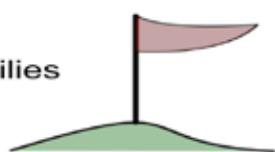

Memorial Day

Memorial Day is an American holiday, observed on the last Monday of May, honoring the men and women who died while serving in the U.S. military. Memorial Day 2023 will occur on Monday, May 29.

Originally known as Decoration Day, it originated in the years following the Civil War and became an official federal holiday in 1971. Many Americans observe Memorial Day by visiting cemeteries or memorials, holding family gatherings, and participating in parades. Unofficially, it marks the beginning of the summer season.

The Birthplace of Memorial Day and Early Observances

The Civil War, which ended in the spring of 1865, claimed more lives than any conflict in U.S. history and required the establishment of the country's first national cemeteries.

By the late 1860s, Americans in various towns and cities had begun holding springtime tributes to these countless fallen soldiers, decorating their graves with flowers and reciting prayers.

It is unclear where exactly this tradition originated; numerous different communities may have independently initiated the memorial gatherings. And some records show that one of the earliest Memorial Day commemorations was organized by a group of formerly enslaved people in Charleston, South Carolina less than a month after the Confederacy surrendered in 1865. Nevertheless, in 1966 the federal government declared Waterloo, New York, the official birthplace of Memorial Day.

Waterloo, which first celebrated the day on May 5, 1866, was chosen because it hosted an annual, community-wide event, during which businesses closed and residents decorated the graves of soldiers with flowers and flags.

Did you know? Each year on Memorial Day a national moment of remembrance takes place at 3:00 p.m. local time.

Decoration Day

On May 5, 1868, General John A. Logan, leader of an organization for Northern Civil War veterans, called for a nationwide day of remembrance later that month. "The 30th of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land," he proclaimed.

The date of Decoration Day, as he called it, was chosen because it wasn't the anniversary of any particular battle.

On the first Decoration Day, General James Garfield made a speech at Arlington National Cemetery, and 5,000 participants decorated the graves of the 20,000 Civil War soldiers buried there.

Many Northern states held similar commemorative events and reprised the tradition in subsequent years. By 1890 each one had made Decoration Day an official state holiday. Southern states, on the other hand, continued to honor the dead on separate days until after World War I.

History of Memorial Day

Memorial Day, as Decoration Day gradually came to be known, originally honored only those lost while fighting in the Civil War. But during World War I the United States found itself embroiled in another major conflict, and the holiday evolved to commemorate American military personnel who died in all wars, including World War II, The Vietnam War, The Korean War and the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

For decades, Memorial Day continued to be observed on May 30, the date General Logan had selected for the first Decoration Day. But in 1968, Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act, which established Memorial Day as the last Monday in May in order to create a three-day weekend for federal employees. The change went into effect in 1971. The same law also declared Memorial Day a federal holiday.

Memorial Day Traditions and Rituals

Cities and towns across the United States host Memorial Day parades each year, often incorporating military personnel and members of veterans' organizations. Some of the largest parades take place in Chicago, New York and Washington, D.C.

Americans also observe Memorial Day by visiting cemeteries and memorials. Some people wear a red poppy in remembrance of those fallen in war, a tradition that began with a World War I poem. On a less somber note, many people take weekend trips or throw parties and barbecues on the holiday, perhaps because Memorial Day weekend, the long weekend comprising the Saturday and Sunday before Memorial Day and Memorial Day itself, unofficially marks the beginning of summer.

One of the earliest memorial day ceremonies was held by freed African Americans

At the close of the civil war, people recently freed from slavery in Charleston honored fallen union soldiers.

But N&V policy is to NOT publish advertising for something that isn't happening for more than a month. Also, all advertising is published twice only. We will publish reminders or "save the date" in the This and That column, but large display ads (limited to 5"x4") are published in only two (2) issues. Also, please note the N&V deadline - a complete calendar of deadlines is in this issue on page 6. It is also in the Directory. Thanks for your understanding of our procedures.

ADVERTISING MEDIA MAY BE:

1. Recognized clubs of the Association, business clients, members, or public.
2. News & Views (going rate) in "Ad Sizes & Rates" will apply to all submissions.
3. All material submitted must be properly formatted and handmade may be approved.
4. Marketing Publications/Communication reserves the right to reject any material submitted deemed inappropriate.
5. Flyers / Banners / Posters / Signs of any type – regardless of the media type (printed or electronic) is limited to 30-days. After 30-days, you will be charged the going rates.
6. Recognized clubs of the Association can advertise FREE but limited to 5" wide by 4" high or 3" wide by 5" high. Ads outside this range will be charged the going rates.
7. Must include who, what, when, where, and any information needed to be informative of the event including any beverage, food, or sponsor(s).

