Why Does the Easter Bunny Bring Eggs? And Other Easter Traditions

Easter is a religious holiday celebrated by Christians the world over commemorating Christ's rising from the dead. So why do we in the United States especially, have a large rabbit delivering multi-colored eggs and candy on that day? There is no mention of a large rabbit in the Bible, much less one that delivers eggs! So where did that tradition start? One theory is that it stems from the ancient pagan tradition of Eostre, a festival that honored the goddess of fertility and spring. The goddess's animal symbol was a rabbit which has long stood for fertility since their high reproduction rates. Since rabbits are mammals, it may seem like mistaken biology to have eggs from rabbits, but eggs have long been considered an ancient symbol of fertility, rebirth, and new life. So from the church's perspective, eggs represented Christ's resurrection and since they often paired pagan traditions with Christian teachings, Easter was born!



The tradition of coloring eggs may date back to the 13th century when eggs were traditionally considered a forbidden food during Lent. After the fasting period ended, people colored the eggs to make a more celebratory feast at Easter. The Easter Bunny himself was reportedly brought to America in the 1700's by German immigrants who settled in Pennsylvania and transported their tradition of an egg-laying hare called "Osterhase". Children made nests where the creature could lay its eggs. Eventually, the custom spread across the U.S. and the rabbit's Easter deliveries started to include candy and baskets replaced the nests.

Speaking of candy, Easter is the second best-selling candy holiday in the U.S., surpassed only by Halloween. Among the most popular candies is the chocolate egg which dates to 19th century Europe. Another egg-shaped candy, the jelly bean, became associated with Easter in the 1930's. According to the National Confectioners Association, over 16 million jelly beans are made in the U.S. each year just for Easter. For the past decade, the top-selling, non-chocolate Easter candy has been the marshmallow Peep, a sugary, pastel-colored confection. Just Born, a Pennsylvania-based company, founded in 1923, by a Russian immigrant, Sam Born, began selling yellow chicks in the 1950's. Now they are in all different colors and some are even chocolate-flavored!

Other traditions around Easter include the New York City Easter Parade, dating back to the mid 1800's. The upper crust of society would attend services at various Fifth Avenue churches and then stroll outside wearing their new spring outfits, especially hats. The tradition reached its peak in the mid-20th century and in 1948, the movie "Easter Parade" with Fred Astaire and Judy Garland was released with music by Irving Berlin, including the lyrics, "in your Easter bonnet, with all the frills upon it, you'll be the grandest lady in the Easter parade". The parade tradition lives on in Manhattan, with Fifth Avenue from 49th St. to 57th St. being shut down to traffic so participants can promenade with elaborately decorated bonnets. Other cities also have their own Easter parades.

Easter egg hunts and egg rolling are two more popular Easter traditions. In the U.S., the White House hosts an Easter Egg Roll, a race in which children push decorated, hard-boiled eggs across the White House lawn, and also an Easter Egg Hunt where children find decorated eggs hidden by adults. The tradition started with President Rutherford B. Hayes in 1878. This usually happens the day after Easter Sunday.



Wintering in Arizona

During the last two winters, I traveled south to seek warmer, drier weather. After more than 20 years in central Oregon where it gets cold, but not very often wet or gray, I was looking for a change.

I had heard of work camping, exchanging work for an RV site. Last winter I was offered a position at the first place I applied and since I was new to both work camping and living in an RV, I thought I'd better take it! It turned out to be a positive experience. 29 Palms, pop. 28,000 in southern CA is outside the largest Marine base in the country and near Joshua Tree National Park. For work, I cleaned the pool and maintained the landscaping, including trimming roses! something I've helped with at the Estates. Who knew that experience would come in handy? The town is full of marine haircut shops, tattoo parlors, massage parlors, and fast food restaurants. I met some nice people that remain friends.

This year I applied to 2 positions and was offered both. One was at a gun range run by the state of Arizona north of Phoenix but I didn't figure after they closed in the evening, that there would be much going on except miles and miles of quiet desert. So I took a position at an RV park in Yuma. There are over 1200 sites on 80 acres (compared to about 200 sites last year). Some have park models and some have RVs. They all pay rent because the resort owns the land. There are more activities than anyone could attend in a week. There are multiple card games, dominos, bingo, shuffleboard, pickle ball, remote control car racing, miniature golf, indoor and outdoor pools and hot tubs, a movie night, potluck night, a dance every Friday, weekly hikes, a library, a video library, a music club, church services on Sunday, a restaurant and ice cream shop. There are about 73 RV parks in Yuma, and I think they compete for guests by providing activities!!

