# All About Pickleball

In 1965, three dads on Bainbridge Island, Washington, were tired of hearing their kids complain of being bored – this was WAY before handheld games, much less tablets, home computers, video games, etc. So, they devised a game that was a smash-up of tennis, badminton, and ping pong that became pickleball.

Why the name, pickleball? No one, not even the creators (who have since gone to the court in heaven) could remember why. There are a couple of ideas – like calling it after a pickle boat in rowing or after a dog of one of the dads – but there's no official explanation.

The "Pickleball Capital of the World" is Naples, Florida, where just one center has 60 courts! There's a rap video called "The Pickleball Song," and many celebrities have joined the sport and advocate for it. By recent estimations, over 4.8 million people play on over 9,254 pickleball courts in parks, community centers, and sports complexes across the U.S. There are now special Pickleball products and clothing, even shoes that say "Pickleball Grandpa"!

Four 20x44 foot courts can fit into a regulation-sized tennis court. It's easy to play so people of all ages and athleticism can play. It even has its own vocabulary! For example, Flapjack - the word for a ball to bounce before being able to be hit on a serve. Dillball - an incoming ball that has bounced and can be hit. The Kitchen - a 7-foot zone on either side of the net where you're forbidden to hit the ball unless it's bounced first. Dink Shot - a shot in which the ball is plinked from your kitchen into your opponent's kitchen. Opa - after two bounce hits, you can shout "OPA" to signify that balls can now be hit in the air (and here I thought you said "Opa" when you're dancing and drinking at a Greek restaurant). Pickled - if you don't score any points in a game.

There will be four new courts at Legion Park when the remodeling is complete. Here at WEG, members can play in the dining room and auditorium. Check the N&V calendar.




# Lifetime Golf



# Out & About

Update on the Senior Estates Park: the City Parks and Recreation Committee voted to fence the area at the southernmost part of the park, however, the three residents adjacent to that area protested that people would trespass onto their properties to avoid the fenced area so the committee will revisit their decision. It will be in the general area of where the unfenced area is now. The new water fountain, as previously reported, has been purchased and is awaiting installation. In addition, the city is moving a gazebo from another park and installing it in our park! It will be available to reserve from the city for special occasions.

The Woodburn City Council had approved the annexation of almost 40 acres on the east side of Boones Ferry Road north of Hazelnut Dr., for an 87-house subdivision. It will be known as Marion Point.

In a marathon City Council meeting, multiple people spoke about the proposed gas station/convenience store on the corner of 214 and Oregon Way. The Planning Committee had conditionally approved the project's Option 1, but ODOT had not given their go-ahead, so the developer asked to get approval for an Option 2 which the Planning Committee had not approved. Meanwhile, there was an appeal against the Committee's decision filed by the owners of two competing gas stations. After hearing from the attorney for the appeal, the developer's spokespersons, and residents affected by the project, the Council voted to reject the Planning Committee's recommendation to approve the project. Since the land is zoned commercial and there must be legal reasons to deny the development (not just that we don't want or need a gas station or it would be unattractive to look at or have a gas odor), the developers can appeal this decision and/or file a lawsuit.

At the end of Evergreen Road going north, there was a mobile home dealership that had been vacant for several years. There is now what appears to be a used car, used RV, and utility trailer dealer. It encompasses even more space than the previous dealer. Also, in the strip center adjacent, there is a driving school, open

# **WFD Media Release**

On 7-18-22 at 1:01 am, Woodburn firefighters responded to a residential structure fire on Tomlin Avenue in Woodburn. The fire was started by the spontaneous ignition of rags that were used to clean up oil-based stain. None one was injured in the fire that caused extensive damage to the home.

WFD E-21 arrived to find a one-story ranch style residence with heavy fire showing on the west side of the house and heavy smoke issuing from all of the roof eves from the attic vents. The fire started on the exterior and grew rapidly in a pile of debris that was stored against the outside wall of the home. The fire extended into the house through a large bedroom window that failed due to fire impingement within one minute of the fire ignition. The first arriving fire crews did a quick knock-down of the exterior fire and then made entry into the house and extinguished the fire in the bedroom that was adjacent to the exterior fire. Following a thorough search of the structure for trapped occupants, firefighters worked to pull down the ceiling drywall to expose and extinguish the fire that had fully involved the entire attic space.

