram #1, it is obvious that the failed wall and overhead beam must be repaired/replaced/reinforced as soon as possible. It is an old cliché, but you build from the ground up. The roof on roof on roof must then be addressed to make the structures sound and not have the new construction of foundation, walls, beams fail again.
- Committee will ask the Board to approve abandonment of the existing spa to stop spending time and resources searching for the various origins of various failures. The construction is old, with old materials and with an unknown number of failures that have yet to be located.
- Committee recommends asking to consider moving the Spa to the Pool area and combine it with a new pool-in-pool structure see diagrams #2 and #3. This new pool-in-pool will be far less expensive than abandoning the current pool (which has numerous serious issues of its own) to build a new pool facility. The new pool will have up to date plumbing with modern materials with much longer lives and will be installed with proper engineering and up to date craftmanship.
- A temporary ready-built spa that can be brought into the pool area will also be part of this program so that members who enjoy the use of the spa will not have to wait for the entire project to be completed to have use of a spa. The scheduling of this construction is yet to be determined.
- *Recent discovery* a place where round ducting met square ducting. Instead of using an adapting piece at that point, whoever did that construction just jury-rigged it with duct tape. The duct tape got old and failed. Warm air from the HVAC system was pumping into the attic. It is now going to be fixed properly.