I was fortunate enough since I arrived early in the season in September, to be assigned to work at the front gate. It's pleasant work greeting residents and recording the names of visitors, 3 afternoons a week. There are probably 30 or 40 work campers at this park doing maintenance, setting up for special events, working in the activities office or park office, mailroom, or guiding incoming RVs to their sites.

The weather was well over 100 when I arrived in September, but I escaped the 115-120 degree days of July and August. It's now often cool, sixties in the daytime and 40-50s at night, sometimes windy but almost always sunny.

There are a lot of Canadians in the park including French-speaking residents from many of the states along the west coast and toward the Midwest.

I go to a good church just a mile away and went with about a dozen other volunteers to the San Carlos Apache reservation outside Globe, AZ, where we laid tile for 3 days in a new church building. I worked with a marine and we were a good pair, laying a tile about every minute! We were told the reservation was one of the poorest people groups in the country and if they could house everyone, they would need about 1400 additional homes built. There's gang activity and addiction. Apparently, the reservation land is owned by the federal government and when copper was discovered near Globe, that part of the reservation was taken away from the Native Americans. Tribal members can work at the copper mine, and there is even a bus to take them to work, but they have to get to the pick-up point and many of them don't have cars. Opportunity for employment is slim because businesses/employers don't want to build on land owned by the federal government.

I'm enjoying myself, and the multiple restaurants in the area! It's also 20 minutes to Los Algodonis, Mexico where I've been twice. Shrimp tacos are the best!!

This area is the lettuce capital of the country, and they can harvest a crop every 30 days. There are also date trees, citrus trees, persimmons, broccoli, alfalfa, and miles of irrigation canals.

Thanks for reading, I hope if you're not traveling that reading about it helps you through the winter!

Woodburn Estates & Golf – Men's Golf Club Monthly Meeting March 1, 2023 10:00AM in the WEG Dining Room.

President Fred Bourne CALLED THE MEETING TO ORDER at 10:05AM, followed by the PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE. All officers and committee chairmen/representatives were present unless otherwise noted. There were 31 members in attendance.

NEW MEMBERS: Mike Alexander, John Carpenter, and Dick Hass introduced themselves.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: Fred Bourne reported that March 1st is the beginning of the official score-posting period and runs through November 30th. The Men's Golf Constitution has a change in the bylaws. The term "equity stroke control" has been updated to the "world handicap system."

As presented last month, it was MOVED (Fred Bourne/Jerry Haugen) that the voucher system be modified so that credits will be accumulated each year through November 30th and must be used by December 31st. Any funds remaining after December 31st will revert either to the Men's Golf Club or the Women's Golf Club. It was noted that voucher funds can be used to purchase items through Amazon.com with purchases made through the clubhouse (with a 20% markup). The motion passed unanimously.

Fred asks all golfers to police themselves regarding pace of play. During Men's Club play, slower players are encouraged to sign up later in the day. The Golf Pro will act as a course marshal when needed.

VICE-PRESIDENT'S REPORT: Mike reported that he has received complaints from the Golf Superintendent about unrepaired ball marks on greens. Please repair all ball marks.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Treasurer Dean Cullison reported balances as of February 28:

- Checking account fund balance: \$7,731.04 (includes \$592.00 in 50-50 funds)
- Voucher account balance: \$8,186.29

GREENS COMMITTEE REPORT: Phil Balogh reported that sprinkler repairs (raising the sprinklers) continue, as does de-limbing of some trees. The fairways are scheduled to be "sliced and sanded" this spring. The greens are scheduled to be aerated during the week of April 4-10.