Fire investigators determined that a trash bag filled with rags used to clean up an oil-based finish had spontaneously ignited. The homeowner's security cameras provided video evidence of the fire ignition and investigators found the remains of the rags used to clean-up the oil-based stain.

A family of four, that was sleeping when the fire started, escaped before firefighters arrived. Firefighters had zero visibility and high heat upon entry into the structure. The fire heavily damaged the west exterior of the home, the attic and roof structure and one bedroom. Heavy smoke conditions throughout the home and the need for ceiling removal and water application in the attic damaged the contents in all rooms of the residence. The intensity of the fire blistered paint and melted the vinyl windows of a neighboring home.

The Woodburn Fire District would like to remind homeowners to use caution when working with oil-based stains and finishes. Spontaneous combustion of oily rags occurs when a rag or cloth used in the product application or clean-up is slowly heated to its ignition point through oxidation that releases heat. If the heat has no way to escape, like in a pile or sealed garbage bag, the temperature will rise to a level high enough to ignite the oil and the rag or cloth. All rags used to apply and clean-up oil-based finishes must be stored outside in a metal container or laid out in the open on a noncombustible surface until fully dry before disposing.

Homeowners should also avoid the storage of combustible materials against the exterior of their home. An exterior fire will quickly break windows and extend into the living spaces of the home and into the attic through ventilation openings.

Fred Meyer, eat your heart out! When I want to go further afield, I can use community transportation, and Scott, our driver, is a hoot.

As if all of this was not enough to change my negative feelings into positive ones, I have a wellness program tailored to me, and I am not just talking about physical exercise. I can improve my memory with brain activities and get advice on diet to help with arthritis pain and heart health. # 60 Years of Women's Golf (1961–2021): Part Twenty-One

1994

The association was filling up. One of the last remaining sections was being built out in what some call the "flower section," being the north section off Umpqua.

1994 was the first year that the women's club members were separated into groups. There were 25 Social Members listed; The Nine Hole women numbered 85; Eighteen- Hole women numbered 125 making the total membership 235.

Clothing had changed with the women wearing clothes much like today, more pants and casual.

On May 19th, The Restated Constitution and Bylaws for the Women's Club were adopted at the regular business meeting.

The Rose-A-Rama was played on June 18 after each group took a photo with a life-sized golfing lady in the Rose Arch. Volunteers decorated each hole.

Visitations with Senior Estates and other clubs continued during the year. Sponsors for events included Woodburn Landscaping, Hubbard Chevrolet, US Bank-Fairway Plaza Businesses, Caldwell Banker, Russ Baglien and Associates, McCurdy Travel, Trachsel Buick, and McCully Realty.

Jim White, then our golf professional, gave out the winning names at dinner following each tournament.

The December 21 meeting and Christmas luncheon honored the outgoing President and welcomed the 1995 Women's Club president, Kathy Baldwin. Past Presidents were introduced and thanked for their past leadership. Randy Warren was elected as the 1995 Men's Club president.

#### 1995

January through March, and October through December luncheons were held in the auditorium. Play Day was no longer the meeting day. The tee-off times were changed to accommodate the weather in each given month.

The club included 25 Social Members, 76 Nine Hole members, and 117 Eighteen-hole members: a total of 218 members.

The game play in both 1995 and 1996 and the sponsors, were almost identical to 1993 and 1994, but Dundee was added as an invitational. Dues were increased to \$21.00 for 1996 and the Snowbirds were asked to pay their dues before leaving for the winter months.

On December 12, 1995, a storm created extensive damage and took several trees down on Hole two. The Statesman Journal reported the next day that winds over one hundred miles per hour hit coastal cities causing extensive damage. Portland General Electric estimated that 175,000-200,000 people were without power in the Willamette Valley and western Oregon. The Silverton and Woodburn areas were estimated at 20,000.

# 1996

The presidents for 1996 were Jackie Miller and Elsie Speckels.

Tim O'Larey started work at Senior Estates & Golf, the first of 25 years on October 7, 1996. Tim retired in 2021. THANK YOU, TIM!

The golf lounge was attached to the Pro shop and dedicated. The main lounge builders were Jackie Miller, Randy Anderson, George Anderson, Gator Sherer, Jack Delaleur, and Don Strong. Without their contributions and labor, the lounge would not have been completed. There were many others, both men and women volunteers, who contributed time and donations to the project.

A huge shout out to all the ladies helping with the luncheon, decorating, meal prep, serving, and clean-up. Your help was greatly appreciated.

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
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# **New Bible Study Group**


