Flag at Half Staff

The oldest reference to flying a flag half-mast comes from a British ship, the Heart's Ease, in the 1600's. The captain died in route to Canada. Upon its return to London, the crew lowered the flag to honor their captain. Over the years, flags were lowered to honor others, primarily in a maritime setting, thus it was called half-mast, as a ship has a



mast. Eventually, the tradition started on land and was called half-mast or half-staff as the flag is flown from a pole (staff). Either term is acceptable; however, purists would say half-mast on any vessel on the water and half-staff on land.

Over the next centuries, there were no regulations on when or if to lower the flag and many conflicting rules began. But on March 1,1954, President Dwight Eisenhower issued a proclamation stating when and for how long the flag should be lowered. The time the flag is to stay at half-staff depends on the position of person who has passed. If it would be the death of a president or former president, then it extends to 30 days. It is to fly 10 days at half-staff for the death of a vice president, the chief justice of the Supreme court or the speaker of the House. For other members of Congress, the time is from the day of death until interment.

The president may order the flag to be flown at half-staff to mark the death of other officials, former officials or foreign dignitaries. In addition, it may be ordered after other tragic events.

The flag should be briskly run up to the top of the staff before being lowered slowly to the half-staff position

Hayes Street Closed

Response from Project Engineer to question of why Hayes Street was still closed.

The contractor has been off-site recently due to utility relocation work being conducted by PGE and Lumen/CenturyLink- it was PGE's relocation that caused the gas leak on Wednesday. All relocation work is scheduled to be complete this week, which will allow the contractor to resume storm water pipe installation this coming Monday. Once the pipe is installed, the curb, gutter, and sidewalk can then be formed and poured, and finally paving can take place. At this time, paving is scheduled to occur early October, about 6 weeks later than originally planned. We try and perform as much due diligence as we can in order to avoid delays like this, but unfortunately the contractor ran into utilities in locations that were not known to both the City and the utility companies, and thus the delay.

I understand you and your neighbors' frustration. I've been communicating with many of your neighbors over the course of the project and am well aware of the impact this project is having. I also greatly appreciate the patience shown by many as we try our best to get the road put back together in a timely manner. If you are one of the millions of people who enjoyed the Peanuts comic strip and its star Charlie Brown, here are some odd facts you might not know.

Creator Charles Schulz, who started the strip in 1947, originally called it Li'l Folks. But when the strip was syndicated in 1950, the name was changed to Peanuts. Schulz didn't especially like it.

Charlie Brown's beloved beagle Snoopy was modeled after Schulz's pointer dog, Spike. Snoopy had five siblings from the Daisy Hill Puppy Farm. All of them made appearances during the years the strip ran.

One character was so unpopular with readers that she had a very short run. The brash Charlotte Braun, the counterpoint to soft-spoken Charlie Brown, appeared in only 10 strips and the disappeared without explanation.

Another character was frequently mentioned as the love interest of Charlie Brown. She was called the Little Red-Haired Girl. She was never given a name or seen in the strip. She appeared in silhouette in one of the strips in 1998. She was based on Schulz's unrequited love for a real red-haired woman.

It is Time to Put your Garden to Bed

Warm fall weather encourages many of us to delay putting our gardens to bed, but late September and all of October are the best times to do it.

Some tomato lovers leave their plants in the ground in hopes that their green tomatoes will ripen. It's time to give it up. The same is true for peppers and cucumbers and other garden favorites.

Pull the spent vegetables and annuals and put them in the composter. Take good-sized green tomatoes off the branches. Put them in brown paper bags or a box. Check regularly for mold or rot. Over days or weeks, they will ripen.

You can leave healthy perennials standing. They can trap insulating snow and provide a bit of winter interest. But if any plants show signs of disease, pull them now.



Water everything. Trees, shrubs, and perennials could use a good soak. The same is true of grass if you're allowed to water it right now in your community. Most plants survive winter better if they go into the season with well-watered roots. Water them again in October or November.

Empty your containers. Ceramic, terra cotta, concrete and clay containers can shatter if left outside during the winter. Clean them and stack them in the garage.

You'll breathe a sigh of relief in spring if you clean up your yard tools now. Wash dirt off the hoe, shovel, cultivator and the tiller blades. Put a film of oil on them to prevent rust.

Spread fertilizer on your grass in September or October.

Rake your lawn as needed. If you have a thin layer of leaves, simply chop them up with your lawn mower. But if you have lots of leaves, rake, bag and save the leaves to use as mulch once the soil freezes.

If left on the grass, a thick layer of leaves can cause snow mold, which can damage grass. So keep up with your raking, experts advise.

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Pumpkin Bread: Good Anytime

Lucile Chapelle Passes at 106

Even pumpkin spice skeptics will enjoy this richly spiced pumpkin bread, which stirs together quickly and makes a tall, dense loaf (or muffins, if you prefer). For a little extra fiber and a nuttier taste, use a mix of all-purpose and whole wheat flour. The loaf lends itself well to experimentation – try some orange zest or a little ground allspice.

Ingredients

- 1 15-ounce can pumpkin puree
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil or melted butter
- 3 large eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1-2/3 cups sugar
- 1-1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 3/4 teaspoon baking soda
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- Heaped 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- Heaped 1/4 teaspoon ground ginger
- Two pinches of ground cloves
- 2-1/4 cups all-purpose flour
- To finish the loaf:
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon

Directions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit.
Grease a 6-cup loaf pan. Stir together pumpkin, oil, eggs, sugar and vanilla until smooth.
Add baking powder, baking soda, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg, ginger and cloves, stir again. Add flour and stir until just combined.
Pour the batter into the loaf pan and sprinkle the sugar and cinnamon mix on top -- this will create a crisp crust. Bake for about 70 minutes, or until a tester comes out clean.
For standard-sized muffins, bake for around 30 minutes, or until a tester comes out clean.

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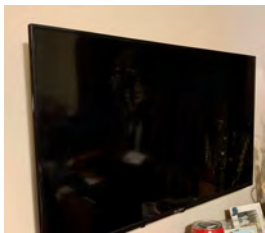