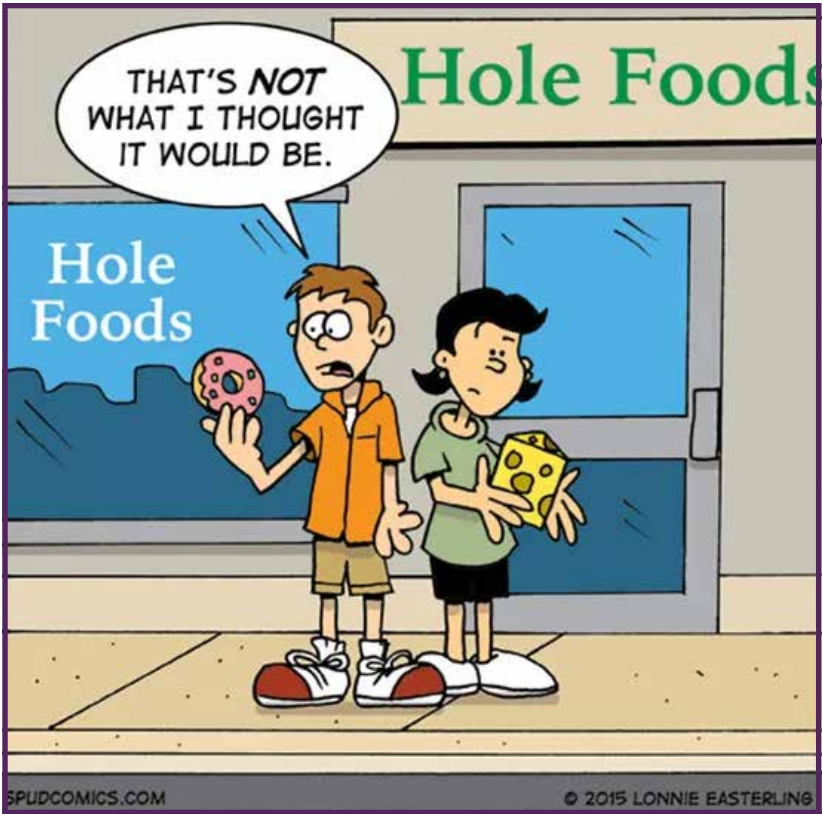
ADVERTISING MAY BE PLACED:

Garden Design 101

Take a walk around our neighborhood and you will see some beautiful front yards. Ever wonder why they look so appealing, and how you can recreate the same in your yard? The elements that make all art attractive are the same elements of good landscaping. These elements are scale, focal point, repetition, color, shape, and texture.

The size of your lawn, planting beds and borders, yard art, and shrubs should relate back to some feature of the house. So if your door is 3 feet wide, try a 3 foot wide foot path. If you have a big 8 foot picture window, design a planting area of the same dimensions, either under the window or out by the street. You can use stakes, string, and ground marking spray paint to line up the planting areas with the front door, the picture window, and edges of the house. Now your garden will relate to, and is in scale with your house.

Now let's talk about focal points in a garden. When you stand facing a garden, close your eyes. Now take a quick peek, and close them again. What did you notice? The trash cans? A fire hydrant? Actually, a house's focal point should be the front door, where friends and family are welcomed. You can accentuate the front door with a direct walkway, flanked by flowers and solar lights. Paint your door an exciting color and add matching planters on either side to create a strong focal point.

Repetition is important in a good garden design, so instead of one specimen of every plant, try repeating the same plant all around the yard. This leads the viewer's eye through the garden and makes it look larger. You can plant a pink azalea by the curb, one on the far right and left of the yard, and another one up by the front door. Then add peonies, maybe 5 of the same variety of rhody, all underplanted with creeping phlox.

Color is a great way to display your personality in your garden. A monochromatic color scheme with all white flowers can look calm and soothing. Or pick two colors on opposite sides of the color wheel, like yellow and purple, for high energy. On your walks around the neighborhood, notice what color combinations you find most interesting and repeat that in your flowering plants, yard art, and even the color of your house and door.

Another important art element in your landscape is shape. Decide if you would like your shrubs to be mounded, spheres, tall and skinny columns, or squared off, then repeat that shape around the yard with all the plants that take to shaping. If your house has low, horizontal lines, repeat that with a long, low hedge.

Texture adds interest to the landscape. Try contrasting large leafed plants like rhododendrons with finer leafed plants like grasses. Smaller flowers can be placed close to where people walk, so their small details can be appreciated.

So take a walk around your block and see if you can identify these elements of good landscaping in our neighborhood, and happy gardening!
