Hot Water Hose Recall

PrassCraft, a respected manufacturer of plumbing parts, has issued a recall on a common type of hose used to connect a hot water heater to the plumbing system.

The hose looks like a black hose with brass ends.

The exterior looks like a finely braided rope.

The type of water heater does not matter if it's gas or electric.

It does not matter what size or length of hose installed though 3/4 inch is most common.

It does not matter if it "looks" fine.

The recall is for the interior (rubber) hose that fails without notice. Especially if the hose is installed in close proximity to the exhaust flue. They need to be replaced as soon as possible.

All residents should check their hot water heaters to assure that these have not been installed.

Technical specs follow:

Speedi Plumb PLUS Water Heater Connector

Part numbers vary but (ours) were 000382 or BWBO-24 and (the number after the BWBO does not matter).





Winter Equinox

The winter solstice, also called the hibernal solstice, occurs when either of Earth's poles reaches its maximum tilt away from the Sun. This happens twice yearly, once in each hemisphere (Northern and Southern). For that hemisphere, the winter solstice is the day with the shortest period of daylight and longest night of the year, when the Sun is at its lowest daily maximum elevation in the sky. Either pole experiences continuous darkness or twilight around its winter solstice. The opposite event is the summer solstice.

The winter solstice occurs during the hemisphere's winter. In the Northern Hemisphere, this is the December solstice (usually 21st or 22nd December) and in the Southern Hemisphere, this is the June solstice (usually 20th or 21st of June). Although the winter solstice itself lasts only a moment, the term also refers to the day on which it

occurs. The term midwinter is also used synonymously with the winter solstice, although it carries other meanings as well. Traditionally, in many temperate regions, the winter solstice is seen as the middle of winter; although today in some countries and calendars it is seen as the beginning of winter. Other names are the "extreme of winter" (Dongzhi), or the "shortest day".

Since prehistory, the winter solstice has been a significant time of year in many cultures and has been marked by festivals and rituals. It marked the symbolic death and rebirth of the Sun; the gradual waning of daylight hours is reversed and begins to grow again. Some ancient monuments such as Newgrange, Stonehenge, and Cahokia Woodhenge are aligned with the sunrise or sunset on the winter solstice.

The board has been faced with challenging budget results in recent years. Due to that, we looked at the 3 options to address the issues. These were previously presented:

> Option 1 - Status Quo **Option 2 – Semiprivate** Option 3 – All-in-one

In response to some members' concerns and balancing our need to make sure we have a stable financial plan moving forward, it was decided by the Board of Directors to post a new **4th option**:

Option #4 - Dual Plan

Option #4 Plan 4.1 (Basic) would be the current HOA dues plan, it would include all the existing amenities you now receive. Dues would be \$825. You may upgrade to an all-inclusive plan, called Option #4 Plan 4.2 which includes golf course access and a couple of other perks for dues of \$1300, total.

All new members buying in would have to enroll in Plan 2. Over time, the benefits of more members buying into Plan 2 will reduce its cost. It also reduces the impact on current members.

We have looked at different ways to finance our operations and we need to have a system that gives us more stability since we have had negative operations margins (losses) five of the last six years. HOA dues have not kept up with inflation, HOA expenses, and the impact of Covid on our revenues. This year, we looked at options that can stabilize our financial performance moving forward.

Option #4 – Dual Plan allows us to make as little impact on current members as possible while giving us a path that will gradually bundle the cost of all our amenities and provide us with a more stable financial plan in the future.