HANDICAP COMMITTEE REPORT: Steve Krieg distributed a proposed "Handicapping Policies and Procedures" document that is a product of both the men's and women's handicap committees. To help address possible infractions, a proposed "Handicap Policy Enforcement Procedures" was also distributed. It was noted that handicapping is considered a "privilege" and

when someone applies for a handicap, the person agrees to abide by the rules and procedures. If an incorrect score is posted, you must contact the Handicap Chair, who will correct the posted score. The expectation is that golfers will play a "post able game" at least half of their rounds played. It was MOVED (Steve Krieg/Phil Balogh) that the proposed procedures be adopted under the Men's Handicap Bylaws, noting that the Women's Golf Club still need to add their personnel. The motion passed unanimously.

RULES COMMITTEE REPORT: Dave Schuur clarified that balls inadvertently struck while the ball is in play constitute a one-stroke penalty and the ball must be replaced to its original location. It is a two-stroke penalty if the ball is not replaced. If a golf ball cannot be properly identified as it lies, it can be lifted for inspection, but it must be properly marked prior to lifting the ball. Dave also clarified that the "closest point of relief" does not necessarily mean a better lie. Also, a ball that accidentally lands on an adjacent green must be moved to the nearest point of relief. This is free relief without any penalty.

SUNSHINE COMMITTEE REPORT: Chuck Johnson reported that Gene Finley passed away. He was 91 years old. A card was sent to Frank Morrison. Chuck will also send cards to Walt Eklund and Dick Hammond.

OGA COMMITTEE REPORT: Dave Rushton reported that registration is now open for the OGA "Super Senior Tournament" for golfers aged 65 and up to be held at Creekside Golf Club in Salem July 19-20, 2023. There will be three divisions based on the number of entries.

Our "Club Championship" is open to golfers aged 50 and up. A proposal is to add a "Super Senior" category (age 75 and over). The champion could possibly be invited by OGA to a special tournament.

MEMBERSHIP: The Treasurer reported 112 current members.

FOR THE GOOD OF THE ORDER: Dean Cullison reported that the 50-50 account has more than \$560. Suggestions were received about possible uses for the money.

50-50 RAFFLE: A total of \$60 in tickets were sold and Rudy Garcia won the pot (\$30).

It was duly moved and seconded to ADJOURN the meeting at 11:03AM.

The NEXT MEETING of the Men's Golf Club will be Wednesday, April 5 at 10:00AM.




Al's Spring Garden Tips

Spring is the perfect time to start gardening and get your garden ready for the summer months. Pruning in March is a good habit to adopt as well. Prune your roses by cutting out dead, damaged, or crossing canes. Trim winter-flowering shrubs and vines after bloom. A Newspaper Story

Cora and I have a time-honored morning newspaper routine. I retrieve the newspaper in the summer if it's not raining. She retrieves it at all other times, no matter the conditions; usually adorned in her bathrobe and jammies.

A dollar a day, but what would I do without the newspaper to divert my attention while the Frosted Flakes melt in my bowl.

We peel the plastic bag from the newspaper and discard the soaked pages, most of which are wrap-around advertisements; and separate the sections in a way that reflects our interests and intellects. Cora claims the news and sports sections, and the crossword puzzles. I glom onto the comics and their

neighbors.

She reads every word of the daily news, gets involved in the sports and fills out the crossword puzzles while I puzzle over the comics.

There's a procedure for my portion of the paper. I read my least favorite comics first, those that portray husbands as dismal dimwitted dorks, and their wives as female Einsteins. I then move onto the less insulting comics, which are at times difficult to understand. My favorite comic is Pearls Before Swine. Cora says that simple-minded Pig is my alter ego. Well, she has to be right sometimes.

On occasion, I'll read the column next to the comics that used to be Dear Abby. She's been taken over by "columnists" too young to respond wisely to the incessant whining. I often mumble, "What a bunch of losers." Cora hears even if I only thought it and replies, "They're nearly as bad as someone who reads about them."

I enjoy reading the lineup of historical events that happened on the day's date. Surprisingly, more and more of them have taken place within my lifetime.

Next door to the history section is a list of celebrity birthdays. I'm not familiar with most of the personalities, unless they appeared in the history section.

Two doors down is a list of the lottery games' winning ticket numbers. I have a set of six numbers that I'd use if I ever chose to play the two-dollar lotteries. I smile when I learn that I would've won diddly squat if I had purchased a ticket. So every ticket that I didn't buy saved me two dollars, four times per week, which is more than enough in savings to pay for the newspaper.
